Package Houses Due For Farms

MOSCOW, Idaho (AP)—A farmer will one day be able to order a package house of a specified size with selected equipment to be delivered on a certain date for a guaranteed price.

That is what Marvin Pratt, Tacoma, Wash., assistant products application manager for Weyerhaeuser Co., told a package plan building session at the University of Idaho. The 30 Western representatives are meeting on the campus through Thursday to approve farm building and home plans suitable for construction in the region.

"The package concept of building is here to stay and will no doubt increase its scope to include the farm house," Pratt said.

"The package construction will bring entire walls to the building site, including insulation, wiring, plumbing and heating. Openings will be cut into the walls. Wall material and partition material may be manufactured 'by the mile' so that a person can buy 200 feet of outside wall and 600 feet of partition."

Package farm homes will have to be of practical design from the viewpoint of the housewife," Pratt said.
