

US Spending To Be Upped \$10 Billion

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Kennedy, in his first six months in office, has advanced concrete proposals for increasing federal spending by well over \$10 billion.

Actually, the eventual spending boost would be even greater under the administration's new and expanded programs. However, \$10 billion represents the amount of added spending authority which Kennedy wants Congress to provide at this time.

Of the total amount, \$6,510,000,000 would be spent during the 1962 fiscal year which began July 1. The rest would be spread over several years.

In the light of administration programs announced to date, observers expect the fiscal 1963 spending budget to approach \$80 billion.

The 1963 budget would be \$87,723,000,000 now officially forecast for the current fiscal year.

Although the current-year budget deficit will total at least \$5-200,000,000, administration officials are hopeful of balancing the budget next year, Kennedy has warned he will ask Congress for a tax increase, if necessary, to achieve a budget "strictly in balance."

Secretary of the Treasury Douglas Dillon said recently that if the economy moves ahead as he expects, "our revenues for fiscal 1963 would be adequate to meet all of our national needs, with something left over."

That was before Kennedy's \$3-454,000,000 proposal for the build-up for Berlin, but the administration argues that, while programming major spending increases it is pursuing a course of fiscal responsibility with balanced budgets in sight. Critics contend that deficits are the more likely prospect.

The strongest clue to the rising trend in federal spending comes from an analysis of this year's requests to Congress for "new obligatory authority"—appropriations, authority to sign contracts, and authority for agencies to spend money borrowed from the Treasury.

Former President Dwight D. Eisenhower last January asked for \$80.9 billion in obligatory authority. Revisions and additions by Kennedy have boosted the total to \$91.4 billion.

Obligatory authority requests normally exceed spending estimates for any single year because they cover programs coming up in future years. If the Navy is to build an aircraft carrier, for example, obligatory authority might be provided in one chunk but the money would be spent over several years.

Kennedy contends that Eisenhower's request for obligatory authority fell \$86 million shy of the amount needed to finance existing programs. He has now added programs of his own calling for an extra \$10.4 billion in obligatory authority.

Kennedy has called for the following increases in obligatory authority to handle new and expanded programs:

National security, \$45.8 billion; commerce, housing and space, \$1.9 billion; labor and welfare, \$1.5 billion; agriculture, \$880 million; international affairs, \$360 million; natural resources, \$97 million; veterans affairs, \$65 million, and general government, \$24 million.

Kennedy Given Call-Up Right

WASHINGTON (AP)—Congress has given President Kennedy the authority he asked to call up to 250,000 reservists into military service and extend active duty tours and enlistments one year.

Final approval came only six days after Kennedy requested the military manpower buildup.

The House Monday passed 403 to 2 the emergency resolution authorizing the President to put a quarter-million ready reservists in uniform for one year, either as individuals or in units.

The resolution, approved earlier by the Senate 75-0, also authorizes extending training periods for the 2,440,000 members of the ready reserve.

The Defense Department matched pace with Congress in expediting the swift strengthening of U.S. armed forces Kennedy called for last Tuesday.

The Pentagon announced late Monday that four Air Force bases slated for deactivation, would remain on active status—McDill in Florida, Chennault in Louisiana, Donaldson in South Carolina and Laughlin in Texas.

This is necessary to provide facilities for continued operation of B47 jet bombers which had been slated to give way to later model aircraft.

The Navy plans to add 60 vessels to the fleet, mainly for transport and antisubmarine service.

Twenty new ships will be provided from the combatant ship-building program, many of them destroyer-type craft for antisubmarine work. A corresponding number of older destroyers will remain in service instead of going into mothballs.

Some 40 ships are expected to be recommissioned from the mothball fleet, 22 troop and cargo transports and 18 smaller craft for antisubmarine service.

In California, Brig. Gen. Robert D. Campbell said the 146th Air National Guard Transport Wing, which he commands, expects to be called to active duty this week.

He said the wing, based at Van Nuys, Calif., will be reinforced by planes from the 138th Air Transport Squadron, based at Tulsa, Okla.

Only Reps. Bruce Alger, R-Tex. and Eugene Siler, R-Ky., voted against the resolution giving Kennedy authority to call the reserves to active duty.

An appropriation to pay for the expanded forces will come later. It will provide \$3,454,000,000, including \$207.6 million to start a civil defense shelter program.

