Question for today:
What is the Fourth of July?

The Fourth of July is the anniversary of our Declaration of Independence. Our Declaration of Independence was a formal statement of our intention to throw off our allegiance to the British crown. After reciting the grievances that led us to this drastic decision, we stated our intention in these words: "We, therefore, the representatives of the United States of America, in general congress assembled, appealing to the Supreme Judge of the World for the rectitude of our intentions do, in the name and by the authority of the good people of these colonies, solemnly publish and declare that these united colonies are, and of right ought to be, free and independent states; that they are absolved from all allegiance to the British crown, and that all political connection between them and the state of Great Britain is, and ought to be, totally dissolved; and that as free and independent states they have full power to levy war, conclude peace, contract alliances, establish commerce, and to do all other acts and things which independent states may of right do."

Before drafting the Declaration of Independence and listing the grievances that led them to do so, our Founding Fathers justified their action in these words: "We hold these truths to be self-evident: That all men are created equal; that they are endowed by their Creator with certain inalienable rights; that among these are life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness. That, to secure these rights, governments are instituted among men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed; that, whenever any form of government becomes destructive of these ends, it is the right of the people to alter or abolish it, and to institute a new government, laying its foundation on such principles, and organizing its powers in such form, as to them shall seem most likely to effect their safety and happiness."

And—
After stating their intention to throw off their allegiance to the British crown, and justifying their reasons for so doing, and listing the grievances that led them to do what they were doing, our Founding Fathers closed their Declaration with this ringing statement of purpose: "And for the support of this declaration, with a firm reliance on the protection of Divine Providence, we mutually pledge to each other our lives, our fortunes, and our sacred honor."

Well—
Those ancestors of ours meant what they said.
Our Revolutionary War lasted a little better than seven years. It cost a lot of our lives. It cost most of our fortunes. But it kept unstained the sacred honor of our forefathers.
The final result of it was the founding of the nation that is now the greatest on earth.

We of today have our problems. For the first time in our history, we are threatened by a mighty power whose purpose is to DESTROY US.
But—
If we tackle the problem of communist domination of the world in the spirit in which our Founding Fathers tackled the problem of the founding of our nation—
If we pledge to it our lives—
If we pledge to it our fortunes—
If we pledge to it our sacred honor—
We'll be able to handle it.

Fruit Growers Income
Up For 1960 Season

WASHINGTON (AP)—Fruit growers got 10 per cent more income from sales of 1960 crop apples than from the 1959 crop. The 1960 marketing season is drawing to a close.
The Agriculture Department reported Friday growers received \$233 million from sale of 1960 apples compared with \$210 million for the previous year's production.
It was a case where a smaller crop brought a larger return than a bigger crop. The 1959 commercial crop was about 127 million bushels compared with 109 million for last year's crop. Prices for the two years averaged \$1.71 a bushel for the larger crop and \$2.20 for the smaller.

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GENEROUS ATTITUDE

A good many leaders in the lumber industry feel that the industry is receiving what they call a "dirty deal" in the field of foreign commerce.

The United States has been seeking to build trade abroad. It has sought a better balance between exports and imports. To achieve this favorable balance, timbermen declare, the timber industry is being sacrificed as a means of retaining a high level of production in steel and other manufacturing industries in more densely populated areas—areas where votes are concentrated.

But, looking at the other side of the coin, we read of the automobile industry violently objecting to the importation of foreign made cars.

Thus we have the strange picture of industry demanding protective tariffs from a political party advocating free trade, yet staying in power on the strength of votes from men and women dependent on industry for jobs. Workers constantly are seeking wage increases and demand more and more money for the work of their hands, while voting for liberal philosophies that deny tariff protections.

At the same time we find industry moving production out of this country and into foreign areas where cheaper manufacturing is possible.

Logs To Japan

One of the current complaints from leaders in the lumber industry surrounds the shipment of logs to Japan from the Pacific Northwest.

Japan has become a major purchaser in the log market. It is paying much more for logs than local mills can afford to pay. Japanese mills can pay more for raw material because they pay low wages to sawmill workers.

