

'Get Lost,' Jim Hoffa Tells Critics Of Teamsters' Union

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (AP)—James R. Hoffa today advised his critics to get lost. He said he's whipped 'em and they might as well admit it.

Hoffa, 48, a one-time Detroit warehouse hand, was elected overwhelmingly Friday to a second five-year term as president of the Teamsters, the nation's largest labor union, over only token opposition.

Efforts Have Failed
"Seriously," Hoffa remarked later, "I think Bobby Kennedy, his brother the President, the secretary of labor, and the supposed Senate select committee ought to recognize now that the time and effort they've put in trying to destroy the Teamsters have completely failed. It was a waste of time."

Hoffa referred, of course, to President Kennedy, Atty. Gen. Robert F. Kennedy, Labor Secretary Arthur J. Goldberg, and to the Senate investigating Committee headed by Sen. John L. McClellan, D-Ark.

"From now on, they ought to leave us alone," Hoffa said. "They ought to quit fooling around and let us operate as a trade union and as Americans."

No Picnic
Hoffa said the charges and investigations piled up against him and the Teamsters during nearly four years have been no picnic, but he said he isn't nervous about them continuing.

He said that congressional critics ought to admit that, "while they may embarrass and harass teamsters, they can't frighten 'em."

Hoffa was asked about his goals for the next five years as head of the 1.7 million Teamsters union. He said that he wants to increase the union's membership to at least 2 million and return to "the house of labor," meaning the AFL-CIO. The federation expelled the Teamsters for corruption several years ago.

Hoffa said that another aim is to minimize strikes while reducing the accepted retirement age to 55 years after 20 years of work. The present Social Security retirement age is 65, but Hoffa has negotiated a 60-year retirement age

in most Teamsters contracts. The Teamsters convention adjourned Friday night after a flamboyant finale to the five-day session.

Have Crime Records
Anthony (Tony Pro) Provenzano of Hoboken, N. J., and Frank Matula, of Los Angeles, re-elected to the United Auto Workers, received \$22,000 salary plus \$15,139 expenses while David Dubinsky of Ladies Garment workers was paid \$28,000 in salary and \$6,015 in allowances and expenses.

Reports on file at the Labor Department in Washington show salaries ranging as low as \$6,000 for leaders of smaller unions.

A recent survey by Business Week magazine said General Motors Corp. paid more than \$300,000 apiece to 11 executives, including salaries and cash bonuses. Seven Ford Motor Co. executives received more than \$300,000 each and a number of executives in other companies were paid similar sums.

The Interior Ministry today ordered the entire Belgian consulate staff expelled in an angry flareup of Katanga's long feud with the United Nations. But Katanga President Moise Tshombe revoked the order.

The Interior Ministry reacted after U.N. Swedish troops Friday seized Georges Thyssens, a Belgian adviser in Katanga, and expelled him from this capital. One shot was fired in making the arrest and Thyssens' son was beaten.

Informed source said Interior Minister Godefroid Munongo was angry because the Belgian consulate staff failed to intervene and protect Thyssens, a personal friend.

Collaboration Charged
The Interior Ministry accused a member of the Belgian consulate staff, Charles Muller, of collaborating with the United Nations. He was arrested and expelled this morning.

Security police raided the consulate and even detained consul Jules Herkens for a time. Some documents in the consulate were taken.

When Consul General Henri Crenier protested to the Interior Ministry he was told that he and his staff must leave.

Then Tshombe intervened. He counts heavily on the Belgians for help in running this mineral rich region of the former Belgian Congo.

Tshombe asked Crenier to convey his apologies to the consulate and to the Belgian government. He expressed regrets at the "rash decision" made by Munongo, who is considered one of the strong men in Katanga.

The U.N. in arresting Thyssens accused him of putting the finger on Muller, a special diplomatic adviser to the consulate. The U.N. said Thyssens told Katanga authorities Muller was a socialist sent to work with the U.N.

Thyssens was seized at his luxurious home here Friday night by Swedish U.N. troops and taken to a secret destination—possibly the U.N. base in Kamina.

The United Nations' chief representative in Katanga, Conon C. O'Brien, called a special news

conference to deny reports that excessive force was used in deporting Thyssens.

"Any force used was in legitimate self-defense," O'Brien said, "and the only shot fired was at a dog which tried to defend its master."

