The meat of President Kennedy's speech on Berlin:
"The West has clear legal rights to defend Berlin — and the city is vital to the morale and security of Western Europe, the unity of the entire free world."
"We do not want to fight. But we have fought before. We CAN NOT and WILL NOT permit the communists to drive us out of Berlin, either gradually or by force."

Our President says we have CLEAR LEGAL RIGHTS in Berlin. In that statement his will is within the facts. In the Berlin settlement back in 1945, we gave the Russians half of the city, although we could have taken ALL of it. The Germans were pleading with us to get Berlin before the Russians did, so that they could surrender to us.
We held back and let the Russians get there first, thus honoring agreements previously made. The Russians solemnly agreed to the settlement, pledging their faith to carry it out.

If such agreements are to be regarded as scraps of paper, what is the use of making any MORE agreements? We may as well stand pat and fight it out now. That's about the long and short of it.

If we back off now from our clear legal rights in Berlin, it will be APPEASEMENT.

The Russians themselves have a legend illustrating the fatal consequences of appeasement. The legend concerns a Russian family traveling in mid-winter through the snowy forest. They were pursued by wolves. The wolves were GAINING on them.

In an effort to APPEASE the ravaging beasts, the family THREW OUT A CHILD. The reasoning was that it was better to sacrifice ONE child and save the rest. The hope was that while the wolves were devouring the child the rest of the family could get away.

It didn't work. The wolves devoured the child, and then took up the chase again. They gained on the drowsy. The family threw out ANOTHER child. And so on. The tragic end of it all was that the wolves overtook the drowsy and ate the whole family.

That's about the way it will be with us if we throw Berlin to the Russians.

Our big job is to convince the communists that we MEAN BUSINESS.

Old Kroosh is said to believe we are a LOGICAL people. As a logical person, he is said to think, we will reason that Berlin isn't worth going to war about.

He's wrong.
We aren't a logical people. When it comes to war, we never have been logical. We weren't logical when our 13 original colonies went to war with Mighty Britain to gain our independence. We weren't logical when, before the infant United States of America was five years old, we went to war with the Barbary pirate states to put an end to an evil that all the great nations of the world had been logically submitting to rather than go to war about it. We never have been logical about our wars.

Old Kroosh would do well to study his history a little more carefully before starting a war in Berlin.

Fishing Boat Crew
Greets Red Trawler

NEW BEDFORD, Mass. (AP) — The 11-man crew of a New Bedford fishing trawler exchanged candy and cigarettes with a Soviet trawler on Georges Banks, they reported Wednesday.
Capt. Irving S. Hoffman — while newspapers were filled with President Kennedy's TV talk about the Soviet efforts to force the West out of Berlin — said the two vessels were alongside each other for 15 minutes.
He said the Russians, in a good-will gesture, threw candy, herring and Soviet cigarettes aboard the New Bedford vessel and received American cigarettes in return.
Capt. Hoffman described the Russian cigarettes as three-quarters filter with about an inch of tobacco. He added they were mild and, to a point, tasteless.
The crews exchanged farewells before the Soviet trawler, her decks covered with herring and salt barrels, chugged off to continue fishing.

UNIQUE AREA

A message from Sen. Maurine Neuberger to county courts of Lane, Coos and Douglas counties meeting in Roseburg a few days ago contained an interesting and highly descriptive phrase. It sums up something I have said in this column many times, though I couched the idea in other words.

Mrs. Neuberger described the area proposed in her bill for development as a seashore park under control of the National Park Service as "unique to the North American continent."

Although Sen. Neuberger and I can find many points of disagreement, we certainly are of the same mind relative to the "unique" position of this central section of the Oregon coast.

Time and again I have stated that in my opinion this section of Oregon's coast is destined to become a nationally-known playground; that it will attract tourists from all parts of the country.

Where else will you find fresh-water lakes, turbulent rivers, open bays, coastal fishing banks, surf fishing sites and paved access highways all in such a small area.

Name Is Misnomer

The late Sen. Richard Neuberger, husband of our present senator, unfortunately gave the area the name "Sand Dunes."

Actually, the real dune area is further south. There will be found the deepest sand dunes in the world—three buried forests, one on top of the other.

