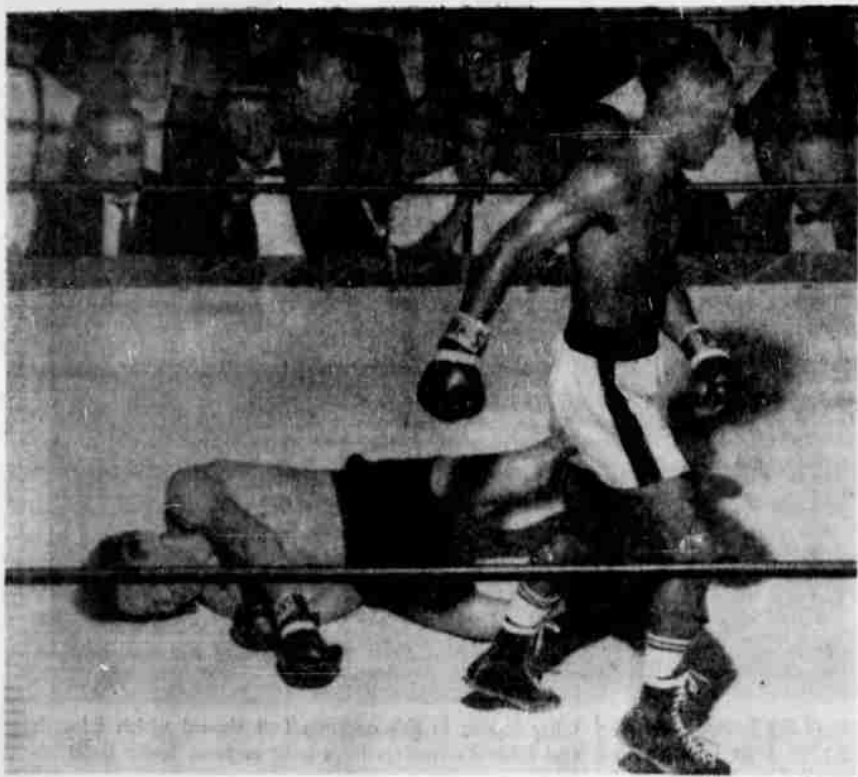

PCL Team Reports Working Agreement

VANCOUVER, B.C. (AP) — A new working agreement with the American League Minnesota Twins was reported Thursday by the Pacific Coast League Vancouver Mounties.

Frank Walters, Mounties president who announced the deal, said the Twins have promised to send a complete baseball team here next year.

Last year the Mounties had an agreement with the Milwaukee Braves of the National League. Walters said Milwaukee didn't have sufficient players in sight to stock Vancouver next year.

Sutherland Terriers To Play Fremont

The Sutherland Junior High Terriers, totalling a 2-1 mark for the season, will travel to Roseburg Saturday morning to try to wipe out their lone defeat of the season.

The Terriers will play Fremont Junior High in a doubleheader with the seventh grade game to start at 10:30 a.m.

Last week the Terriers set up a powerful defense and unless a vastly improved offense, they ramblled to an impressive 20-6 triumph over the Joseph Lane Junior High team of Roseburg.

The Terriers tallied first on a long pass play from Greg Eggleston to Jerry Tabor. The Joseph Lane team scored moments later on a 65-yard run to knot the count at 6-6.

CHOICE IN NL

Manager Of Year Honors Won By Fred Hutchinson

NEW YORK (AP) — Freddie Hutchinson of the Cincinnati Reds collecting all except one of 176 votes, was selected the National League manager-of-the-year for 1961 today in the annual Associated Press Poll.

A lone ballot for Alvin Dark of the third-place San Francisco Giants prevented Hutchinson from being a unanimous choice in the balloting by members of the Baseball Writers' Association of America.

Record Improved

With important contributions from new acquisitions (Pitcher Joey Jay and third baseman Gene Freese) plus the consistent hitting of Frank Robinson and Vada Pinson, Hutchinson helped the Reds improve on their 1960 performance by 13 games and five positions in the standings.

The past season they won 93 games and lost 61. In 1960, the Reds had a 67-87 record, finishing sixth. Virtually no one gave them a chance to win their first pennant in 21 years.

The Reds were pressed throughout the year by the Los Angeles Dodgers, considered by most ex-

perts to have had more talent. The pivotal series between the contenders was played in Cincinnati, Aug. 25-27. The Dodgers won the first 2 games, cutting the Reds' league lead to 1½ games. A sweep of the final two, a Sunday doubleheader, would have put Los Angeles in front. However, Cincinnati took both games, 8-3 and 6-5. The final games.

Hutchinson, 42, previously managed the Detroit Tigers and St. Louis Cards.

Dark, in his first season as a manager, helped lift the Giants two notches in the standings. They finished fifth in 1960 under Bill Rigney and Tom Sheehan.

Texas Aggies Solidify First Poll Position

Texas A & I College's undefeated Javelinas solidified their hold on first place in The Associated Press' weekly small college football poll today.

The Javelinas, who didn't draw a first-place vote in the first poll a week ago, attracted five from the AP's regional board of experts by defeating East Texas State, 22-6, for their third straight victory.

Humboldt State of California moved up from fifth place to second and bagged two first-place votes by edging San Francisco State, 7-6.

Hillsdale College of Michigan, third a week ago, was upended 24-3 by Northern Michigan and dropped out of the top ten.

Unbeaten Delaware (3-0) moved into the elite group by trouncing Lafayette, 34-0.

Grid Test Between Indians And Vikings Rated Tossup

Looming big tonight at Finlay Field is the battle of the undefeated, featuring the Roseburg Indians and the North Salem Vikings at 8.