Expelled July 4
Thyssens was originally ordered expelled from Katanga July 4, but asked to be allowed to stay for a few more days to clear up his affairs.

O'Brien said that when it became known that Thyssens was behind the arrest of Muller, the United Nations decided to have him expelled without delay.

Thyssens was accused of telling the Katanga government that Muller was a Socialist party representative sent to enforce the U.N. Security Council resolutions. These resolutions authorize the United Nations to use force if need be to prevent civil war in the Congo.

Myrtle Creek Man Draws Jail Term
Claud Yarborough, 56, of Myrtle Creek drew a sentence of 73 days, the time he has already spent in jail, on a plea of guilty to assault and battery Friday, before Circuit Judge Charles S. Woodrick.

Yarborough had entered his plea on Wednesday to a reduced charge. He originally faced a charge of assault with a deadly weapon for allegedly pointing a gun at Ernest Penry.

Sentence Deferred
Sentencing was deferred to Friday, when witnesses were called to help the judge determine penalty. After hearing the statements from them and from Yarborough, he commented that he was in doubt as to whether Yarborough had actually committed a crime.

It was brought out that Yarborough had ordered Penry out of his home and produced a gun when he failed to leave. Several character witnesses testified in his behalf.

TV Set Conversion
The judge stated that inasmuch as Yarborough had pleaded guilty he would impose sentence for the time he had spent in jail. He had been unable to post bail after indictment by the Grand Jury.

Judge Woodrick has set Monday at 9:30 a.m. for sentencing of Elmer Steen, 30, of North Bend on a charge of larceny by bailer. Steen was convicted by a trial jury Wednesday of converting a television set, allegedly the property of Fred Bernau, to his own use.

The judge, in a hearing Thursday, overruled a defense motion for a directed verdict.

Beck Claims Control Tightener Necessary
SEATTLE (AP)—Seizure of more union control by Teamsters Union head James Hoffa was "absolutely necessary," Dave Beck, former union president, says.

Beck, who missed the International Teamsters' convention this past week for the first time in 36 years, commented on his successor's action in pushing through constitutional changes which gave him almost dictatorial authority.

"It was absolutely necessary to concentrate more control in the international because of the Landrum-Griffin Act," Beck said.

The Landrum-Griffin measure was described by supporters at time of passage as a "tough union reform bill."

Beck said his private real estate and business interests here prevented him from going to the Miami Beach, Fla., sessions.

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New Dialing System Due Glendale-Azalea Area

George O'Mealy, general manager of the California-Pacific Telephone Co. in Myrtle Creek, revealed today that the Glendale-Azalea telephone exchanges will be switched over to the direct long-distance dialing system at 11:01 p.m. July 15. It is the same time the two systems will be directly connected to the Myrtle Creek exchange rather than being routed through the Roseburg exchange as at present.

O'Mealy pointed out that one benefit of the switch to the Roseburg exchange would be the fact that local subscribers will be able to make toll-free calls directly to the company business office in Myrtle Creek if necessary.

In preparation for the change to direct dialing, subscribers of the Glendale and Azalea systems are required to dial their prefix letters and numerals as well as the remaining numerals of the local calls they are making. Prior to June 21, in making local calls, the prefix letters were not used.

Newburgh's Welfare Plan Draws Condemnation From Many Points

NEWBURGH, N.Y. (AP)—The city of Newburgh, defying the state, the federal government and its own welfare commissioner, prepared today to go ahead with a new set of strict welfare rules it says are needed to keep the city solvent.

The proposed new rules—widely hailed and widely condemned across the nation—are to go into effect July 15. A court action by the state of New York against the city appeared likely in the wake of a stormy hearing on the legality of the rules in Albany Friday.

The committee that conducted the hearing recommended that the State Welfare Board order Newburgh officials not to implement the 13 regulations.

Refuse To Testify
Nine of the city's officials refused to testify at the hearing conducted by the State Social Welfare Board. The tenth, Welfare Commissioner John J. O'Donnell, disagreed with the others and testified he could not legally enforce 10 of the new rules.

Newburgh officials maintain the Hudson Valley city of 31,000—5 per cent of whom are on relief—needs the rules to maintain its fiscal balance. Critics call the plan illegal, inhumane and discriminatory against Negroes, who are predominant among the welfare cases.

