

Reclamation Bureau Nixes Proposed Hinkle Creek Dam

A proposed dam on Hinkle Creek east of Sutherlin for flood control and irrigation appears doomed as far as the Bureau of Reclamation is concerned.

Ben Irving, county Water Resources Survey engineer, made the announcement at a meeting of the Roseburg Rotary Club in the Umpqua Hotel Thursday. He was the featured speaker at the Rotary Club's annual Farmers' Day.

Irving said a reconnaissance report from the bureau indicates the dam would not have a favorable comparison of cost to benefits.

Olaia Favorable
However, his attention during his speech was primarily focused on the more favorable Olaia Creek dam on which studies are still continuing.

Irving said the proposed dam appeared to have an "extremely favorable" cost-benefit ratio of 1 to 1.78. He said the completion date on the final study is sometime in August of this year. He said the report was being delayed some because of the additional federal agencies which had to be brought in for studies.

He said the dam is now being studied for a capacity irrigation use for 14,400 acres. It was considered originally as a structure to back up 29,000 acre-feet of water. Now, Irving said, the Bureau thinks its capacity might be doubled if it is possible to meet all demands. The indicated cost for irrigation water users is \$8.70 per acre per year.

Payment Not Substantial

He said the proposed Tiller dam on the South Umpqua was also called feasible by the Bureau of Reclamation but irrigation-use payments would not pay a substantial enough part of the cost.

Turning to other subjects, Irving said he is sure flooding in the county can never be fully controlled. "We have the damsites but they

All items already by the school district have already been removed.

The building is to be turned over to the city of Sutherlin March 31. It will be used in connection with a fire school in a few weeks, according to Mrs. Jerry DeMuth, correspondent.

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Sutherlin School Budget Explained By Superintendent

The proposed 1962-63 Sutherlin School District budget is designed to make allowances for continuing increases in enrollment and improvements of school facilities.

Supt. Ray Mullen lists these provisions in the budget as some of the educational highlights.

1. Addition of a professional growth plan for the instructional staff.

2. An increase of 3 1/2 teachers to meet increased enrollment and special needs such as special education, speech correction and guidance.

3. Revised school insurance program designed to better meet needs of the district and still effect savings.

4. Capital outlay for improvements including a fence around the playground at the East Sutherlin Elementary School, landscaping, blacktopping and graveling around the new junior high, painting at the east, west and high schools and extensive roofing repairs at east and west schools.

5. Probable expansion of commercial facilities to meet enrollment increases.

The budget amount of \$467,555 outside the 6 per cent limitation will be voted upon May 7. The total budget is \$700,824.

Forest Personnel To Hear Soil Man

Dick Alvis, soil scientist, will speak to district rangers, assistant rangers and supervisory personnel of the Umpqua National Forest at a meeting Monday at Steamboat.

Alvis will explain his map, recently completed, in which the soils of the Umpqua National Forest have been classified. From here, Alvis will move to the Siskiyou forest to make a similar classification.

Forest Supervisor Vondis Miller said about 20 Forest Service personnel will attend. The meeting is the regular planning session, usually held each month in the Forest Service offices in Roseburg.

Jackie Takes First Ride On New Pakistan Horse

RAWALPINDI, Pakistan (AP)— Jacqueline Kennedy tried out her new Pakistani horse today and then received in this capital city the biggest welcome it has ever given a foreign visitor.

Almost everyone in Rawalpindi, population 400,000, turned out to greet America's First Lady.

Crowds jammed the streets waving thousands of paper flags and placards saying "Long live Mrs. Kennedy."

Drum and bagpipe bands serenaded her at various points along the six-mile, flag-covered route from airport to city.

It was a thrilling welcome like many Mrs. Kennedy has received in other Indian and Pakistani cities since arriving 12 days ago.

But this morning the 32-year-old First Lady had the experience of riding Sardar—Chief—the bay gelding given her Thursday in Lahore by President Mohammed Ayub Khan.

Tiny California Town To Host U.S. President

PALM DESERT, Calif. (AP) — This tiny community 100 miles southeast of Los Angeles gets a second guest of presidential rank when John F. Kennedy arrives today.

Former President Dwight D. Eisenhower made his first visit here, during his tenure. He liked it so well, he returned after he left the White House. He and his wife, Mamie, are spending the winter in a modern house at Eldorado Country Club.

In contrast, President Kennedy will spend the weekend in antique splendor.

Although no official announcement has been made, it is known that he'll be the guest of singer Bing Crosby. The Crosby home, modern on the outside, is a treasure trove of furnishings from San Simeon, the castle retreat of the late newspaper publisher William Randolph Hearst.

Robert Kennedy Turns Limelight On Blushing Spouse At Concert

WASHINGTON (AP) — It was Marian Anderson's concert but Robert F. Kennedy turned the limelight on his blushing wife and almost stole the show.

Some 800 dignitaries had settled into their seats Thursday night at the State Department auditorium for the third in a series of Cabinet concerts when the attorney general strode out on the stage to introduce the famed contralto.

"Miss Anderson has had a very traumatic experience today," said Kennedy. "She tells me my wife picked her up today and insisted on singing to her in the car. Fortunately, she has recovered from it all."

Out in the audience, Mrs. Kennedy reddened as she became the center of attraction and buried her face in her hands before joining in the laughter.

Kennedy also turned the laughter on himself, saying he felt out of place introducing Miss Anderson.

"I sang in the high school

choir. But when I tried out for it I was informed I was being let in but for the purposes of morale. I was to remain quiet when the singing started."

Then, Kennedy became serious and turned to the business at hand — Miss Anderson. He recalled her Easter Sunday concert at the Lincoln Memorial in 1959 when 75,000 persons gathered to hear her. That was when the Daughters of the American Revolution refused to let Miss Anderson, daughter of a Negro coal and ice man, sing in Constitution Hall.

Then Kennedy turned the stage over to Miss Anderson who sang a concert of Handel.

Earlier in the day, she exchanged gifts with the President at the White House. She gave him a record album of her spirituals and he presented her with an inauguration medal.

"If it's too large to wear on a charm bracelet, I'm going to put it on a chain around my neck," she told reporters.

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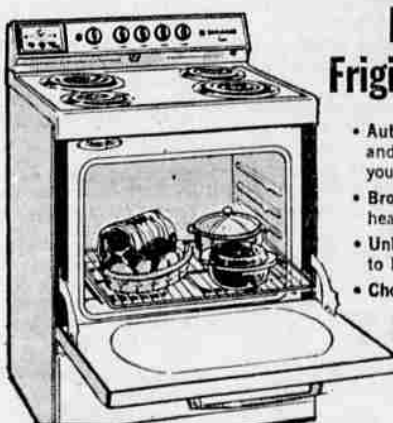
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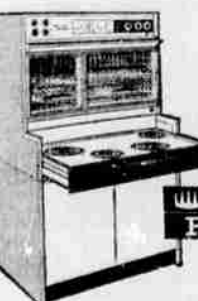
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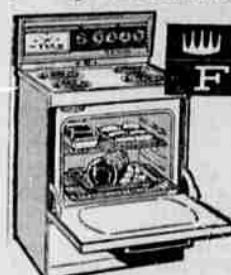
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
