Hoffa Pooh-Poohs Possibility Of National Move To Unseat Him

CINCINNATI, Ohio (AP)—Teamsters President James R. Hoffa, pooh-poohing the possibility of any national trend to unseat him, flew in here Sunday and confronted the leader of a rebel faction who says Hoffa is using the union to gain "personal wealth and power."

The Teamsters chief came face to face with James Luken, who has led four Cincinnati locals to bolt the Hoffa regime and declare intentions of joining the AFL-CIO.

The two did not shake hands.

Atlanta Plans First Integrated School

ATLANTA, Ga. (AP)—Atlanta leaders are completing plans for Georgia's first public school desegregation at the high school level Wednesday, cautiously optimistic that law and order will prevail.

Preparations have been made to prevent trouble when 10 Negroes start attending classes with more than 4,000 white pupils at four widely separated city high schools.

The other schools remain segregated in the traditional pattern. Total enrollment in the Atlanta public schools is estimated at 48,000 Negroes and 69,000 whites.

The 700-man police force has received detailed instructions. Religious leaders, politicians and business and professional men all have appealed for peaceful compliance with the federal court order for integration.

Mayor William B. Hartsfield urged Atlanta to meet "this challenge with the kind of civic pride, order and dignity that Atlanta has been famous for since the civil war." This past weekend was devoted to "law and order" observances and more than 600 houses of worship of all faiths in the city were asked to take part.

Church appeals were issued the day after 850 church laymen called on the children of the city to accept the sociological change "with dignity, doing no act of defiance or ill manners which can reflect on you, your faith, your rearing or your community."

The shuffle took place at a meeting of the National Council of the Algerian Revolution (CNRA), a sort of parliamentary body, in Tripoli, Libya.

A communique issued at rebel headquarters here today said: "The decisions of the CNRA deal

principally with the reinforcement of the action of the national liberation army and the mobilization of the Algerian masses."

The CNRA "reaffirmed that a solution is possible within the fundamental principles safeguarding the territorial integrity of the Algerian territory, including the Sahara."

Recent peace talks with the French broke down largely on French insistence that the oil-rich Sahara is not part of Algeria.

The rebel statement today "underlined the importance of the material, political and diplomatic support from the Socialist countries and the countries of Africa, Asia and Latin America."

Named as foreign minister in the reshuffle was Saad Dahleb, 42, who took part in the unsuccessful peace talks with France. Belkacem Krim, veteran revolutionary and leading exponent of the tough line, was kept on as premier and interior minister.

The government's Tunis headquarters announced the shakeup in a communique which said Ben Khedda would go as premier to Cairo for a meeting of chiefs of state of the Casablanca group of African countries, then head Algeria's delegation to the conference of nonaligned countries at Belgrade beginning Friday.

Then he asked: "Can all 1 1/2 million members of our international be wrong? Or is there someone behind this man (Luken) who is urging you to destroy collective bargaining, (now) on a basis of solidarity in Cincinnati?"

While a brass band was playing in the Music Hall prior to Hoffa's arrival, Luken, president of the 2,200-member Driver Drivers Local, was on television. He told his audience that he and his associates had decided to revolt only after giving up all hope of reform within the Teamsters Union.

"We could not believe that any one man, through money, connivance and press-agent magic, could capture a national union and convert it to his own private instrument for personal wealth and power," Luken said.

"We could not believe that the efforts of underworld characters to dominate large segments of the union could go unchecked," Luken said.

Luken denied he led the 4,000-man Teamster revolt because of personal hostility toward Hoffa.

The Dairy Drivers, Soft Drink Drivers, Funeral Livery Drivers and Taxicab Drivers locals here voted 11 days ago to disaffiliate with the Teamsters.

Technician Admits He Invented Device To Bilk Telephone Firms

WASHINGTON (AP)—A Florida electronics technician testified today he invented a device which has been used by some gamblers to baffle police wire tappers and cheat telephone companies on long distance tolls.

