Elderly Residents Get Big Share Of Douglas County Welfare Fund

Of the money in the state Public Welfare Commission for the Douglas County Welfare Commission, 42 cents of every dollar is used in the care of the aged on the commission's rolls.

Jack Summerfield, welfare administrator, noted this as he told the commission Wednesday that the county's October allocation is \$128,175. September's allocation was \$123,894.

Reason Cited

"The increase in total allocation is because of an increase in emergency general assistance allocations and increased nursing home costs," he said.

The money used for the aged, he noted, goes for basic needs such as food, clothing rent or medical care.

In September the commission handled 175 emergency general assistance families which received an average of \$34 in aid.

Summerfield estimates 205 families will receive such aid in October at an average cost of \$36 per case. The increase is reflected in higher costs for heating and utilities.

During September 285 aid-to-dependent-children families received \$30,791. Eleven blind cases were aided with \$705. Aid-to-disabled

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Brown Bridge Back In Service Today

Bridges and their faults, cropped into the news again Thursday.

Limited to light traffic only were placed on a county and a U.S. Forest Service bridge, but the county bridge was back as strong as ever today.

The county span is Brown's Bridge over the North Umpqua near the Roseburg Country Club. Because of heavy loads hauled over it, a stringer broke Thursday. For the rest of the day, extremely heavy trucks were kept off the bridge, but county crews fixed the stringer, this morning.

County Engineer Al May said no danger was involved.

Meanwhile, Howard Emrich, Forest Service engineer, said the North Umpqua Bridge at Boulder Creek was posted today to limit loads to no more than five tons.

Emrich said the bridge has become weakened from extreme use and old age. It is a log stringer structure. He said all users have been informed of the new load limit. Included are Glendale School District children who attend Toketee School and the high school from the Toketee area. The school district will arrange to have buses stop at the bridge, the youngsters will walk over it and then embark in other buses from the other side.

Meanwhile, Emrich says plans will probably soon be forthcoming for repair or replacement of the bridge or arrangement of another access to the area on the other side of the river. Several Umpqua National Forest timber sales have been made above the bridge.

Firemen's Hats, Badges Mark County's Grade Pupils As Junior Fire Marshals

The Junior Fire Marshals are coming! In fact, in many parts of the county they have already arrived.

As part of Fire Prevention Week, the Douglas County Independent Insurance Agents Association, with community fire departments and school administrators cooperating, has been distributing to all third and fourth graders Junior Fire Marshal badges, fireman hats and take-home material on home hazards to be given to parents.

Parents are being drafted to make the rounds with junior when he comes home wearing his JFM badge and eager to complete the official "home inspection report" which is designed to spot fire hazards.

Over 1,000 fire marshal kits are being distributed in the county.

The program, according to Del McKay, fire marshal committee member, teaches youngsters proper respect for the dangers of fire. And it helps parents guard against possible death and destruction.

"It can be momentarily embarrassing to have an earnest 8-year-old point out the frayed electric cord you've been meaning to fix and the stacks of old newspapers you have planned to clear out of the attic," McKay said.

"But it is important that both children and adults learn the lessons of home safety and emergency exit procedures."

Listing 17 safety checks, the inspection report points up such items as regular checking of heating and cooking equipment, burning trash in approved incinerators only and using proper fuses in electric fuse boxes.

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