But there is no place in the world, to my knowledge, where a person can find so many forms of recreation in such a small land area. In this respect, as Sen. Neuberger says, this area is "unique to the North American continent."

I have previously expressed the belief that the residents of the area will be making a very grave mistake if they do not take immediate steps to preserve what they have.

I have expressed the opinion that a national park in the area, building a "fence" around it, catering to the "wealthy" people, would be very damaging to private property.

But the damage, I contend, wouldn't begin to match the losses to be suffered by private property if future development is left uncontrolled.

It was my suggestion that anyone who doubts my word take a trip north from Florence. Forget, if you will, that you've been over the road earlier and that you are accustomed to what you will see. Try to look at what you see through the eyes of a tourist, viewing the localities for the first time.

Look at the dilapidated, run-down condition of many of the communities. Recall that some of the towns through which you pass once were very popular resorts, but have been permitted to become virtual eyesores.

Take a look at buildings once erected to draw trade and which, when trade failed, were left to fall into disrepair and dilapidation. Look at the need for paint. But, on the other hand, look how garish and glaring some places are and how they clash with adjacent higher grade accommodations.

Should Get Busy

If you'll make the trip I suggest, and view the things you see with the same vision you would have as a tourist, I have no question in my mind but that you will agree with me that the damage to property values in such a deteriorating atmosphere is even worse than the loss to be anticipated from being taken into a "fenced-off" national park.

It is understandable that a good many people object to zoning. Many property owners—the majority of them in unorganized territory, in fact—want absolutely no controls. But I feel that in a vast majority of situations such a sentiment is damaging. People who own property should be anxious to preserve values. They can't do it when there is no regulation over development.

Judge Harrison of Coos County, for example, tells how application has been made for 10 acres of land inside this proposed Sand Dunes park for a garbage dump. What's to stop garbage dumps, unsightly land uses, shack-type construction, garish display, in spots where development has no controls.

The Oregon coastal area is indeed "unique." I also agree with the Oregon Committee on Natural Resources that the "highest and best" use of the land is recreation. But, at the same time, private land has other uses. It shouldn't, in my opinion, be tied up to a recreational use only. Other uses should be permitted where no conflict exists.

But I am hoping that the residents themselves will realize that they should establish their own zoning district for their own protection and that they will "get busy," cooperating with the forthcoming study on zoning needs.

Groundwork Is Started
On Hells Canyon Dam

Preliminary work is under way on Hells Canyon dam — the last of three Idaho Power Co. projects on the Snake River.

Preliminary work includes an access road that will run some 23 miles from the Oxbow dam site through the canyon to the Hells Canyon site.

Another preliminary job will be putting up a bridge spanning the Snake, downstream from Oxbow. The 500-foot span someday will be linked to the public road systems of Idaho and Oregon.

Idaho Power Co. said Hells Canyon dam eventually will reach a height of 320 feet and will have a maximum generating capacity of 400,000 kilowatts.

Idaho Power President T. E. Roach said construction of Hells Canyon dam would be "one of the most challenging projects in dam-building history."

Trial Jury To Hear
Closing Arguments

SEATTLE (AP) — A jury of nine men and three women was expected to take the fate of Frederick Arthur Ferguson and Mrs. Thelma Ann Swenson in their hands Friday.

Closing arguments from both sides were slated for the 11th day of the first degree murder trial before the jury deliberates in King County Superior Court.

At the final special night session Thursday, Superior Judge Story Birdseye charged the jury to find Ferguson and Mrs. Swenson guilty or not guilty of the murder of Mrs. Mary Campbell, 39, a Kent, Wash., neighbor of both defendants.

Ferguson has admitted the March 8 slaying and has pleaded innocent and innocent by reason of mental irresponsibility. Mrs. Swenson, whom Ferguson blames for plotting the crime, also has pleaded innocent. She has denied all the charges made by 24-year-old Ferguson.

Mrs. Swenson, 26, completed her testimony at the night session. She denied making any answers but "Yes" and "No" to questions put to her by officers March 13, the day she and Ferguson met face to face for the first time after the slaying.