Far-Reaching YCC Bill Approved By Committee

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Senate Labor Committee today approved far-reaching bills to set up a 150,000-member Youth Conservation Corps and establish a GI education program for veterans serving since 1955.

The youth corps bill sent to the Senate floor far exceeded the recommendations of President Kennedy. His administration actively opposed the other measure, dubbed the "cold war veterans GI bill."

Both proposals were cleared by voice votes with strong support from Democrats on the committee. Republicans indicated solid opposition to the youth corps measure. Some GOP committee members also opposed the veterans bill.

The youth corps bill, sponsored by Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey, D-Minn., would create a corps 25 times the 6,000-member pilot project proposed by Kennedy.

Enrollees would work on projects sponsored by government conservation, park, forest and wildlife agencies similar to the tasks of the old Civilian Conservation Corps of the 1930s.

The veterans bill, sponsored by Sen. Ralph Yarborough, D-Tex., would give veterans discharged since Jan. 31, 1955, college education and other benefits similar to those received by World War II and Korean War servicemen.

The Veterans Administration, in opposing the legislation, said the education costs alone could exceed \$2 billion.

Huckleberry Crop Ripe In Mt. Hood Region

PORTLAND (AP)—The crop of wild huckleberries in the Mt. Hood National Forest is ripening early and good picking is expected this weekend.

The best areas, said U. S. Forest Service fire control officer Lynn Lathrop, are Hambone Springs, Squaw Mountain and the Shearer Burn south of Government Camp.

Test Flight Moves Atlas Step Ahead

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP)—A successful 5,000-mile test flight has moved an advanced Atlas missile nearer operational status and provided valuable information for designing atomic power units for space vehicles.

The improved Atlas "E" model Monday scored its second straight success, hitting a target area off Ascension Island.

The new Atlas, which is being developed for greater range and heavier payload than the present operational model is to be ready for deployment late this year. On its previous test firing, an "E" rocket streaked a record 9,950 miles.

The blazing re-entry heat of the Monday shot burned through a special container attached to the side. Brilliant yellow and violet flames erupted.

The capsule carrying the flares simulated nuclear fuel cores. Men and cameras on ships, in planes and on Ascension watched and recorded the flares and the ionization trails created by the disintegrating capsules.

A radio transmitter relayed heat information. Additional data was obtained from a 30-inch cylinder which parachuted from the nose cone and was recovered by the ocean range vessel Coastal Crusader. The packet contained instruments and a tape recorder to register temperatures and nose cone performance.

The experiment could reveal much about how an atomic space generator would burn up and its radioactive contents disperse on reentry into the earth's atmosphere.

The first atomic power device ever flown rode in a transit navigation satellite launched last month from Cape Canaveral. Officials said it was purposely over-designed to guarantee safety under any condition.

Georgia Election Officials Indicted

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Justice Department today announced the indictment of two election officials and 14 poll workers in Telfair County, Ga., on charges of casting and counting fraudulent ballots in last November's presidential election.

The indictment was returned by a federal grand jury in Savannah, Ga.

Atty. Gen. Robert F. Kennedy said the grand jury Monday also issued a resolution saying that the county's Board of Registrars and the deputy registrar failed to register voters properly or purge voter lists of ineligible names.

The first count, charging conspiracy against the rights of citizens, named 16 defendants. They included Judge Eli Wilcox, of the Court of Ordinary (a probate court), who was responsible for general supervision of the election; and Lewis B. Seay, clerk of the Telfair County Superior Court.

Fourteen pollholders, or poll workers, also were charged in that count, as well as a second count charging deprivation of rights.

Kennedy said the indictment charged that all the defendants conspired to cast and count and permit others "to cast and count forged, fraudulent and fictitious votes for presidential and vice presidential elections."

The second count charged the 14 pollholders with executing the conspiracy, by casting and counting the fictitious votes.

Weather Outlook Higher Than Norm

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Weather Bureau said Monday its 30-day outlook for August calls for temperatures to average above seasonal normals from the northern and central Rocky Mountain states westward to the Pacific Coast and also in the south-east.

Below normal temperatures are indicated in the northeast quarter of the nation and in the far southwest with near normal elsewhere, the bureau said.

Rainfall is expected to exceed normal in the northeast Ohio valley and lower lakes. Subnormal amounts are predicted for the southeast, southern plains and northern Rocky Mountain states. In areas not specified, near normal amounts are anticipated, the bureau added.

Portland Trade Center Holds Gala Anniversary

PORTLAND (AP)—Today is the first anniversary of Portland's big East Side shopping center, the Lloyd Center, but the official celebration started Monday.

