Borate Plane Pilot Injured In Crash

MEDFORD, (AP) — James V. Seamas, 29, Sacramento, Calif., was reported still in critical condition Sunday night at Sacred Heart Hospital in Medford from injuries suffered in a Saturday plane crash near Yreka, Calif.

Seamas was piloting a plane which was dropping borate on the since-controlled Pollic Flat fire in Northern California.

Seamas had not regained consciousness Sunday night, hospital officials said. An attending physician said he suffered moderately severe head injuries, but no skull fracture.

Seamas was rescued from the crash by ground crews and sent by ambulance to Klamath Valley Hospital in Klamath Falls.

He was flown from there to the Medford hospital.

Accordian Group Tops In Contest

A trio of accordianists from Westlake walked off with top honors during the finals of the Ricketts' Talent Revue at the Douglas County Fair and Exposition Sunday night.

The G-Tones Trio composed of Bonnie, Vonnice, and Connie Goehring, aged 13, 15 and 17 respectively, won \$50 and the right to go to the State Fair in Salem.

The G-Tones with the next four winners will appear in the State Fair's Talent Show Sept. 7 between 2 and 4 p.m., Dick Turley, manager of the county fair, said.

The talent revue was designated by the State Fair as an auditioning agent for the Sept. 7 appearance. All other performers appearing in Salem will have to go through auditions run by the State Fair.

Second place honors in the Ricketts' Revue went to Sonja Betts, 17, Medford, who did a pantomime. She won \$35.

Taking third place money of \$30 was Kathy Cardiff, 9, Roseburg, doing a baton solo. Fourth place money of \$25 went to Gail Magby, 9, Sutherlin, vocalist. Fifth place of \$15 went to Mary Kay Fletcher, 15, Winston, doing a piano solo.

Other finalists receiving \$5 each were: Ralph Salee, 15, Roseburg, trumpet solo; Ginny Lee Winger, 19, Sutherlin, vocal solo; Gloria Burnett, 25, Myrtle Creek, vocal solo; Scott Campbell and Wayne Tyler, both 16 of Roseburg, vocal duet; Bert Pearsons, 19, Roseburg, trombone solo; and Debra Ritter, 6, Riddle, acrobatics.

The county fair will pay transportation costs to the State Fair for the first five finalists.

Britain's Newspapers Still Boiling Over Macmillan Charge

LONDON (AP) — Britain's morning newspapers still boiled today at Prime Minister Harold Macmillan's golf course dismissal of the Berlin crisis as something "got up by the press."

The editors' ire was little mollified by a news conference Sunday at which Macmillan said the Berlin situation is "serious and there is a danger arising from rash and provocative actions such as have recently been taken in East Berlin."

Macmillan said he and Lord Home, his foreign secretary, believe that East-West negotiations on Berlin and Germany should take place but to be effective, "these must be held in the right atmosphere and at the right time."

Macmillan threw out the remark that aroused the editors during an impromptu chat with newsmen on the 18th hole at Glen-eagles, the Scottish resort where the prime minister is on vacation.

To a question about Berlin he replied: "I think it is all got up by the press. Nobody is going to fight about it."

But the Mirror drew some satisfaction from the news conference and said "perhaps the prime minister was seeing things more clearly after a good night's sleep."

The Laborite Daily Herald said Macmillan was right in refusing to be an alarmist but added: "Coolness is no substitute for leadership. What is now needed is a positive move to bring about negotiations with the Russians."

The press and some members of Parliament have criticized Macmillan and Lord Home for taking a vacation during the new Berlin crisis.

Home is on holiday at another Scottish spot. He drove to Glen-eagles Sunday for a three-hour conference with Macmillan and other advisers to the prime minister.
