Rick Wins
Another thing to warm Brave hearts was Fred Rick's 6-1 victory over Eugene Friday night. Rick, a 20-game winner for the Braves last season, had lost five straight. Wenatchee, tied with the Braves for second place, downed Salem 7-6 on the power of Pete DeSylva's three-run homer. Bob Delgado cracked two runs in Lewiston's 7-1 win over Yakima.

DeSylva's homer capped the Wenatchee attack in the seventh. Salem rallied for two runs in the eighth and threatened to catch up with one more in the ninth, but Tony Balsamo, ace Chief reliever, put out the fire. It was Salem pitcher Terry Barber's second loss against eight wins.

Northwest Golf Tourney Slated

SEATTLE (AP) — The Pacific Northwest's biggest and oldest annual golf tournament—the PNGA—will open Monday on three Seattle courses with an entry list of 337.

The 60th tourney of the Pacific Northwest Golf Association has 181 men listed to play at Overlake, 121 women at the Glendale course and 35 girls at Inglewood.

The women's contingent includes a formidable quartet of present and former national amateur champions. These are Judy Hoetner of Seattle, who won the crown this year, and past champions JoAnne Gunderson and Mrs. Anne Quast Decker of Seattle and Mrs. Pat Lesser Harbottle of Tacoma.

Challengers Noted
Among the outstanding challengers are Mrs. Edean Anderson of Blainfield of Seattle and Miss Linda Anderson of Olympia. Miss Hoetner is the defending PNGA titlist.

Men's champion Ron Wiley of Vancouver, B.C., has turned pro, leaving the field open for a new amateur king.

Candidates for the crown which has been held by such well known figures as George Von Elm, Bud Ward and Rep. Jack Westland are numerous former champions.

They include Harry Givan of Seattle, four-time winner; Ken Storey of Seattle, who played out of Spokane when he won in 1934; and Glen Sheriff and George Holland of Seattle.

Both men and women will have 36 holes of medal play over the first two days, qualifying 32 men and 16 women for the match play eliminations. Friday the women semi-finalists move to the Overlake links for 18-hole matches while the men are competing in a 36-hole semi-final.

The championship rounds Saturday will be 36 holes.

The girls' tourney opens with 18 holes of qualifying Monday. Match play will run through Friday to provide a champion.

Harvard Crew Falls At Henley

HENLEY-ON-THAMES, England (AP) — Harvard's Eliot House eight was eliminated from the Royal Henley Challenge Cup competition today but the South Kent four without coxswain from Connecticut won its semifinal heat and entered today's final.

Eliot House, seeking a fourth straight championship for a Harvard crew in this classification, was beaten a third of a length by the University of London eight.

The Londoners trailed most of the way but spurred at the finish and moved the mile and 550 yards in 7 minutes, 3 seconds.

The South Kent four, competing this year without a coxswain for the first time, had it easy in its semifinal heat of the Wyfold Challenge Cup event and loafed to victory.

The New England foursome defeated the Thames Tradesmen's Rowing Club by four lengths in 7:49. The Americans will race the National Provincial Bank Rowing Club of Britain for the title.

Mackenzie Wins

In the first championship decided, Australia's famed Stuart A. Mackenzie, 24, won the singles event. It was the fifth straight diamond sculls for the Australian chicken farmer. It also was the first time in this century one man had won the title five years in a row.

Mackenzie defeated Oleg Tipirin of Leningrad in a 3-4, a slow time but considered good in today's blustery weather.

Detroit Dropped To Second Spot By Rampaging Los Angeles Club

It's one heckuva parlay, but the New York Yankees are back on top in the American League race because the Los Angeles Angels have cast off their castoff label with a seven-game winning streak—and what might have been a record home run spurge.

Those fallen Angels, on the rise out of the deepest cellar the AL ever has had, dropped the Tigers more ways than one Friday night knocking them off 4-2 on Steve Biko's tie-breaking home run in the eighth inning and spilling Detroit to second place.

Biko's shot, off Terry Fox, the Tigers' previously unbeaten relief ace, and a ninth-inning home run by Earl Averill gave the Angels 27 homers in 15 consecutive games. That had been the record AL total from 1941 until last month—when the Yankees bettered their 20-year-old mark by crashing 29 in 15 games.

Spring Chinooks Running Heavy At Winchester Dam

Almost 300 more spring chinook adults went through the counter at the Winchester Dam counting station on the North Umpqua in the last two weeks of June.

The 293 counted raised the total for the year to 4,432, the biggest figure since the record year of 1956 when 7,881 were counted.

By this date last year, about 90 per cent of the run had been counted for the year.

Meanwhile the highest figure for the June 30 date was noted for spring chinook jacks, as well. A total 399 had been counted, which was the highest number in the last three years by the end of June.

The summer steelhead run was just getting well under way. A total 117 were counted in the last two weeks of June to raise the total so far to 293.

of their own Friday night, clobbering the Boston Red Sox 14-3 on 16 hits for their third straight success.

Baltimore took two from Kansas City, 6-2 and 5-0, and gained a tie for third place with the Cleveland Indians, who walloped the Chicago White Sox 9-0. Washington defeated Minnesota 3-0.

In the National League, Cincinnati's lead bulged to five games when the Reds swept a two-night doubleheader from the second place Los Angeles Dodgers 11-7 and 4-1. St. Louis beat San Francisco 3-2. Pittsburgh moved within a half game of third place with a 6-5 victory at Milwaukee and the Chicago Cubs thumped Philadelphia 8-3.

Right-hander Ken McBride (8-5) won his third in a row with a seven-hit job on the Tigers. Elston Howard drove in four runs, three with his third home run in two games, and Bobby Richardson and Roger Maris each knocked in three runs for the Yanks. Bud Daley (7-10), the former Kansas City southpaw, was the winner. He gave up eight hits—one a seventh-inning homer by Jim Pagliaroni for the first run off Yankee pitchers in 25 innings. Gene Conley (3-7) was the loser.

First Gentile, the Orioles' ailing first baseman, broke up a 2-2 tie in the opener with a pinch-hit grand slam home run in the sixth inning off Ed Rakow (1-4). It was his fourth slam of the season, tying the AL record held by Babe Ruth, Lou Gehrig, Rudy York, Tommy Henrich, Al Rosen and Ray Boone. Chuck Estrada (7-5) was the winner.

Skinny Brown (7-3) then shut out the A's on four hits in the second game. Doubles by Jerry Adair and Brooks Robinson triggered a two-run third inning that beat Jim Archer (6-4).

The Indians scored their first run in 24 innings on a pair of singles and a sacrifice fly in the first inning against Ray Herbert (6-8). Barry Latman won his eighth without defeat.

Rookie Joe McClain (7-7) gave the Senators' staff its second straight shutout. Pedro Ramos (5-10) was the loser.

Gentile's Big Blast 4th Grand Slammer

BALTIMORE (AP)—Jim Gentile has added a lop-sided baseball to his trophy collection.

The ball was retrieved from a bleacher fan Friday night after the Baltimore first baseman mashed it out of shape on his record-tying fourth grand slam home run of the season.

The pinch-hit, 460-foot homer put him into the record book with six other American League players who hit four grand slams in one season—Babe Ruth, Lou Gehrig, Rudy York, Tom Henrich, Al Rosen and Ray Boone. The major league record of five is held by Ernie Banks of the Chicago Cubs.

Gentile came to bat with one out in the sixth inning of the two-night opener and the score tied 2-2. His clout gave the Orioles a 6-2 win.

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
