New Forest Camp Opened To Public

U. S. Plywood Develops Cavitt Creek Picnic Site

Cavitt Creek, which flows into Little River about five miles upstream from the Little River-North Umpqua Highway junction near Glide, is the scene of a new forest picnic area, open for public use.

But unlike most forest parks, this site has been prepared and developed by private enterprise for public purposes, rather than by a county, state or federal agency.

United States Plywood Co. has developed the area on property it owns on Cavitt Creek about half a mile from the bridge crossing Little River at the Little River Store, and about 25 miles from Roseburg.

As a starter, six picnic sites have been established. Unique is the fact that a popular new concept in outdoor living has been put into fullest use. This is use of charcoal barbecues, and the only fires that will be permitted in the area must be in these.

Care of the camp will present somewhat of a problem, as the company cannot spare a man for regular cleanup purposes, so cooperation of the public in keeping the place clean is asked.

In view of the interest of many large timber companies in opening their lands to public use, a move is afoot to get legislation making it possible for counties to take over and maintain public parks developed by private companies, according to Moore and Hildenbrand.

World's Breast Stroke Record Broken In Tokyo Test By Ohioan

TOKYO (AP)—Chet Jastremski of Toledo, Ohio, bettered recognized world records in both the 100-meter and 200-meter breast stroke today.

The 20-year-old American swam the 100-meter in 1:10.7 during a qualifying heat at the Japan National Swim Championships a few hours after he had breast stroked 200 meters in 2:36.5.

The U.S. breast stroke sensation has clocked even better times at home this summer in both races. They are up for recognition as world records.

His 100-meter time of 1:10.7 was eight-tenths of a second faster than the listed world record established by Russia's W. Minshkin in 1957. Jastremski breast stroked the 100 meters in 1:09.8 earlier this month in America.

He clipped 2.9 seconds off the recognized world 200-meter breast stroke record, which Australia's Terry Gathercole set in 1958. Jastremski has a mark of 2:33.3 up for world recognition.

According to Moore, the park is experimental to determine public response and appreciation of such developments. There is no limit to the available area in this vicinity he said. The company has a large tract that could be developed over the years if there is justification.

The picnic site is located in a shaded area alongside Cavitt Creek east of the Cavitt Creek road. The picturesque stream has a sizable year-around flow. A quiet expanse of water, though not deep enough for swimming, provides a safe wading pool for children.

There is room in the immediate area, Moore points out to install additional picnic sites. A large cleared area near by is to be prepared for playing baseball and other sports. It is intended that use can be found for clubs, groups or organizations.

"It's strictly up to public use and their care of the park, as to the extent of development," he said.

A sign will be placed at the turn-off.

Reds Keep Slight NL Edge

There was nothing wrong with the Cincinnati Reds that a trip to Milwaukee wouldn't cure. The only trouble is, the Reds are fresh out of trips to Milwaukee.

In their final game of the season at County Stadium, where they won nine of 11 starts, the Reds jolted a game loose from the Braves in the ninth inning. Vada Pinson, breaking from third base with the bases loaded, knocked the ball out of catcher Sammy White's glove Thursday for a 2-1 victory.

Dodgers Win

As a result of that triumph, Cincinnati still holds a one-game edge on the Los Angeles Dodgers who thumped Philadelphia 11-6 with an 18-hit attack.

San Francisco's Juan Marichal blanked Pittsburgh on five hits 2-0, the 10th shutout for the defending National League champions. Chicago knocked off St. Louis again 3-2, using the same combination that won the day before, pinch hitter Bob Will and relief pitcher Barney Schultz.

Reds Hold Edge

In the American League, the New York Yankees strengthened their lead over idle Detroit to one full game by stopping a ninth-inning Chicago rally for a 4-3 victory. Baltimore scored six in the seventh and beat Boston 8-5. Minnesota trimmed Washington 5-2 on Don Lee's four-hitter and Kansas City shaded Cleveland 2-1 on Bobby Del Greco's homer.

The season series between the Reds and Braves now stands 14-7 in favor of Cincinnati with only one game to go. That will be played Sept. 13 at Cincinnati where the Reds and Braves are 5-5 for the year.

The speedy Pinson was the difference in Thursday's game. Bob Purkey claimed victory No. 13 with a five-hit complete game. The Dodgers had a real hit carnival at Philadelphia, although Manager Walter Alston had to use four pitchers to bail himself out. Roger Craig, third on the line,

was the winner. The veteran Gil Hodges came through with a three-run homer in the fifth which put four more in the eighth rapped it up.

Marichal struck out eight Pirates and walked only three in squaring his season record at 7-7. Vinegar Bend Mizell, losing his seventh straight, gave up both Giants runs.

Maris And Mantle Concede Ruth Record Within Sight

NEW YORK (AP)—Both Roger Maris and Mickey Mantle concede they have a chance of bettering Babe Ruth's home run record of 60. Each thinks the other is in a better position to do it this year.

But Maris has to beat the injury jinx first. He had to pull out of Thursday night's game with the Chicago White Sox after lacing a pulled muscle in his left leg when he slid into second with his run-scoring double in the third inning. The Yanks scored twice in the third to clinch their 4-2 win.

Play Possible

"I think I'll be able to play against Baltimore tonight," he said.

Mantle didn't get a homer, either, so Maris still leads in the homer derby with 40 to Mantle's 39. Maris is 22 games ahead of Ruth's record pace. Mantle is 29 games ahead of the Babe.

"The important thing for me is to stay healthy," said Maris. "I think this leg will be okay. In the past few years I was out with rib injuries twice and then had an appendicitis operation just when I was going good."

Why does Roger think Mickey has a better chance at the record? "For one thing, Mickey is a switch-hitter," said Maris, a left-handed batter. "There are certain left-handed pitchers who give me plenty of trouble. Mickey can turn around against them. Then, Mickey has more experience. He's been
