Don't forget playclothes during the shopping trip. Good looking casuals for after-school wear are very important items in a little girl's wardrobe.

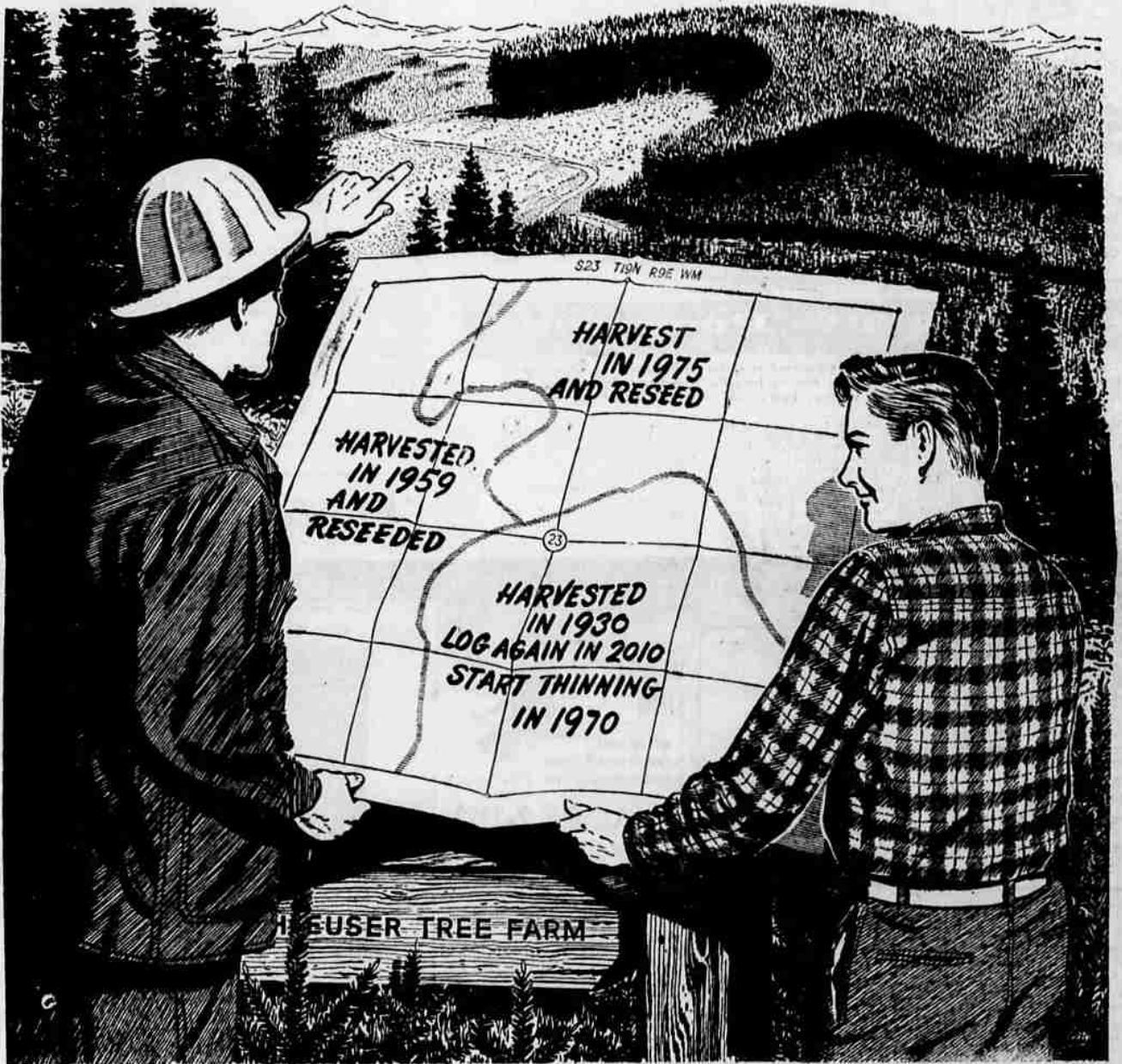
