

House Republicans Promise Fight Against Hanford Nuclear Reactor

WASHINGTON (AP) — House Republicans promise an all-out fight against an administration proposal to produce electric power at the Hanford, Wash., nuclear reactor.

The House Republican Policy Committee Tuesday announced its formal opposition to generation of electric power in competition with private utilities at the reactor under construction for production of nuclear explosives.

The plan is included in the Atomic Energy Commission's \$564.9 million authorization measure for new construction and increases for previously approved projects.

The House Republicans did not indicate opposition to any other item in the bill, reported out June 12 by House members of the joint atomic committee.

The measure also includes authorization for a \$114 million research accelerator at Stanford University that will stretch out two miles and produce up to 20 billion electron volts.

Five Republican members of the 18-man House atomic group contended producing electric power at the Hanford plant was a move to produce highly subsidized power and lure industry to the Northwest already has enough electric power.

The majority of the atomic committee agreed with the AEC that the tremendous heat generated in weapons production at Hanford should be used for something other than warming the Columbia River.

Government experts said dual purpose operations could lower the cost of weapons plutonium as much as 20 or 40 per cent, through sale of electricity to the Bonneville Power Administration.

Supporters also noted that the 800,000 kilowatt output of the Hanford project would make it the biggest electric generating reactor in the world with about eight times the capacity of the largest announced Russian nuclear power plant.

Policeman Files Suit After Assault By Lady

LOS ANGELES (AP) — A 114-pound woman who put up a fuss when stopped by a policeman was fined for \$25,000 damages by the 180-pound officer on grounds she assaulted him without provocation.

Germoe J. Faust, 35, filed the civil suit Tuesday against Shirley Lowrey, 31.

She "assaulted, grabbed, wrestled, twisted and yanked" him after he gave her a ticket last Feb. 22 for a red light violation, his complaint said. Five patrol cars and a motorcycle officer arrived to reinforce him, he said, and he suffered a dislocated finger on his left hand.

She was fined \$100 in May for resisting arrest.

The Northeast Command includes airbases in Greenland, Iceland, Newfoundland and Labrador.

'My Fair Lady' Sets Run Record

NEW YORK (AP) — "My Fair Lady" is Broadway's new long-run musical champion.

The show racked up its 2,213th performance at today's matinee, breaking the mark set in 1948 by "Oklahoma!"

One more peak remains to be scaled by the Frederick Loewe-Alan Jay Lerner show: The international musical record of 2,238 performances, set by "Chu Chin Chow" in London in 1916. That mark will be reached by "My Fair Lady" on Aug. 2.

Since opening March 15, 1956 at the Mark Hellinger Theater, the musical has grossed 18 million dollars and earned a profit of 8 million on its \$403,000 investment.
