

Administration's Farm Officials Claim Success For Grain Program

WASHINGTON (AP) — Administration farm officials claimed success for their emergency feed grain program Wednesday on the basis of an official forecast that production of corn this year will be down 18 per cent from last year.

The program — which is designed to reduce surpluses of feed grains — offers payments expected to total \$750 million and higher price supports to farmers who cut corn and sorghum grain acreages at least 20 per cent.

The forecast of this reduction in corn harvested as grain was made in an Agriculture Department report which also predicted that a steady climb in crop output of recent years has been brought to a halt. The report forecast the crop volume will be down 8 per cent from last year's record.

COQUILLE (AP) — A 6-foot, 200-pound truck driver has been sentenced Tuesday to four years in the Oregon State Penitentiary for beating a three-year-old boy.

Charles Vernon Smith, a New York truck driver, pleaded guilty to a charge of assault and battery and was sentenced in circuit court by Judge Dal King.

Richard Michael Gildow, 3, who was beaten June 27 at North Bend, entered the hospital in critical condition and is still there. His condition is now good.

The beating occurred when the boy awakened and began whimpering for his mother, Smith told police.

The boy is the son of Mrs. Barbara Jean Gildow, who came to Coos Bay from Seattle last month to look for work.
