Small Plane Prop Decapitates Man

SITKA, Alaska (AP) — A fishing trip to nearby lakes ended in tragedy here Thursday as Edwin Greenhalgh, 43, was killed instantly when he walked into the propeller of a small plane.

Greenhalgh, a retired barber and former city policeman, Ernest Baughn of Sitka and Lester Buckman of Baldwin, N.Y., were returning from the trip in Buckman's four-place plane.

Buckman said the engine was turned off but the propeller had not yet come to a standstill. Greenhalgh jumped onto the plane float to tie up the plane and, apparently not hearing warning shouts, walked into the prop and was decapitated.

Buckman, here on a flying tour of Alaska, met Greenhalgh and Baughn when he was weathered in here the first part of the week.

Greenhalgh was born at Yakima, Wash. Surviving are his widow, Mary Jo, three children by a former marriage, living in Anchorage, and his mother, Mrs. George Chasses of Veda, Oregon.

The body was sent south and funeral services are tentatively set for Monday at Yakima.