The technician, Walter Shaw, former equipment engineer for the Southern Bell Telephone & Telegraph Co., denied however, that the invention was intended for that purpose. He said it could have been modified by someone else.

Testifying before the Senate investigations subcommittee, Shaw said he used the device in Florida and "100 per cent sorry" he ever got mixed up with the invention.

He first invoked the Fifth Amendment on questions about the device, known variously as a "cheese box" and an "automatic dialing transfer equipment device."

When used, he said, the device registers a busy signal at the telephone offices, but actually transfers the call to a different preselected telephone number.

He refused to say whether Archie John Giamuzio of Mamaroneck, N.Y., paid him to produce the devices as was alleged in testimony last week. Giamuzio also had invoked the Fifth Amendment on this.

Shaw insisted the devices were in an incomplete stage of production the last time he saw them at a Mamaroneck address previously denied in the hearings at the home of Giamuzio.

He denied he had installed any of them, and swore he does not know who now possesses 75 of them the police believe are in the hands of racketeers of clandestine race wire news service operators.

Chairman John L. McClellan, D-Ark., told Shaw he had, by answering some questions, and taking the Fifth on others, forfeited his right to invoke the constitutional protection, but that the subcommittee would be lenient because of his pending indictment.

UAW Puts Pressure On Big Three After Signing Pact With American

DETROIT (AP)—Armed with a profit-sharing settlement at American Motors and with strike authorization, the United Auto Workers Union applied home-stretch pressure today on General Motors, Ford and Chrysler for new contracts.

Unless something gives by Thursday midnight, when current three-year contracts run out, UAW President Walter P. Reuther says there will be a strike against one of the Big Three.

Workers have rolled up overwhelming majorities to back up demands with walkouts, if necessary.

Reuther said there still is time for agreement "if there is good will on both sides." He pointed out the AMC-UAW pact was put together between Tuesday and Saturday.

Reuther says the new American Motors agreement "ought to lay the basis for economic settlement" with other automakers, but if any of the Big Three knows a better way "to answer pressing human needs" he's willing to follow that route.

The Big Three have said they have no intention of following a profit sharing path. They insist production workers have shared in industry progress over the years through wage increases that have brought the average wage to \$2.80 hourly and added fringe benefits worth 35 to 40 cents hourly. They have offered wage raising packages that the union has rejected.

Sunday's melee started as the pickets were about to disband. Officer J. W. Rushing said he tried to disarm a Negro picket who then fled but turned and shot him in the hip. The wound was not serious.

Another officer who asked not to be named, said the incident began when an English girl, Constance Lever, 20, started to get into a car with some armed Negro pickets. This officer said Rushing tried to dissuade Miss Lever from setting into the car and that James Foreman of Chicago, a Negro integration leader, tried to pull her into it. Rushing disarmed two of the Negroes but another broke away, fired at Rushing, and fled.

Albert Rorie, 17, Monroe Negro who has taken part in the picketing, was arrested on a charge of assault with a deadly weapon but he denied shooting Rushing.

Both the city and the rural fire departments answered a call at 1928 SE Stephens at 5:45 p.m. Saturday. The blaze, in a rubbish pile, was located on the boundary line of both districts and a unit was dispatched from each.

No damage or loss was reported.

Sunday's melee started as the pickets were about to disband. Officer J. W. Rushing said he tried to disarm a Negro picket who then fled but turned and shot him in the hip. The wound was not serious.

Another officer who asked not to be named, said the incident began when an English girl, Constance Lever, 20, started to get into a car with some armed Negro pickets. This officer said Rushing tried to dissuade Miss Lever from setting into the car and that James Foreman of Chicago, a Negro integration leader, tried to pull her into it. Rushing disarmed two of the Negroes but another broke away, fired at Rushing, and fled.

Albert Rorie, 17, Monroe Negro who has taken part in the picketing, was arrested on a charge of assault with a deadly weapon but he denied shooting Rushing.
