Newly elected Oregon Commander of The American Legion Charles R. Draper today said that the formation of an Anti-Subversive Activities Committee under the direction of the Legion's Division "is a moral backdrop to, and not a usurpation of functions of responsible government agencies."

Heralding the Supreme Court's recent decision requiring the Communist Party to register its membership, the Oregon Legion chief said "this comes as a matter of satisfaction to Americans concerned for many years with the threat of free institutions posed by the Communist conspiracy."

Fate Of Navy Base Subject Of Meeting

The future of the Tongue Point Naval Base near Astoria — which the Navy plans to close — will be discussed at a meeting at Tongue Point next month.

Sen. Wayne Morse, D-Ore., said representatives of federal agencies will get together to see if some use can be found for the base — possibly as a site for industry, for an educational institution, or for state or local government.

Aug. 31 has been tentatively set as the date for the meeting. Among the agencies to be represented, Morse said will be the departments of Defense, Navy, Commerce, Labor, Health, Education and Welfare, Interior, Small Business Administration, General Service Administration, Civil Service Commission and Housing and Home Finance Agency.

County Gets Share Of Trailer Funds

Douglas County received \$18,384 as its share of the \$761,000 distributed recently in 1960 by the Oregon Counties under the new trailer house tax law, the Motor Vehicle Department said this week.

This distribution was the second made under the law and brought total county proceeds to more than \$1 million.

The new law became effective in January 1960, requiring the department to collect a six-dollar registration fee and a tax to be passed on to the counties. The fee for the tax is 2 per cent of present market value of the trailer. The new law replaced the county assessed property taxes on trailers.

Douglas County ranked fifth in the state with its sum of \$48,204.14. Multnomah County received \$122,472.61; Lane, \$97,171.61; Jackson, \$82,068.31; and Clackamas, \$51,684.75.

Well-Driller Killed In Freak Accident

LEBANON, Ore. (AP) — A Lebanon man was electrocuted Tuesday in a freak well-drilling accident here.

Dead is Custer S. Knurowski, 38.

Fire Chief Paul Robertson and Lebanon sheriff's office investigators theorized the accident happened this way:

Knurowski placed 10 sticks of dynamite in a hole while helping a neighbor, James R. Winn, dig a well. He strung the fuse wires to a detonating device a safe distance away and set off the charge. The blast blew the fuse wires against an overhead power line carrying 11,000 volts.

The power surged through the fuse wire and electrocuted him. A machinist at Oregon Metalurgical Corp., Albany, Knurowski leaves a widow and four children.

Medfordite Dies After Auto Crash

MEDFORD (AP) — Medford police today classified the death of George Raymond Bickel, 71, as a traffic fatality.

He died Monday after being injured in a three-car collision in downtown Medford. At first physicians were uncertain as to whether death was due to the injuries or to a later heart attack.

No one else was hurt in the crash.

Bickel was Oregon's 251st traffic victim this year in the Associated Press tabulation. Thirteen have perished so far this month.

Court To Name Counsel For Accused Murderer

PORTLAND (AP) — A lawyer to defend Richard L. Marquette on a first degree murder charge will be appointed by Circuit Judge Charles W. Redding.

Marquette told the court Tuesday that he had been unable to raise money for a lawyer.

Marquette is accused of the slaying of Mrs. Joan Caudle of Portland. He is to enter a plea next Tuesday.
