'61 Cranberry Harvest Is Now In Full Swing

POOLTON Consumer Marketing Agent Written for The Associated Press In Pacific County in Western Washington the cranberry harvest is in full swing and a good crop is expected this year by the growers. Cranberry relishes and salads will be tempting additions to meals this week, particularly when you are serving pork or poultry. With most fruits ranging in the moderate price range, Jonathan apples are generally being offered at reasonable prices and are one of the best values in the Pacific Northwest. However, supplies of this variety are well-patched and the apples should be used soon after purchase. Delicious and Rome Beauties are in the moderate buy group. Tokay grapes are in lighter supply now, with the Emperor variety replacing them gradually. Although similar in color to Tokays with their red skins, the Emperor clusters are not as compact in appearance, and the flavor is less sweet, yet they are crisp and refreshing. Small size grapefruit are being featured by some stores at attractive prices. Pink grapefruit are still in heaviest supply including those from Florida and the Ruby Reds from Texas, with smaller quantities of white grapefruit arriving, also. Good quality cantaloupes are still available from California and Christmas or Salers melons are coming to market. Large size grapefruit, oranges, lemons and lemons are moderately priced, along with Bartlett and Anjou pears. Pomegranates and persimmons are in good supply, too. Currently there is a wide range in price and type of avocados on the market, with the large-seeded Florida avocados and a few of the pear-shaped Fuertes from California available, as well as a limited quality from Mexico. The second grade Fuertes may be slightly lower in price and quality should be compared with price in selection of the fruit. Fresh dates are increasing in supply and some stores are pricing them very moderately. Local potatoes, winter squash, particularly Marbled, cauliflower and lettuce are good buys in vegetables. Oregon cabbage and carrots are in good supply at low prices, also, and some stores are featuring turnips, parsnips and rutabagas as excellent values, also. In the moderate price group are artichokes, Kentucky Wonder wonder beans from California, beets, broccoli and Brussels sprouts. Frost in lowlands in Washington has brought the early harvest to an end and supplies are short from other sources, now. Fryers continue at a low point. According to information received by the Consumer Marketing office of Washington State University, there is some indication of an upward price trend in the fryer market in the southern states, which could result in a corresponding firming of local market conditions.

Consumers may notice a scarcity of red snapper and sole in the fish departments this week, since adverse weather has prevailed in the fishing areas. However, there is an ample supply of fresh silver salmon from coastal waters, and Pacific oysters are an excellent value in seafood. BEARS ARE TRANSFERRED PORTLAND, Ore. (AP) — Black bears are destructive nuisances in tree farms by causing bark to peel from young trees, but a humane way of controlling them has been developed by trapper Jack Aldrich. He has devised a light-weight foot snare that holds the animal unharmed until the trapper comes along and transfers it to another section of forest where young trees are not being nurtured.