However, as was recently pointed out by the *Demo-crat-Herald* in Albany, the Japanese could buy lumber in the United States cheaper than they could pay transportation cost on bark and waste contained in logs.

But the fact remains that Japan must furnish employment to its people. It isn't shipping lumber to us. It is in the midst of a housing boom and is consuming most of its own lumber production. We do get from Japan, it is true, some hardwood plyboards—and that constitutes reason for another "beef" from the industry.

Japan, however, is one of the best customers the United States has. In order to have money with which to buy American made goods, for which Japan now is spending some one and one-half billion dollars per year (with promises that the amount will be doubled in ten years) the Japanese people must have jobs. So they look to the Pacific Northwest for the materials needed to supply sawmill jobs.

Diversification Hit

Leaders in the industry point out that we sacrificed our lumber industry to Canada several years ago to improve Canadian economy. We succeeded so well that the Canadian dollar went ahead of the United States' dollar.

Domestic policies discouraged housing starts. Should the lumber industry, they ask, be compelled to bear the full brunt of improving the economy of friendly nations? Shouldn't the industry be given an opportunity to get back on its feet? How can it continue in a competitive market—its expenses continually increasing—when Japan and Canada, for example, can invade our markets, one with a higher price for raw material and the other with a lower price for finished goods?

They point out, too, that determination of national leaders to build trade with other countries at the expense of the lumber industry is hurting needed diversification.

During the last war, for example, the federal government demonstrated that commercial alcohol can be made at a low cost from wood waste—waste now going through burners. Yet, only a few days ago, news releases told how the United States was nullifying a contract to buy some \$75 million worth of commercial alcohol made from Cuban sugar cane. The country also buys commercial alcohol from France. If the wood industry was encouraged to supply the country's need for commercial alcohol, our neighboring countries wouldn't be getting U.S. dollars with which to buy our goods. However, we'd have more jobs at home.

Indications are that some of our lumber mills in the Pacific Northwest will be forced to close and people will be thrown out of work because Japan's purchase of logs in the area will amount to nearly a billion feet this year. Naturally the man who finds his business failing because of the national policy of promoting foreign trade isn't apt to be too happy with the nation's generous attitude.

Total Employment Up 1.9 Million,
But Unemployment Gains, Too

WASHINGTON (AP)—Employment rose to a record high in June, but because of a great surge of teen-agers into the labor market unemployment also increased sharply.

The Labor Department reported here that total employment rose

New Dairymen's Union
Formed By Teamsters

SALEM (AP)—Organization of milk producers in the Salem area into a bargaining union affiliated with the Teamsters Union has been started.

Bob Wagner, Canby dairy farmer and secretary-treasurer of the newly-chartered Milk Producers Union, Local 267, said he is contacting representative dairy operators.

He said he anticipates these contacts will result in informational and organizational meetings of milk producers in the area.

Wagner and Harold Otta, another Canby dairy farmer and recording secretary of the new union, said about 50 producers have been signed up in the Portland area and that temporary officers have been elected.

"Neither the union nor the Teamsters want to run dairy farms," said Wagner. "This is a program to organize all dairy operators and milk producers into an effective body to bargain for fair prices with distributors and others."

by 1.9 million to 68.7 million from mid-May to mid-June. The latter figure was a few thousand larger than the previous employment records set in June and July of 1960.

Unemployment increased by 800,000 to 5.6 million. The department said this was about the expected increase for this time of year.

It is possible for employment and joblessness to increase simultaneously because of changes in the total number of persons in the labor force. This force is defined as persons at work plus persons looking for work.

The outpouring of youngsters from schools hunting temporary or permanent jobs is an annual problem in the job market—but it is greater than ever this year.

In June, a total of 2,498,000 persons aged 14 to 19 left school either temporarily or permanently and started looking for work. Of this total, 900,000 were listed as jobless in mid-June, a figure larger than in any other postwar year.

However, the Labor Department stressed that there was a 500,000 increase in the employment of adult men, a better-than-seasonal pickup.

This was partly offset by a 200,000 drop in employment of adult women, mostly school-leavers.

In telling of the rise in total employment to 68.7 million, the department said:

"There were unusually large gains in both the farm and non-farm sectors."
