

Uniform Price For Milk Urged At Meeting Here

Milk producers in Area 1 (Douglas County) gave a general consensus Tuesday at a milk stabilization hearing held in the Douglas County Courthouse. "We want a uniform price for milk."

Two proposals were made to the some 30 to 40 persons attending the hearing. They were: (1) Establishment of a uniform price for milk throughout Western Oregon and in Klamath, Lake and Harney counties; and (2) the alternate adjustment of prices in market areas 2, 4 and 5 (Coos Bay, Eugene and Medford) in relation to the \$5.80 price prevailing in the Portland area. Also considered was whether or not Market Area 7 (Klamath County) price should be adjusted in relation to California prices.

The testimony was unanimous for the first proposal, eliminating the second.

Sawyer Presides
Conducting the hearing was Kenneth W. Sawyer, producer milk stabilization administrator for the State Department of Agriculture.

Looking at the alternate proposal, Sawyer pointed out that he had just received by mail a petition from Portland asking to increase the Portland producer milk price from the \$5.80 to \$6.00, the going price here in Area 1.

At the same time, he received a petition from the Oregon Dairy Industry asking for a re-hearing on general regulation under the producer milk stabilization act. It listed three items: (1) payment of fees by dealers; (2) authorized deductions from producers; and (3) regulation of dealers with distribution pools. The original hearing was held in July of this year.

Producers Chided
After listening to the testimony, Sawyer stated that the producers are generally more concerned about price they are going to receive under the stabilization act than the problems of the industry that brought the program into effect.

He went on to say "There is no question on the part of dealers or

anyone else that the producer should have a price he can live with. There seems to be a fear in Roseburg on the part of producers that the price will be pulled down to the Portland market of \$5.80. (No hearing date has been set as of yet on the Portland price for so many years.)

Pistol Pete Gets Last Wish Today

STUART, Fla. (AP) — Pistol Pete Butler will get his last wish today—to be buried on the range where he rode as a top cowhand for so many years.

The wiry little Negro—his real name was Will Butler—but he was better known as Pistol Pete—was struck by an automobile on U.S. 1 two miles south of Stuart early Saturday and died later in a West Palm Beach hospital.

Nobody knew his real age, but rancher William J. Matheson estimates Pistol Pete was over 80. He was drafted in World War I but was discharged because he was over age, said Matheson. That was 44 years ago.

Pistol Pete came from Texas, where he acquired his love of horses and the life of a cowboy. "He was a good hand," said Matheson. "For the 20 years he rode herd on our cattle he was close to the family."

Like most cowhands, Pistol Pete made a regular weekend sortie to the county seat. "He would leave the ranch every Friday evening and come back early Saturday morning," Matheson said. "That's the only time he left the ranch."

The Matheson family and the ranch hands are giving Pistol Pete the kind of funeral any cowboy would want. The body will be brought to the ranch from a funeral home in Fort Pierce.

It will lie in state in the Matheson living room from 1 to 2 p.m. Then six pallbearers—three white and three Negro—will take the body to the grave out in the pasture, in the shade of a clump of pines, where Pistol Pete often said he wanted to be buried.

tion for the \$6.09 figure). "I sense dealers generally are not too concerned as to what the price is to producers so long as it doesn't attract milk from other places cheaper and as long as the dealers are not competitive with someone paying a lesser price."

"Milk is on wheels today and therefore has a distinct effect on marketing of milk," Sawyer concluded.

Losses Noted
Most of the producers present indicated they were either losing money or barely operating on the income from their milk. Most of this problem arises from excess milk prices.

Grade A and B milk is divided into two classes, one and two. Class I is milk that will be sold in bottles and cans in pure milk form. Class II is milk that is in excess of the quota and will be made into ice cream, cheese and other by-products. It is purchased by the processors at a much lower figure than Class I.

Therefore, if a dairyman produces so much milk, part of it has to be sold as Class II because of the limit of demand. This is termed the "bleed price."

Distributor Speaks
Truman Goodwin, representing Umpqua Dairy of Roseburg, was the only dealer present at the hearings to air his side of the story. He stated: "If we are to continue in the milk business, we must be in the position to purchase milk so that we are competitive with out-of-state milk, milk from adjoining areas and producer-distributors. If prices to producers in the area cannot become competitive, possibly we will be forced to use an outside source to retain our business."

"The only way to keep sales volume for both the processor and producer is with competitive prices," Sawyer was to conduct three more hearings, one last night at Coos Bay, one today at Medford and one Thursday at Klamath Falls. The hearings were opened Monday in Eugene. Accompanying him is Genevieve Morgan, head of the information service for the Department of Agriculture.

Duty-Free Lunch Periods Urged For School Teachers

SALEM (AP) — The state Board of Education Tuesday adopted a regulation aimed at getting duty-free lunch periods for more Oregon school teachers.

It tightened up the regulation to insure an average 30 minute, duty-free lunch period in all schools of the state except the one-teacher schools.

The new regulation will read: "In scheduling work assignments teachers shall be provided duty-free lunch periods that over a period of time shall average 30 minutes per day, provided attention shall be given to maintaining adequate supervision of pupils at all times."

Dr. Leon P. Minear, state superintendent of public instruction, told the board he had been warned by a legislator that unless the board acted that the legislature probably would enact a law to get this accomplished.

The board also approved 5th grade instruction material for a course entitled: "Alaska — Our 49th State." The board also was told that similar material would be ready on Hawaii.