Richard Horn, manager of the Lloyd Center, released 500 balloons filled with helium. Gift certificates for merchandise were contained in 350 of them.

The balloons rose promptly into the sky.

It was planned that they would descend eventually upon the city, but at the rate they were going when released, they may make it to points far distant.

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Basic Rule Fine Levied

Factory Work On Increase

WASHINGTON (AP)—Factory employment increased during June, but at a slower rate than in May, the Labor Department reported today.

Total hirings, which usually mount sharply in June, were reported at the rate of 40 per 1,000 workers, an increase of 3 per 1,000 over May.

The increase in new hirings about 6 per 1,000 over the month was reported about normal for this period and reflected the customary summer entry of students and graduates into the factory force.

The rate of recalling workers back to jobs dropped, however, especially in the industries which had previously been showing the sharpest recovery—primarily fabricated metals, machinery and electrical machinery.

Hirings were either down or up less than seasonally in a number of nondurable goods industries in which they normally rise, such as textiles, chemicals, petroleum, rubber and leather. But they rose more than seasonally in the building materials and home furnishings industries such as lumber, stone, clay and glass.

Layoffs dropped by 2 to 12 per 1,000 over the month while the number of workers quitting their jobs rose by the same amount to 10 per 1,000.

Total hirings and quitings for June were about the same as a year earlier but layoffs were 5 per 1,000 lower.

Indian Affairs Official Named

WASHINGTON (AP)—Former Lt. Gov. Philo Nash of Wisconsin, a member of Interior Secretary Stewart Udall's task force on Indian affairs, was named commissioner of Indian affairs by President Kennedy Monday.

Nash, 51, will succeed John O. Crow, acting commissioner who will remain with the Indian Bureau as deputy commissioner.

The commissioner's job pays \$18,500 a year, the deputy commissioner's \$15,226.

Nash, a native of Wisconsin Rapids, Wis., was a special assistant to former President Truman from 1940-53, specializing in Department of Interior matters. He was Wisconsin lieutenant governor from 1958-60.

Off-Shore Pollution Prevention Bill Slated

WASHINGTON (AP)—A bill aimed at preventing pollution of off-shore areas of the oceans by oily discharges was endorsed by the State Department Monday.

Ernest A. Lister, the department spokesman, testified before a Senate Commerce subcommittee in support of a bill to implement an international convention for prevention of pollution of the sea. The convention recently was approved by the Senate.

Under the international agreement the subscribing nations would prohibit pollution of off-shore waters out as far as 50 miles. Lister said discharge of oily substances from ships has resulted in foul beaches and in the killing of fish and birds.

New Bonneville Official Gets Administrator Job

Bruce Britt Sr., 40, of Smackover, Ark., was booked by Sheriff Larry Gillick on a charge of attempted murder.

The pilot, Capt. Oscar Cleal, 42, of Menlo Park, Calif., was shot in the head and stomach. His optic nerve was severed and he was blinded in both eyes. His condition was critical.

The ticket agent, Bill Hicks, 45, of Chico, was shot in the back. He too was in critical condition.

The story began with a short-wave radio account of a 120-mile an hour chase of a speeder who out-distanced highway patrolmen. It was Britt, racing 30 miles from Corning, Calif., 30 miles northwest of Chico, in an attempt to make the Pacific Airways DC3 south-bound flight in less than 30 minutes. He didn't have time to buy a ticket and he didn't have money for one. He hadn't stopped to draw his pay at a Corning construction job.

"I thought I could bluff my way," he said.

Britt raced for the plane with the ticket agent behind him. He got aboard but Hicks ordered him off.

Witnesses said Britt jerked a pistol out of his overnight bag, shot Hicks in the back, fired twice more, then ran into the pilot's compartment, put the gun to Capt. Cleal's head and yelled: "Take off, or I'll take over."

Cleal taxied the plane down the runway at slow speed.

Britt shouted: "Get this plane in the air."

Then he fired two shots into Cleal.

Copilot Allan Wheeler, 29, of Burlingame, Calif., grabbed the pistol. Britt came at him with a knife.

Puerto Rico, Hawaii Short Of Sugar Quota

WASHINGTON (AP)—Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman reported Monday Puerto Rico and Hawaii will fall short 476,275 tons in filling their 1961 quotas of sugar in the U.S. market.