The state charges that Mrs. Swenson answered rather extensively questions regarding the crime. Sheriff Tim McCullough and two subordinate officers testified she had.

A tape recorder used during the March 13 questioning failed to function properly and testimony was lost.

Two points of discrepancy involve Mrs. Swenson's alleged denial of having been at a gas station with Ferguson the day of the murder and her denial that she drew a floor plan of the Campbell home to assist Ferguson in the killing.

Cuban Refugees Get
Armed Forces Okay

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Defense Department will accept Cuban refugees as volunteers in the U. S. armed forces, officials said Friday.

However, a Pentagon spokesman, in answering questions, emphasized the plan is not aimed at creating any special force for a new attempt by Cuban rebels to invade Cuba.

The plan is similar to that used after World War II when refugees from some European and other countries were accepted as volunteers in the American armed forces.

The spokesman said the plan for accepting volunteers is merely a part of an over-all program of aid for the Cuban refugees, primarily under direction of the Health, Education and Welfare Department.

It is intended to open one more avenue of assistance for destitute people who have fled Fidel Castro's communism.

The plan was disclosed earlier in the day by the Miami (Fla.) News. The paper said the Defense Department would announce in 24 to 48 hours a plan for taking some jobless Cuban refugees out of the crowded Miami area and that some of them might be permitted to join the army.

Cubans have besieged recruiting offices in Miami since President Kennedy announced a build-up in the armed forces. They have been turned away because they are not United States citizens.

TV Nets Charged
With Crime Excess

WASHINGTON (AP) — A television show producer said today the three major networks are responsible for what he considers excessive crime and violence on TV.

He testified the networks write letters asking for less violence, but make telephone calls urging "more sex, more violence, and blacker villains so we can kill them off in one big climax."

The witness, Maurice J. Unger, Hollywood manager for Ziv-United Artists, Inc., said there would be less crime and violence on TV shows seen by children if Congress "reduced the excessive power" of the three men who head the big networks.

He said the three have a stranglehold on programs and have "more power than the Constitution gives Congress or the Supreme Court."

He added that if the Senate Juvenile Delinquency subcommittee, headed by Sen. Thomas J. Dodd, D-Conn., want to improve shows, "it can convince the seven men on the Federal Communications Commission to curb the powers of the three men in the networks."

Unger and A. Frank Reel, vice president in charge of business affairs for Ziv-United Artists, testified at an inquiry into the effect of some TV programs on youngsters.

Scales Given

EUGENE (AP) — The University of Oregon's football coach Len Casanova is the top-paid man in the state educational system's athletic program at \$17,100.

The chancellor's office reported the salaries today in the wake of reports Thursday on the academic pay scale. It is believed to be the first time the information has ever been made public.

At Oregon State, Tom Prothro, football coach, leads the list with \$16,500. Veteran basketball coach Slats Gill draws \$13,250.

On the academic side, Thursday's report showed the minimum of the six college presidents to be \$17,500 and pay of academic deans ranging up to \$15,833.

On the athletic side, the state pays directly only a part — often small — of coaches' salaries. The athletic departments pay most from their own funds.

This is the report from the chancellor's office showing sources of funds as well as the number of months each works:

University of Oregon
Athletic Director Leo Harris, \$16,000; \$695 by state, \$15,305 by department.

Football Coach Len Casanova, \$17,100; \$3,050 by state, \$14,050 by department; 12 months.

Track Coach Bill Bowerman, \$11,500; \$5,225 by state, \$6,275 by department; 10 months.

Baseball Coach Don Kirsch, \$10,244; \$4,579 by state, \$5,665 by department; 12 months.

Basketball Coach Steve Belko, \$10,808; \$4,144 by state, \$6,664 by department.

Athletic Director R. S. Keene, \$14,000; \$2,930 by state, \$11,070 by department; 12 months.

Basketball Coach Slats Gill, \$13,250; \$2,275 by state, \$10,975 by department; 12 months.

Football Coach Tom Prothro, \$16,500; \$3,465 by state, \$13,035 by department; 12 months.

Track Coach Sam Bell, \$7,730, all from department; 12 months.

Baseball Coach Ralph Coleman, \$12,900; \$9,875 by state, \$3,025 by department; 10 months.
