

Rural Electric Group Favors Power Inter-Tie

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP)— Eugene, Ore., was chosen for next year's meeting Nov. 12-14 and John Norlin of Redmond, Ore., was elected to the national executive committee by the Western region of the National Rural Co-operative Association Tuesday.

Before adjourning the 1961 session delegates also passed a resolution asking Congress to investigate "propaganda, power pricing policies and lobbying activities" of private utilities.

A Kennedy administration spokesman told the meeting that the partnership power development program introduced by the Eisenhower administration "no longer is operative as national policy."

The spokesman, Kenneth Holm said, "We believe the nation's resources should be managed in the broad public interest, not for selfish, narrow advancement at the public's expense."

Other resolutions urged the Interior secretary to designate Southern Idaho and Northeastern Nevada as part of the Bonneville Power Administration service area; favored a power intertie between Bonneville and California; re-affirmed support of the public power preference clause, and called for completion of generating facilities at the Hanford atomic plant.

New Intercept System Told By Air Force

HANSCOM FIELD, Mass. (AP)—The Air Force reported recently that a new communications system can make interception of a target by a fighter plane just as automatic as it is with an unmanned missile.

Maj. Gen. Kenneth P. Bergquist of the electronic systems division of the Air Force Systems Command announced successful testing of the new communications setup.

Known as the Time Division Data Link (TDDL) it is nicknamed "Tiddle" by the project personnel. Gen. Bergquist explained that it enables one machine to give instructions to hundreds of airplanes faster than any other known means.

When an aerial target is detected, TDDL receives command instructions from a computer in coded form. The computer directs distribution of the commands to transmitter sites scattered throughout the country and then beamed to aircraft.

This makes it possible for the central battle station to do almost everything for the pilot—once he is airborne—except fire his guns or rockets.

Kidnaper's Appeal Denied By Court

ST. LOUIS (AP)—An appeal from Hiller A. (Red) Hayes to vacate a 99-year-prison sentence for kidnaping was denied Tuesday by the U.S. Court of Appeals. Hayes and a woman companion were convicted of forcing three persons into a car in St. Louis on June 5, 1960 and holding them hostage during an ensuing police chase.

Mrs. Vivian Darlene McCracken, 35, of The Dalles, Ore., Hayes' companion, pleaded guilty to kidnap charges and was sentenced to 35 years in prison.

Solon Expresses Pride In Record Of Congress

PORTLAND (AP)— Sen. Maurice B. Neuberger, D-Ore., expressed pride in the 87th Congress' record Tuesday.

But, he said at a news conference, some important unfinished matters were left for the next session, including medical care for the aged, establishment of a committee on consumers' interests and creation of an Oregon dunes national seashore area.

Mrs. Neuberger returned only recently from a tour with a Senate subcommittee of 15 African nations.

She is expected to stay in Oregon until the new Congress convenes Jan. 10.
