## Vandalism Raises Forest Service Ire

The U. S. Forest Service is doing its utmost to provide ample, clean and enjoyable recreation facilities for the public in the Umpqua National Forest, but it is having troubles, reports one official.

Don Smith, assistant district ranger at Steamboat says the Forest Service is expanding facilities as rapidly as possible to meet the tremendous increase in popularity of camping and picnicking. One obstacle is lack of funds which is becoming less of a problem every year, but the other is high maintenance cost which is boosted by vandalism.

Smith reports a person or group of persons recently damaged one of the restrooms in Bogus Creek campground. The camp is located 28 miles east of Roseburg on the North Umpqua Highway. Several shots were fired into and around the building causing damages. The Forest Service is investigating possible leads to determine the persons responsible for this vandalism.

Shooting in campgrounds is not only a violation of state and federal laws, but is dangerous to campers in the area and people passing by, Smith says. Destruction of government property is punishable by fine or imprisonment or both. The repair of damages to public property comes out of everyone's pocketbook and it is the duty and responsibility of everyone to report any person seen damaging public property. Smith continued.

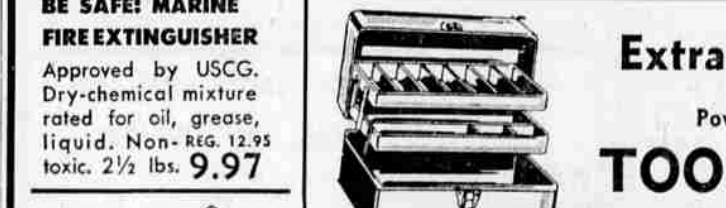