The board adopted a resolution telling the State Education Department to consult with the committee for certification and review on knotty certification requests.

All applications where reasonable doubts about certification — such as persons with criminal records — must be referred by Minear to this board, it said.

The resolution also asked that any applicant refused certification be advised of the right to appeal for a formal board hearing and to the state courts.

Real Estate Brokers To Hear Ad Salesmen
Advertising and public relations in the real estate field will be the topic of the lecture opening the fall term of the certificate education classes for real estate brokers and salesmen of Douglas County at Trade and Industry Section, Roseburg High School, Thursday, at 7:30 p.m.

An ill-illustrated lecture on newspaper advertising of real estate will be presented by Ray Greene, classified advertising manager, Salem Classified Advertising Manager, Eugene Register-Guard.

Use of other advertising media and public relations in the real estate field will be covered in a lecture by Ted Hallowell, Portland public relations executive, and former Oregon Centennial coordinator.

The certificate education classes are jointly sponsored by the Oregon Real Estate Department and the University of Oregon. They are conducted without charge for licensed real estate salesmen and brokers.

Esther Labeled Danger Storm

MIAMI, Fla. (AP) — Hurricane Esther, with peak winds at 130 miles an hour, churned on a west-northwest course today as the tropical Atlantic tossed out hurricanes in Roman candle fashion.

Betsy, Debbie and now Esther have sprung in the past two weeks from the tropical storm nesting grounds off Africa's west coast.

A hurricane hunter airplane from San Juan, P.R., penetrated the storm early today and estimated the center about 1,400 statute miles east of San Juan. The hurricane was moving west-northwest at about 12 m.p.h.

Esther was labeled a "dangerous hurricane" and shipping in her path was warned to exercise caution.

The peak winds cover a small area near the center. Hurricane force winds extend outward 135 miles in the northern semicircle and 65 miles in the southern semicircle. Gale winds extend outward 230 miles in all directions.

The hurricane was expected to maintain its course and speed for the next 12 hours with little change in size or intensity.

Forecasters Elbert Hill said the course, if unchanged, would carry Esther to the U.S. mainland, but he emphasized it was too early to determine if other weather factors would alter Esther's course.

Hurricane Debbie was northbound through the North Atlantic at about 14 m.p.h., well east of Nova Scotia. She presented no danger to land areas and was doomed to die in the cold northern waters.

Hurricanes Carla and Esther are only distantly related and originated in entirely different areas — more than 1,000 miles apart, Hill said.

Carla, which battered the coasts of Louisiana and Texas, was spawned in the western Caribbean between Jamaica and Panama, and moved up the Gulf of Mexico.

Betsy, Debbie and Esther originated west of the Cape Verde, off the west coast of Africa, Hill said.

Marine Corps Accepting Three-Year Enlistments

The U.S. Marine Corps is still accepting three-year enlistments in both the air and ground services, Staff Sgt. George H. Freidenberger, Roseburg Marine recruiter, said today.

He also reported that no Marines have had their enlistments extended involuntarily. The recruiter noted that the Marine Corps expects to accomplish its announced build-up to 190,000 men six months earlier than usual, due to an increase in voluntary enlistments and the response of enlisted Reservists to the call for extended active duty.

This goal is expected to be completed by Dec. 31, 1961, instead of June 30, 1962.

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Javits Says Berlin Show Was Typically Jack Parr

NEW YORK (AP) — "About all you can say was that it was typically Jack Parr."

That was the reaction of Sen. Jacob K. Javits, R-N.Y., to the highly controversial "Jack Parr in Berlin" film telecast Tuesday night.

Files For Bankruptcy

Albert F. McGinnis of 1116 NE Walnut St., Roseburg, has filed for bankruptcy in the U. S. District Court in Portland. A millworker, he lists debts totaling \$2,778.57.

Sen. Mike Mansfield, D-Mont., had declared after the film was made last week on Berlin's tense East-West border that "to say I was disturbed is an understatement."

Asked in Washington today whether he had watched the telecast, the Senate majority leader replied: "No—Lord, no! The incident is closed as far as I am concerned!"

The furor stirred by the filming had caused concern even in the White House, which approved a Defense Department investigation of the use of U.S. Army troops by Parr.

The Army removed one officer — Lt. Col. Dallas Hoadley of Baltimore — from his post for "improper performance of duty." It admonished a second — Col. J. R. Deane Jr. of San Francisco — for "exercising poor judgment" in providing troops filmed by Parr.

Javits said he saw "nothing fatal" in the NBC show but added he didn't "think anything so sensitive should be handled in this manner."

"I hope this kind of approach will not be repeated," he said. There was no mention on the telecast of the controversy raised by the filming.

Parr said earlier in Paris he was "just sick about the whole thing."

Official Washington's primary concern appeared to be whether Parr had received undue cooperation in the filming from Army officials in Berlin.

Parr maintained he had received no undue cooperation from the Army—that many officers at the scene were curiosity seekers, and that the soldiers were there for a changing of the guard.

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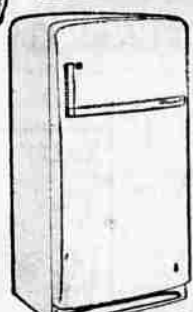

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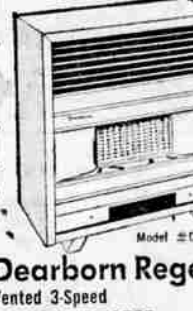
