PCL President Defends Umpire

HONOLULU (AP) — Pacific Coast League president D. W. Sorianio says he is convinced that an umpire arrested here on charges of making a false bomb report is "an innocent victim of circumstances."

Sorianio made his statement in Seattle after a long distance telephone conversation with the umpire, John P. Tobin, 40, of Citrus Heights, Calif.

Tobin was arrested shortly after he and two other PCL umpires boarded a plane bound for Portland Sunday night. Police reported he caused a disturbance and mentioned a bomb might be aboard.

The 114 passengers were cleared from the plane and delayed about four hours while it was searched. No bomb was found.

Tobin admitted he had talked about the possibility of a bomb being on the plane, Sorianio said. "But it was just a joking remark tossed off in some light conversation carried on between Tobin and his fellow umpires."

Remark Heard
"The remark was heard by two lady passengers, who unquestionably misunderstood the intent of the conversation and consequently reported it to the flight captain."

Tobin's companions, umpires Bill Muller and Elmer Ammons, said Tobin jestingly remarked, "What if there's a bomb aboard?" as they boarded the plane.

Sorianio said Tobin, who worked the Vancouver-Hawii series last week, is in his third year as a PCL umpire and called him "one of our better men."

Tobin was freed on \$250 bail.

Riverside took both ends of a Pee Wee doubleheader Monday from North Roseburg (Winchester) by 8-7 and 5-4 scores, giving the 13-and-unders the league championship.

The 13-and-unders won the title in the National League with an 11 win, 2 lost and one tie record, finishing ahead of runner-up North Roseburg, Riverside's 11-and-under American League team ended with a 9-4 record for at least a tie for the championship.

In the 11-and-under action Fred Worsley and Joe Sooter were the winning battery, while Mike Sullivan was the losing pitcher. The winners came from behind with four-run uprisings in the second and third innings to grab the victory.

Hits Triple
Lex Cornwell's triple was the big Riverside blow as he drove in one run. Also driving in single runs were Teddy Vrettas and Barry Baker, while Herbert Morrison had two RBIs. Gary Bevil had Winchester at the plate with a homer and a single for four RBIs.

The 13-and-under game saw Winchester outlast Riverside 8-4, but Riverside combined its hits with six walks and three errors to win a 5-4 thriller. Mike Anderson was the winning pitcher, striking out seven and walking one.

Glen Ezard's two run homer in the first inning led Riverside to the victory. Mike Doyle tripled for the winners in the fifth to drive in one, while Teddy Vrettas was 2-3, and saved the game with a spectacular play at second. The other extra base blow for the winners was John Peel's stand-up double in the second to start a one-run rally.

Aided Cause
Pitcher Gordon Smith was 3-3 for Winchester and drove in three runs, while Tom Hoskot and Larry Forrest went 2-3 at the plate, and scored all the losers runs.

Drought Brings Forecasts Of Decreased Duck Flights

WASHINGTON (AP) — The third straight year of drought on the prairies resulted Tuesday in bad news for duck hunters.

The Interior Department forecast major declines in duck flights in the Mississippi and Central flyways and moderate decreases in duck flights in the Pacific and Atlantic flyways.

The department said the mid-summer survey of waterfowl production showed a serious mid-continent waterfowl situation had been caused by major droughts in the southern portions of the three prairie provinces in Canada and in the Dakotas.

Most Effected
Because most of the birds from this area go to the Central and Mississippi flyways, the department said the effect is being felt more in these flyways than in the two coastal areas.

The forecasts were compiled on the basis of surveys just completed by the Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife in central

It was the only league game on tap, but in Salem, the home team dumped Spokane of the Pacific Coast League 5-1 by hammering 15 hits off outfielder Bob Bowman and infielder Mike Goliath, who hurled for Spokane.

Wenatchee scored seven runs in the second inning. Spencer Scott's home run accounted for four of them. Dick Burwell, the winning pitcher, also slugged a grand-slam homer in the eighth.

A full schedule was on tap Tuesday with Lewiston at Salem, Yakima at Wenatchee and Eugene at Tri-Cities.

Harmsworth Rule Modification Hinted

PICTON, Ont. (AP) — Miss Supertest III's monopoly on the Harmsworth Trophy has prompted suggestions that the International Powerboat classic's rigid rules be modified to allow better competition.

The unbeaten Canadian water-flier, which Monday became the first boat to win three Harmsworths, has shown convincingly she can master any challenger from the United States.

Supertest sped away from Miss Detroit, the U.S. challenger, and won Canada's third Harmsworth in the minimum of two heats.

While Chuck Thompson's Allison engine overheated in Miss Detroit, Bob Hayward's Rolls-Royce Griffon purred smoothly and powerfully.

American powerboat owners have been calling for a change in Harmsworth engine rules to return the United States to its position of power.

The disputed rule forces a competing boat to use an engine designed and built in the challenging nation.

U.S. boats with the Allison have been no match for Supertest since her debut in 1959.
