Beavers, Indians Compared As The Title Game Looms

Sporting identical 11-0 records the Roseburg Indians and the Beaverton Beavers will square off Friday night at Multnomah Stadium in the battle for "all the marbles."

The championship outing finds the No. 1 and 2 teams in the state matched in a battle for the state A-1 crown. The Indians ended the season ranked as the top team on the prep polls, pulling in all but two first place votes on the AP poll. The Beavers followed the Roseburg 11 in second place.

Both teams have top flight offensive units backed by rugged defensive squads. Defense has been

the key to the Indians climb. Four teams have managed to score a total of only 26 points against the local gridder. Beaverton has given up 46 points to five opponents.

The Tribesmen have trailed twice during the season. Against Springfield, the Indians were forced to score in the closing minutes to edge the Millers, while they were forced to overcome a one-point halftime deficit to drop North Salem's Vikings. Beaverton has also been behind twice—trailing Clackamas, 6-0, in the early stages and North Salem, 13-6, at one point in the first half last week in the semifinals.

Though not as spectacular as some defensive units, the Indians manage to get the job done when the chips are down. Roseburg is unscored on in the playoffs. It has successfully protected its end zone for 17 consecutive quarters.

Offensively, the Indians have racked up 222 points, and the Beavers have hit paydirt for 279 points.

First Two Won
The Indians opened the season by rolling to a 13-0 victory over the Grants Pass Cavemen in a non-league outing. In Midwestern League (District 5-A-1) the Tribe edged Springfield's Millers, 7-6, in a thriller, then blasted North Eugene, 20-0, to serve notice of its intentions.

Continuing to dominate league play the Indians whitewashed Thurston's Colts, 47-0, and tripped North Bend's Bulldogs, 21-6, to move in front in the standings.

Roseburg stepped out of league play the next week to give the then-undefeated North Salem 11 a 13-7 setback and move into second place on the prep polls behind Beaverton. The Indians followed the North Salem triumph with a 13-7 victory over a strong Marshfield team to jump into first place, one step ahead of the Beavers.

Ending league play with a 25-0 victory over South Eugene's Astorians the Indians earned a berth in the state playoffs. Warming up for the quarterfinal game against Grants Pass, the Indians trounced the Cottage Grove Lions, 20-0, to keep their perfect record intact.

Title In Sight
Meeting the Cavemen for the second time the Indians rolled to a 21-0 victory to get a chance at the Jesuit Crusaders in the state semifinals. A 19-0 win over Jesuit gave the Indians the chance at the state championship.

Beaverton won the Metro League (District 3-A-1) title with a perfect 9-0 mark. The Beavers gave notice of their power early in the season with 26-0 and 27-0 wins over Astoria and David Douglas, the defending state champ.

The Beavers kept their winning streak going with a 33-0 win over Gresham, a 26-7 victory over Milwaukie and a 35-7 triumph over Sunset. Though Clackamas took an early lead against Beaverton, it was to no avail as the Beavers came back strong to grab an 18-6 victory.

Centennial of Gresham became the next victim of the Beaverton machine as it fell 39-7; then the Beavers blanked a tough Hillsboro squad 12-0. Beaverton wound up league play with a rousing 20-0 win over Central Catholic.

Entering the playoffs against Jefferson of Portland, winner of the PIL crown, the Beavers took to the air to record a lopsided 19-0 win. In the semifinal game Beaverton dropped North Salem, 28-19, after battling the Vikings to a 13-13 deadlock at halftime.

Roseburg sports a well-balanced offense with quarterback Paul Brothers, halfback Al Joelson and fullback Mike Flury leading the rushing attack. Passing Brothers and end Ray Palm, a pair of all-stars, team up to give the Indians one of the best aerial comers in the state. In addition to Palm, Brothers has good targets in end Pete Rutter and backs Bill Kirkpatrick and Bruce Lom.

Beaverton relies on its ground game to roll over the opposition, though the Beavers have proved deadly when forced to take to the air. The running of fullback Don Aberg and halfbacks Dan Clausen and Brian Sinnerud led the Beavers' charge, while Sinnerud handles the passing which is used mostly to keep the opponents off balance.

In the forward wall, the Indians will find themselves outweighed by 11 pounds per player. The Beavers, led by all-state guard Rudy Dierichs and all-state center Ron Vrlicak, pack an average of 194 pounds per man in the line, while the lighter Indians average 183 pounds.

In 1957 Casanova took a completely unheralded team into the Rose Bowl against top-rated Ohio State and lost a heart-breaker by the margin of a field goal. His 1960 squad earned a bid to the Liberty Bowl where it bowed to a mighty Penn State unit. Going into this weekend's battle against OSC, the Oregon teams coached by Casanova have built up an outstanding 54-32-5 record in 11 years.

Tickets for the banquet are on sale at J. C. Sporting Goods, the Umpqua Hotel and Roseburg Bowl. A special block of tickets for the parents of the players has been set aside and may be picked up or reserved at the Douglas County State Bank.

Texas Clash Holiday Fare

Texas, sidetracked in its rush toward the national championship five days ago, will try to pick up the pieces against Texas A&M Thursday in the top game of a thin collegiate Thanksgiving Day football schedule.