Both teams have 5-0 records for the season, with North Salem holding a slight edge over the Indians in the prep rankings. The Vikings rest in third place in the state ratings, while the Indians are one notch lower in fourth.

For the season, the Vikings hold a slim edge in scoring with 115 points in five games, and the Indians have racked up 110 points in as many encounters. Defensively the local 11 looks the best on paper, having allowed only 12 points to be scored against them, while the Vikings have had 32 points scored against them.

Tonight's battle rates as a toss-up. No one seems willing to go out on a limb to pick a winner, though the home team is favored locally. The visitors pack a weight advantage in the line — averaging 294 pounds per player in the forward wall to an average of 183 for the Indians.

Vengeance Eyes

Last year the Indians squeezed out a thrilling 14-13 win over the Vikings who went on to finish second in the state. The Viki's will be out to avenge the loss, but the Indians will have their tomahawks out and waiting.

North Salem started the season with a decisive 28-6 win over South Salem. They went on to down Klamath Falls 13-12, Sweet Home 22-0, Albany 26-7 and Corvallis 26-7. On the other hand Roseburg opened by blanking Grants Pass 15-0, edged Springfield 7-6, then romped to a 20-0 victory over North Eugene and a 47-9 win over Thurston before blasting North Bend 21-6 last weekend.

With the cry of "all the way this year" being heard in Roseburg, the Indians will be up for the invaders. Starting with the kickoff at 8, a healthy group of players under the tutelage of Roy Thompson will be after the Viking scalp.

North Salem is also in good shape with no major injuries. It will be ready to go at the sound of the opening whistle according to coach Spike Hillstrom.

Brothers Leads Attack

The backfield chargers of the Indians will be led by quarterback Paul Brothers. Brothers, a top runner, and a better than average passer, will call the signals and engineer the Roseburg drives. During the season this junior quarterback has exhibited top form from his position.

Handling the majority of the rushing chore will be halfback Al Joelson and fullback Mike Flury. Joelson came to life two weeks ago when he used his speed to pick up 183 yards against Thurston, then came back last week with 109 yards against North Bend. The speedy halfback has good power for the plunges at the center of the line, and his breakaway speed makes him a definite threat on the outside.

Flury, the 210-pound fullback, has been the workhorse for the Indians. Using his bull-like power, the big fullback crashes through the line for good gains. He is averaging 5.3 yards-per-carry — 421 yards for 81 carries.

Playing wingback and completing the Roseburg backfield will be Bruce Long. Long has good speed and is capable of taking passes from Brothers. Backfield reserves expected to see action include Jim Beamer, Dick Gwaltney, Bill Kirkpatrick and Lance Casebeer.

Palm Target

In the line all-state end Ray Palm will be the target for Brothers' aeriels, while at the other end Pete Rutter will also come in for his share. Inside Palm and Rutter will be tackles Doug John and

Tom Hobbs, guards Roh Welch and Paul Nolte, and center Bob Roark.

Defensively Gwaltney, Casebeer, Kenny King, Glen Goddard, and Bruce Hanford will enter the Roseburg lineup.

North Salem's attack will find Darrell Elfeldt calling the signals. Although he does not rely on his passing, Elfeldt is capable of proving dangerous through the air. Surrounding the quarterback will be halfbacks Jim Kelly and Jim McCandless, along with fullback Gary Collette. Collette is the power runner of the backfield for the Viki's using his 195-pound frame to charge through the lines of the opposition.

Weight Up Front

Up front is where the Vikings have their weight with five of the seven starting linemen weighing in at over the 200-pound mark. The tackle slots have the majority of the weight with Dan Clark at 217 and Wayne Looney at 222 filling the holes. Completing the line for the Viki's will be "Punk" Wells and Don Causy at ends, Walt Looney and Roger Brooks as guards and Bill Richie as center.

Defensively Dean Pade, Gary Hindman and Dick Montgomery will work in the line, while Larry Wright, Loren Whittaker and Kent Evans will back up the forward unit.

Lewis And Clark Nation's Runnerup

KANSAS CITY (AP) — Despite a resounding loss to Linfield last weekend, Lewis and Clark of Portland is the No. 2 team in National Association of Intercollegiate total offense statistics.

Lewis and Clark has gained an average of 448 yards per game, trailing only Panhandle A & M of Oklahoma, which has averaged 479 yards.

Linfield is 14th with an average of 355.

Four Oregon small college backs are tightly bunched in fifth through eight positions in rushing statistics.

Bob Pennell of Oregon College is fifth with an average of 121.5 yards a game. Following him are Mickey Hergert, Lewis and Clark, sixth with 120.6 yards; Gary Grill, Lewis and Clark, seventh with 115.3 yards; and Steve Beguin, Linfield, eighth with 113 yards.

Jerry Linton of Panhandle A & M leads with an average of 167 yards per game.

Linfield quarterback Bill Parrish is eighth in passing behind Jan Lloyd of Occidental of California. Parrish has completed 33 of 70 passes. Lloyd has connected on 46 of 87.

Val Barnes of Linfield is eighth in receiving with 16 catches for 258 yards and an average of 86 yards a game. Moses Scott of Bloomsburg, Pa., leads with an average of 125 yards a game.

BAYER LEADS

ONTARIO, Calif. (AP) — A 6-under-par 64 has projected long-hitting George Bayer of Miami into the lead for the \$20,000 Ontario Open golf championship.

Bayer, one-time University of Washington tackle, had 33-31 Thursday on the 6,600-yard par 36-34 — 70 Whispering Lakes course, but he was only one stroke ahead of Jon Gustin of Gladwyne, Pa., at the end of the first round.