In his testimony to the board, O'Donnell said 10 of the new rules violate state or federal law. He filed the city plan to deny aid to mothers of illegitimate children while on relief.

Resignation Considered
He also agreed with the state that under federal rules able-bodied men receiving federal aid may not be required to work on municipal projects, as the new rules provide. O'Donnell said he was considering resigning.

When the board said it was limiting testimony to that directly connected with Newburgh's welfare rules, City Manager Joseph Mitchell and eight other city officials refused to testify.

Mitchell said after the hearing the board "did not want to hear anything about Newburgh's social and economic programs." He told reporters the city will go ahead with its program as planned.

The Newburgh branch of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People issued a statement saying "racial discrimination is the motivating factor behind the Newburgh program."

Newburgh officials have denied this throughout, saying the problem is purely one of taxes. The city spends \$900,000 a year for welfare—nearly \$500,000 of which comes from federal or state aid.

Fifteen Tracts Of O & C Timber Bring High Prices Here Friday
The Roseburg District of the Bureau of Land Management Friday sold 15 tracts of O & C timber, containing 29,071,000 board feet, for \$683,400.40.

This was \$154,383.50 above the total appraised price of \$529,016.90. **Strong Price Paid**
The big sale of the day saw U.S. Plywood Corp. of Roseburg pay better than double the appraised price for a tract containing 4,458,000 board feet of timber in the Rock Creek area. The tract was appraised at \$74,688.75 and U. S. Plywood bid a total of \$164,108.25. They paid \$33.55 per thousand board feet for 2,790,000 feet of Douglas fir appraised at \$21.50 per thousand.

U. S. Plywood also purchased another tract in that area, paying the appraised \$66,017.80 for 4,094,000 board feet of timber.

In Tree Area
Sun Studs, Inc. purchased three tracts Friday for a total of 367,452.60. The first two tracts were in the Tye area. The first held a total of 18,000 board feet and went to Sun Studs, Inc. for \$18,415.50, while the second tract, containing 1,724,000 feet, went for \$40,730.40. The third tract was purchased by Sun Studs, Inc. for the appraised price of \$3,906.70.

Woolley Logging Co. of Drain purchased two tracts near Drain for the appraised prices of \$34,676.30 and \$107,510.20. They contained a total of 7,416,000 board feet of timber.

C&D Lumber Co. of Riddle purchased four tracts of the O & C timber for their appraised prices of \$14,266.40, \$47,923.05, \$4,720.05 and \$3,431.90. The four tracts contained a total of 4,170,000 feet of timber.

Over Linna purchased two BLM tracts containing a total of 392,000 board feet. The first was purchased for \$8,000.30 as Linna paid \$4 per thousand for 230,000 feet of Douglas fir appraised at \$33.55. The second tract was purchased for the appraised \$3,476.80.

The other big sale of the day was the Cowlitz River Blast Scheduled.

CENTRALIA (AP)—A blast that will tumble 18 thousand tons of earth into the Cowlitz River probably will be set off by the middle of next week, officials at Mayfield Dam said Saturday.

Postponement of the explosion was forced this week when the flooding Cowlitz took a temporary crib from the fish barrier designed to detour salmon into ladders.

Repairs had to be made so the fish will have an alternate route when the man-made landslide pushes the river into a diversion tunnel.

With the stream shunted aside, workmen will be able to operate in the bed of the Cowlitz.

'Not Guilty' Was Plea To Driving Violation
David Barr of 1811 SE Giles St., Roseburg, did not plead guilty to a charge of reckless driving as was indicated in Friday's News-Review.

He was found guilty of the charge in Douglas County District Court by a jury. He had pleaded innocent to the charge after his arrest May 27.

District Judge Gerald Hayes this week fined him \$105 and sentenced him to serve 10 days in jail.

California Man Held On Charge Of Assault
Richard Claude Crisswell, 38, of Farmersville, Calif., was arrested Friday after being charged with assault and battery.

Roseburg police said he is charged with hitting Mrs. Betty Lou Beard of 2610 NE Diamond Lake Blvd. Police stated the incident apparently arose when Crisswell was reprimanded for teasing the Beards' children. According to the report, the complainant said Crisswell hit her. When her husband said he was going to call the police, Mrs. Beard reported, the youth also hit him.

Glendale Council Meets
The Glendale City Council met Friday evening. The regular Monday night meeting had been canceled because a number of the members were out of town, reports Mrs. Gerald B. Fox, correspondent.

