A red 1965 Stanley Steamer, which was also auctioned, and the beige and brown Chrysler formerly belonged to the late James Melton, noted singer.

A. R. Simonds, curator of Rockefeller's Museum of Early Americana at Pettit Jean State Park, paid \$3,700 for the Stanley and \$2,700 for the Chrysler.

J. W. Strawn Jr. dropped out when the bidding reached \$2,600 on the Chrysler.

"I'm only nostalgic about \$2,600 worth," he said later. "But they were classic cars."

Sutherlin Education Board Eyes Building - Street Jam

The Sutherlin Board of Education at its meeting this week received accounts payable including a billing from the Pacific Power and Light Co. for installation of the power line into the new junior high school, thus completing the program to be included in the master metering plan.

A report was heard from the committee appointed by the board chairman to investigate the hand-building-street problem indicated by the city. The report included plans for remodeling the present building to remove that portion now projecting into the street area and availability of other buildings either private or district owned. A decision was finally made for the board committee to seek an audience with the city council at its March meeting.

A representative from the Minneapolis-Honeywell Corp. explained to the board a contract for servicing heating controls in the school buildings. The service contract covers general maintenance, emergency service and replacement of controls. After discussion of details of the program it was decided that it was desirable that the district have this type of preventive maintenance.

A letter from Kenneth Barneburg, Secretary of the Douglas County reorganization committee, was read. The reorganization board requested that the boards of education in the school districts of Oakland, Umpqua and Sutherlin indicate to them a date for a hearing on the question of reorganizing these districts into an administrative school district.

After a discussion of the many issues involved in such an undertaking, the Sutherlin board instructed that a letter be written to the reorganization committee indicating a willingness upon the part of the board to meet at any time, but suggested a later date in the year as more advisable because of the many activities now confronting the board.

In other action the board approved the application of NDEA applications in the fields of science, mathematics and foreign language as prepared by the instructional staff.

A discussion was held concerning the removal of the old house on the new junior high school site. It was reported that the person removing the structure had difficulty in completing the job because of the road conditions into the site. The mover did, however, indicate to the district clerk her planned intention to complete the project and has asked for an extension of time. The board agreed to extend March 10.

Contracts of school district administrators were reviewed by the board. All administrators were rehired for the coming school year.
