U. S. Ryder Cup Team Takes Lead

LYTHAM ST. ANNES, England (AP)—Surprised in the very first match when Gene Littler and Doug Ford were beaten, the United States swept the next three matches for a 3-1 lead in the Ryder Cup golf matches today at the end of the four morning foursomes.

Littler and Ford went down before Christy O'Connor and Pete Alliss, 4 and 5, to the delight of a crowd of 12,000.

The favored Americans quickly bounced back.

Art Wall and Jay Hebert beat John Pantun and Bernard Hunt 4 and 3 to tie the score. Then Billy Casper and Arnold Palmer put the Americans ahead by defeating Dai Rees and Ken Bousfield, 2 and 1. Bill Collins and Mike Souchak widened the margin by beating Tom Halliburton and Neil Coles, 1 up.

Four more 18-round foursomes will be played this afternoon over the par 35-36-71 course of the Royal Lytham and St. Annes course.

Sixteen single matches Saturday wind up the competition.

Program To Menace College Sports Gambling Proposed

KANSAS CITY (AP)—A sweeping program to combat the menace of gambling to intercollegiate athletics has been proposed by officers of four national administrative and coaches' organizations.

Released through NCAA headquarters here, the proposals were directed to officers of the 575 NCAA institutions and the entire memberships of the National Association of Collegiate Commissioners, the American Football Coaches Association, and the National Association of Basketball Coaches.

Program Endorsed
Walter Byers, NCAA executive director, said the program was endorsed by the officers of the four organizations following a review of information and suggestions from a variety of college agencies, the New York County district attorney's office, and the U.S. House Representatives' permanent subcommittee on investigations.

Cross Country Swept By RHS

The Roseburg Indian cross country team broke into the win column Thursday with a victory in a three-way meet against the squads of the visiting Myrtle Point Bobcats and the Sutherlin Bulldogs.

The Indians totaled 30 points, well below the total of 42 racked up by the Bobcats or the score of 48 turned in by the Bulldogs.

Sophomore Mike Crunican paced the Indians to their first victory in three starts. He traveled over the mile and eight-tenths course in a clocking of 9:33 to finish well ahead of the other entrants.

Second place went to Fred Lang of Myrtle Point, while third place was topped by Cliff Goin of Sutherlin. Goin ran an outstanding race leading most of the way before Crunican's final burst of speed proved too much for the Bulldog barrier.

Following the top three were two Roseburg aces. Sophomore Bill McClung took fourth place, and junior Mike Harman finished fifth. The first five runners were all under the 10-minute mark. Jim Scott, coach of Al Hoffman for his performance, Scott, who has been sick, came in seventh.

The Indian cross country stars will host Crater and Sutherlin Oct. 18 at 4 p.m., then will meet Grants Pass Oct. 20 at 4 p.m.

Scoring Thursday's meet as a double-duty affair the Indians still won. Over the Bobcats the local stars recorded a 23-32 win, while over the Bulldogs the final tally favored the Indians 22-33.

17 Teams Get Set For Jamboree Of Grade Schoolers On Saturday

The big day is fast approaching for the pee wee football teams with the 17th annual Kiwanis Pee Wee Jamboree set for 7 p.m. Saturday at Finlay Field.

Score will be kept on a North versus South basis, with the accumulative score for the entire evening's action deciding the winner. Competing for the North will be the teams from Riverside, Benson, Wilbur and Huerfano grade schools, while the South contingent will be made up of the teams from Fullerton IV, Green, Rose, Fir Grove and Melrose.

Each school will also have a pep squad which will be given a chance

to perform. During the game the girls will be rooting for their favorites. The performances of the pep squads will come approximately midway during the jamboree with each school getting five minutes to strut its stuff.

The jamboree will open with the Grand March presenting all the teams to the spectators. The first games will get under way at 7:15 with pee wee action featuring Riverside against Fullerton IV, Benson against Green, and Wilbur against Rose.

At 7:30 the heavies will take over, with Benson playing Green, Riverside playing Fir Grove and Wilbur playing Rose. Other pee wee games are scheduled for 7:45

and 8:35, while heavy outtings will be played at 8 and 8:45.

Three games will be in progress at the same time as the teams will play crosswise on the field. Each game will be composed of two five-minute halves, with a one minute break between halves. Special rules have been set up to insure the teams keeping on the time schedule which will end the jamboree at 9.

Mod Turner will be working the clock and the scoreboard for his 13th time in as many years.

Tickets for the jamboree have been on sale since Oct. 6, with the students at the various grade schools competing for prizes for selling the most tickets. All proceeds from the jamboree will be used to finance the pee wee football program as no school funds are allowed for this purpose.

Arnone Takes Lead As Offense Leader

NEW YORK (AP)—Mike Arnone, Cal Poly (Pomona) quarterback who accounted for 311 yards last weekend, takes over as the nation's small college offense leader, the NCAA Service Bureau said today.

Arnone, who had his big day against Redlands, increased his total yards to 729 and supplanted Billy Connors of Salem (W. Va.) who was held to 81 yards.

Connors dropped to fourth with 694 yards.

Sophomore half Bobby Lisa of St. Mary's (Kan.) is second with 708 total yards and leads the rushers with 691. John Giles of Louisville has 701 total yards and leads on the list.

Jan Lloyd of Occidental completed 21 of 30 passes for 283 yards and took over the passing leadership with 46 completions.

Other leaders are defending small college punting champion Joe Roy of New Mexico Highlands who has averaged 48.2 yards on 17 kicks and scoring leader John Nachtsheim of the University of Minnesota at Duluth, who has 68 points.

In the Northwest Conference the key game will pit Willamette against College of Idaho. The game will be at Caldwell, Idaho, Saturday afternoon.

College of Idaho came up with unexpected strength last weekend, downing Pacific 32-0. It will be the first conference game for Willamette, a pre-season favorite to challenge Linfield for the conference title.

Linfield will be host to Chico State in a non-conference game Saturday night. Lewis and Clark will be at Whitman in conference contest.

In the Oregon Collegiate Conference the big game will put Southern Oregon at Portland State. The Portlanders pulled a 13-7 upset of Oregon Tech last weekend. It will be the first conference game for Southern Oregon.

Oregon Tech will try to get back on the winning track, playing host to Eastern Oregon. Oregon College of Education, which downed Eastern Oregon 34-14 last weekend, will play Pacific of the Northwest Conference in an afternoon game.