Routine business was transacted. There was some discussion of the city's search for a fire truck but no action was taken.

Elk Possession Draws Penalty
Three Camas Valley people were fined a total of \$400 Friday by Justice of Peace Ward Watson in Sutherlin after pleading guilty to having illegal possession of elk meat.

The three are Troy S. Burt, Harry Albert Nuzum and Geraldine Grace Smith. Burt and Geraldine Smith were fined \$150 and sentenced to serve 10 days each. Nuzum was fined \$100 and given 10 days.

The sentences were to be suspended on payment of the fines. Judge Watson confiscated 34 packages of elk meat and a box of bones and meat. All were turned over to the Douglas County Home at Roseburg.

The three were arrested by state police July 5.

Rules Set For Distribution Of Surplus Food In Oregon

SALEM (AP)—Representatives of the state Welfare Commission and the Association of Oregon Counties met Friday and established ground rules for state contributions to federal surplus food distribution to the needy.

Under a law passed by the last legislature, the state can pay 70 per cent of the administrative costs. However, the legislature appropriated only \$702,240 for this biennium.

Andrew Juras, acting state welfare administrator, told the group that without ground rules the \$702,240 could be exhausted by a few counties—leaving none for the rest.

Under the regulations agreed upon, the counties will meet whenever possible the initial cost for

such capital expenses as freezers. If a hardship case arises, then, through mutual agreement of the commission and the county, the state can advance the 70 per cent of the cost.

Under the method where the county pays the initial cost, the state will make a monthly contribution to amortize the cost of the investment.

However, under the regulations, the county must first make every attempt to use commercial or existing county facilities to do the job.

There was some objection to a 25 cent per carton cost which the state Finance and Administration Department will make for supervising, ordering and warehousing the food.

It will be up to the local county welfare commissions to decide who is eligible for the surplus food.

Twenty-two counties indicated they would either budget funds or have funds available if they decide to enter the program. Some of them already are distributing the food.

The counties are Multnomah, Marion, Clatsop, Josephine, Lane, Union, Malheur, Baker, Lake, Deschutes, Harney, Coos, Curry, Jackson, Polk, Linn, Clackamas, Columbia, Yamhill, Tillamook, Washington and Clatsop.

Price Increase For Whisky Seen
PORTLAND (AP)—Highball and straight whisky prices may soon increase about five cents a drink.

John Tehan, president of the Oregon Restaurant and Beverage Assn., said Friday increased labor costs and the 15-cent per fifth state price hike are responsible.

Some establishments have already increased drink prices by five cents, Tehan said.

Malpractice Suit Resumes Monday
The civil trial in which Dr. J. M. Hutson formerly of Roseburg, and Dr. A. B. Munroe of Roseburg are charged with malpractice is scheduled to be continued Monday after a weekend recess.

The plaintiff's attorney will continue his presentation Monday. The trial opened Monday in the court of Circuit Judge Don H. Sanders.

The plaintiff, Daniel Willard through his guardian Jean Willard charges malpractice. The complaint charges that in 1957, the infant received a smallpox vaccination and in the course of the operation caused bleeding. The complaint says the child was suffering from hemophilia (excessive bleeding).

The complainant is asking an award of \$50,000.

Need Help At First
Inasmuch as the telephone books distributed by the California-Pacific Utility Co. serve Myrtle Creek, Canyonville and Riddle, as well as the two communities which have issued the sheet of number changes, O'Mealy indicated that it would probably be necessary for persons who did not have the new lists to

ask operator for help in calling these numbers at first.

O'Mealy stated that the company is now in the process of rebuilding the telephone cable system within Glendale. It has also ordered equipment for adding 100 new lines in the Glendale central office. This will make it possible to add new subscribers and to give out private lines.

Another advance made within the past months is the extension of the area receiving service at the base rate from the city limits out to the Glendale Road as far as the turn just west of the high school and along the road which formerly led to the Patterson Mill.

Cable System Due
O'Mealy said that Wolf Creek will have a separate exchange this winter if there is no delay in the working out of present plans. Property has been purchased in Wolf Creek for erection of an exchange building 20' by 24', and the contract has already been let for its construction. Work orders have been approved, and work will begin shortly on the job of putting in a new Wolf Creek cable system.