Texas Christian cut down the Longhorns, 6-0, last Saturday, so whatever the outcome against the Aggies, it will provide little solace, except for a berth in the Cotton Bowl.

In other games, Maine and Massachusetts play for the Yankee Conference championship, Richmond meets William and Mary, Virginia Tech tangles with VMI (both Southern Conference contests), Colgate goes against Brown and Memphis State takes on Chattanooga.

Despite the fact that their national title hopes have been shattered Texas still is on the spot against Texas A&M. A loss to the Aggies also could leave the Longhorns on the outside looking in at the Cotton Bowl.

Texas and Arkansas are tied for the Southwest Conference lead, each with a 5-1 record. If Texas whips Texas A&M and Arkansas gets past Texas Tech — as it should — Saturday, the Longhorns and Razorbacks would finish deadlocked for the lead.

The host spot in the Cotton Bowl then would go to Texas on the basis of a 33-7 victory over Arkansas earlier in the season.

Syracuse is expected to decide today whether to play in New York's Gotham Bowl on Dec. 9 or Philadelphia's Liberty Bowl on Dec. 16 — or no bowl at all.

The Gotham bowl has said it would like to pair Syracuse against Notre Dame in a replay of the Irish's controversial 17-15 victory over the Orange last Saturday. But Notre Dame has a policy of not playing postseason games and no doubt will decline.

The make up the Gator Bowl in Jacksonville, Fla., on Dec. 30 was tentatively set Thursday night.

Georgia Tech will face Maryland if the Terps win their season finale from Virginia Saturday. Yellow Jacket players voted unanimously to accept the bid. Official acceptance, under Southeastern Conference rules, must await Georgia Tech's final game against Georgia on Dec. 2.

Coach George Wilson of the Lions said he received word the other soldiers would fly here from Ft. Lewis, Wash.

Wilson, fed up with the Lions' inability to win at Tiger Stadium, sought—and received—permission to have his players wear road uniforms against the Packers. Five of Detroit's six victories occurred in road games when the Lions wore white shirts.

The uniform gimmick is something Wilson is reluctant to discuss.

The rest of the NFL teams will enjoy turkey Thursday and wait until Sunday to play. The big one pits first-place New York against Cleveland in a battle of Eastern Division leaders. Philadelphia plays Dallas, Los Angeles meets Chicago, Minnesota plays San Francisco and Washington plays Pittsburgh in the other Sunday games.

Packers To Get Hornung Back On Thanksgiving Day
DETROIT (AP) — The Detroit Lions will have a gimmick. But the Green Bay Packers will have P.T. Paul Hornung.

The U.S. Army is giving the National Football League's leading scorer back to the Packers for their Thanksgiving Day showdown clash with the Lions.

Green Bay, leading the Lions by 1½ games in the tightened Western Division scramble, also will be bolstered by soldier-players Ray Nitschke and Boyd Dowler. The second-place Lions will be strengthened by the return of John Gordy.

Thursday's battle will be nationally televised (CBS, 12 noon EST) and will lure a sellout crowd bettering 53,000 into Tiger Stadium.

CORVALLIS (AP) — The Oregon State football team was scheduled to hold its last heavy workout today before its big traditional game against Oregon Saturday.

Trainer Bill Robertson made no detailed report but said some of the squad's injured players might be ready for Oregon.

Among those not playing last weekend were guard Roos Cariga, fullback Tom Gates, halfback Gene Hilliard, ends Paul Seale and Skip Russell, quarterback Rich Brooks and linebacker John Farrell.

Coach Tommy Prothro has returned to completely secret practices this week. But Tuesday he gave his views on the Oregon team at a boosters-press luncheon.

"Any club that can play Ohio State three touchdowns to two and Minnesota two touchdowns to one has 'to be awfully good,'" he said.

"Ohio State and Minnesota are probably the two best in the Big Ten. They may even be the best in the nation. Yet Oregon performed creditably against both."

Asked about Oregon's sensational halfback, Mel Renfro, Prothro replied:

"His specialty is just about everything. He can run outside, run inside, catch passes and throw passes. You can't get much better than that."

The Oregon State and Oregon freshman football teams will close their football seasons with a Thanksgiving morning game at Corvallis.

The Oregon team will be trying to make it two straight unbeaten Frosh seasons. The 1959 Frosh squad won 4-0. This team is 2-0-1, having beaten the Oregon State, 12-0, in an earlier game, and Washington, 15-0. It tied Washington State, 14-14.

OSU 1-1-1
Oregon State is 1-1-1. It stamped the Washington Frosh, 46-8, last weekend but lost earlier to Washington State, 22-20.

Oregon State's hopes rest heavily on the passing of quarterback Grodon Queen from Berkeley, Calif. Against Washington last week he connected on eight of 11 passes for three touchdowns and 217 yards.

Oregon is expected to go to the air frequently, too. Quarterback Mike Brundage, from Roseburg, has accounted for three touchdowns with 185 yards. He will alternate with Terry DeSylvia, another fine passer who led David Douglas of Portland to the 1960 Oregon class A-1 high school title. DeSylvia has been out most of the season with an injured hand.

Other Oregon backfield starters will be Cary Tommermasson of Oregon, Calif., and Ron Martin of Portland's Jefferson at halves, and Ted Dimmick at full.

Tommermasson has been the team's top runner: threat with 78 yards on 16 carries.