To assure domestic consumers ample supplies, the secretary ordered the deficit reallocated to the domestic beet sugar and the mainland cane sugar areas. The beet area share was put at 43,297 tons and the cane area share at 44,778 tons.

This action raised the beet area quota for the year to 2,609,170 tons and the cane area to 719,090 tons.

The Puerto Rican deficit was reported at 290,865 tons, leaving that area's total quota for the year at 980,000 tons. The Hawaii deficit was reported at 185,410 tons, leaving that state's total quota for the year at 1,030,900 tons.

Drain Man Faces Count Of Larceny Of Cow

Charles Leroy Pitt, 22, Drain, has been booked at the Douglas County Jail to face a charge of larceny of a cow. He was arrested by Deputy Sheriff Bill Carsten on Monday, and is scheduled for arraignment in Drain Justice Court today.

Awaiting a preliminary hearing on the same charge is William Charles Smirl, also 22 and of Drain, who was arrested Friday.

According to Undersheriff Lydie Dickenson, they are alleged to have killed and dressed out a cow, meat from which was found in their car when officers were called to investigate an accident involving the car.

Common Market Set For Britain

PARIS (AP)—The six nations of the European Common Market agreed today to open negotiations with the British government for Britain's entry into the economic community.

The decision was made in a brief session of the foreign ministers of the six Common Market nations. They are in Paris for a quarterly meeting of the Western European Union (WEU), made up of the six and Britain.

Widespread praise in Britain and on the European continent greeted Prime Minister Harold Macmillan's historic announcement Monday that Britain would seek negotiations to join the continental economic group.

Most of Britain's national newspapers supported the government's move, but there were warnings that months of difficult negotiations would be necessary to get concessions that would safeguard British sovereignty and the economies of British Commonwealth countries dependent on the British market.

French President Charles de Gaulle, anxious to make France the leader of a united Europe, was seen as the chief opponent of such concessions. Political informants said Macmillan would fly to Paris soon to try to smooth Britain's entry into the continental group.

Most of Britain's partners in the seven-nation European Free Trade Association (EFTA) quickly indicated they would follow the British lead in seeking association or membership in the Common Market.

Denmark announced it would apply for membership. Austria declared its willingness to begin negotiations for a single European trading bloc. Sweden made a similar announcement. Norway's government indicated it favors joining the group, but said the decision is up to the Norwegian parliament.

Traditionally neutral Switzerland immediately expressed its distaste for the Common Market's developing drive toward political unity. President Fritz Wahlen said Switzerland "will under no circumstances make any concession with regard to its neutrality and sovereignty."

The seventh EFTA member, Portugal, said nothing.

The announcement by Macmillan caused alarm among the Commonwealth nations who fear British membership in the market would wreck the preferential system that gives special treatment to their exports to Britain.

Australian Prime Minister Robert G. Menzies said his government wants to present its own case in Macmillan's negotiations with the Common Market countries. He implied doubt Britain would push strongly enough in protecting Australian exports.

New Zealand Prime Minister Keith J. Holyoake said if Britain were to sign the EEC treaty as it now stands, the results for New Zealand would be disastrous.

The weather forecast calls for continued fair and warm, except along the coast where low clouds will prevail. The expected slightly higher temperatures will maintain fire danger throughout Oregon from high to very high.

EUGENE (AP)—Eugene's controversial May 11 election has been ruled valid by the Lane County Circuit Court.

A taxpayer, O. R. Bauman, had asked for an injunction to prevent the city from levying and collecting special tax levies authorized in the election.

Bauman said the city had not filed proper legal notice of the election.

Judges William Fort and Roland Rodman signed a decree denying Bauman's request. Judge Edward Levy dissented.

Bauman's attorney, Frank Reid, said he did not know whether the case would be appealed to the state Supreme Court.

Modern Ship Takes To Waves

SEATTLE, Wash. (AP)—Commander Dewey's historic command to Capt. Charles Gridley, "You may fire when ready, Gridley," was repeated in Seattle Monday night, and a modern ship of war was launched.

It was the \$25-million guided missile frigate USS Gridley. The 533-foot, 7,000-ton ship slid down the ways after a champagne christening by Capt. Gridley's great-granddaughter, Mrs. Stuart D. Rose, Burlington, Mass.

The trigger which launched the ship was released by Miss Lynn Beryl Gridley, Provo, Utah, a descendant of the captain's family. T. G. McCurdy, president of Puget Sound Bridge & Dry Dock Co., where the ship was built, gave the order:
