

Green Students Moved To Joseph Lane To Balance Attendance At Junior Highs

The Roseburg School Board at a special meeting Wednesday approved a recommendation that 44 students now attending J. C. Fremont Junior High School be transferred to Joseph Lane Junior High School as a means of balancing the enrollment loads at the two schools.

Although both schools have the same comparative student capacity, and teacher staffs are equal, enrollment totals as schools opened this fall showed Fremont with an enrollment total of 850 students and Joseph Lane with 773.

The students will be taken from the Green Elementary School attendance area. Affected are seventh, eighth and ninth graders re-

siding in areas adjacent to old U.S. Highway 99 from Kelly's Korner southward to the bridge crossing the South Umpqua River near what was known as the Green Meadow Trailer Court.

Students Included

Included in the transfer are students who live in the Dee-Lite Trailer Court, Landers Lane, Harmony Lane, Jackie Lane and Carter's Trailer Court. The Glengary district is not included in the transfer.

District Supt. M. C. Deller said no re-scheduling of transportation will be required for the transferring group, which includes 20 seventh graders, 11 eighth graders and 13 ninth graders.

The shift of students from Green Elementary School area was recommended to the board by R. H. Brand, Joseph Lane principal; R. E. McKee, J. C. Fremont principal; Luther Eliason, transportation contractor, and Deller.

Notification Due

The students and parents involved will be notified this week and the shift will be effected Monday.

"The recommendation was based on factors in economy and transportation," Deller pointed out. "Considering these factors, the best solution was to take students from one area rather than hand-picking them from house to house in the more populous areas."

Other considerations were that the students are transported on one bus, and they attended Joseph Lane for the last two years.

Vote Favorable

The board voted 4-1 in favor of the recommendation. One board member objected on the grounds the action was not a final solution to the junior high school enrollment boundary problem.

In other business, the board appointed George Neuner, school district attorney, to handle for the district a matter involving a dispute over a construction flaw that developed in the roof on the new section of Joseph Lane school.

The roof was not acceptable to the architect or the school district, school officials pointed out, and the question was raised whether workmanship or materials was responsible.

The architect directed the contractor, Southern Oregon Construc-

tion, to replace the roof. Wednesday the board was advised by the architect that the contractor demands arbitration of the issue as provided in the architect's documents set up for the project.

Dismissal Ordered In Tavern Action

A trial in Circuit Court Wednesday ended abruptly, when Circuit Judge Robert C. Belloni of Coquille approved a defense motion for dismissal. Judge Belloni served in the absence of Don H. Sanders.

The case was that of Harris Whitaker vs. Leonard S. Zacher, and involved sale of The Friendly, local restaurant and tavern, by Zacher to Whitaker. Whitaker had claimed misrepresentation of the business.

The defense claimed that the complaint did not represent facts in the case. Dismissal by the judge was without prejudice, meaning that a new complaint could be filed, if the plaintiff so chose.

The trial opened at 10 a. m. with selection of a jury and continued until 1:30 p. m., when it was dismissed.

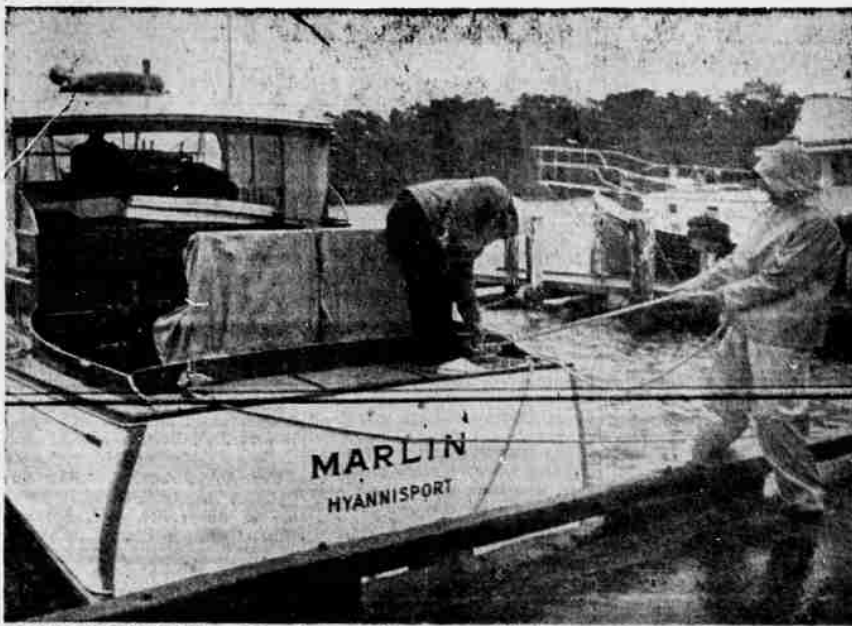
Shipping Injunction Expires At Midnight

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Federal mediators scheduled continued meetings today in an attempt to avert a possible strike that could tie up most West Coast shipping when a Taft-Hartley law injunction expires at midnight.

The 89-day injunction halted a nationwide shipping strike last July. Since then most major disputes have been settled. But the Pacific Maritime Association and the International Organization of Masters, Mates and Pilots are still in disagreement.

A strike could affect 13 West Coast shipping companies with 136 ships.

Among other demands, the union seeks continuous overtime while ships are being moved in ports.

Russia Said Building Space Platform

SAN JOSE, Calif. (AP) — The Soviet Union reportedly has a rocket capable of orbiting a 12-ton satellite and already is building a space platform which Premier Khrushchev has called the "ultimate atomic warfare weapon."

This report, unconfirmed by other sources, came from Kilsso Haan, a former Korean underground worker during World War II who now is a naturalized American citizen.

Haan, who says his information comes from inside Communist territory, submitted to President

Kennedy Sept. 9 information which said Khrushchev had advised Red Chinese leader Mao Tze-Tung of the powerful new rocket and that the space platform was being built.

Haan, who lives here, is western divisional sales manager for a Duluth, Minn. food concern.

Kennedy Relaxes Secrecy Measures

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Kennedy has set up a system for automatically taking the secrecy wraps off a considerable amount of classified government material.

Rep. John E. Moss, D-Calif., who along with newspaper editor groups has frequently criticized excessive governmental secrecy, said the action Wednesday was "a major improvement in the information protection system."

Moss, chairman of the House Information subcommittee, and newspaper groups have protested that classified labels sometimes are used by government officials to conceal mistakes or policies that should be made public.

Moss said the system was recommended by his group three years ago and supported by the American Society of Newspaper Editors and Sigma Delta Chi, professional journalistic society.

The executive order provides for downgrading the secrecy classification of documents at regular intervals, or sooner if officials decide they no longer need special protection.

Pierre Salinger, White House press secretary, said the details of the system were worked out by an interdepartmental committee on internal security after a long study of government classification methods.
