From the state Forestry Department comes an announcement on forest seedlings for planting by Charles H. Ladd. He says the supply of the following species is exhausted until next fall.

They are: Douglas-fir (viridis), noble, grand, white and Shasta fir, Port Orford cedar, Norway spruce, Rocky Mountain juniper and Monterey pine.

Still available from state nurseries for the remainder of this season are: broadleaves, pines, incense cedar and redwood. But, if you are planning to order, do it right away, as applications should reach the state Forestry Department, Salem, by April 2.

Committee Appointed

Probably most of you know that a state Access Advisory Committee was appointed to study recreational access problems. It is also their duty to recommend practices which we hope will help to resolve some of the conflicts between outdoor recreation and other land uses.

Membership of the committee includes representation from agricultural, forestry business and industrial groups, as well as persons from public agencies.

As a method of obtaining information which would enable this committee to provide the governor with meaningful and useful material, a questionnaire has been sent to many rural landowners.

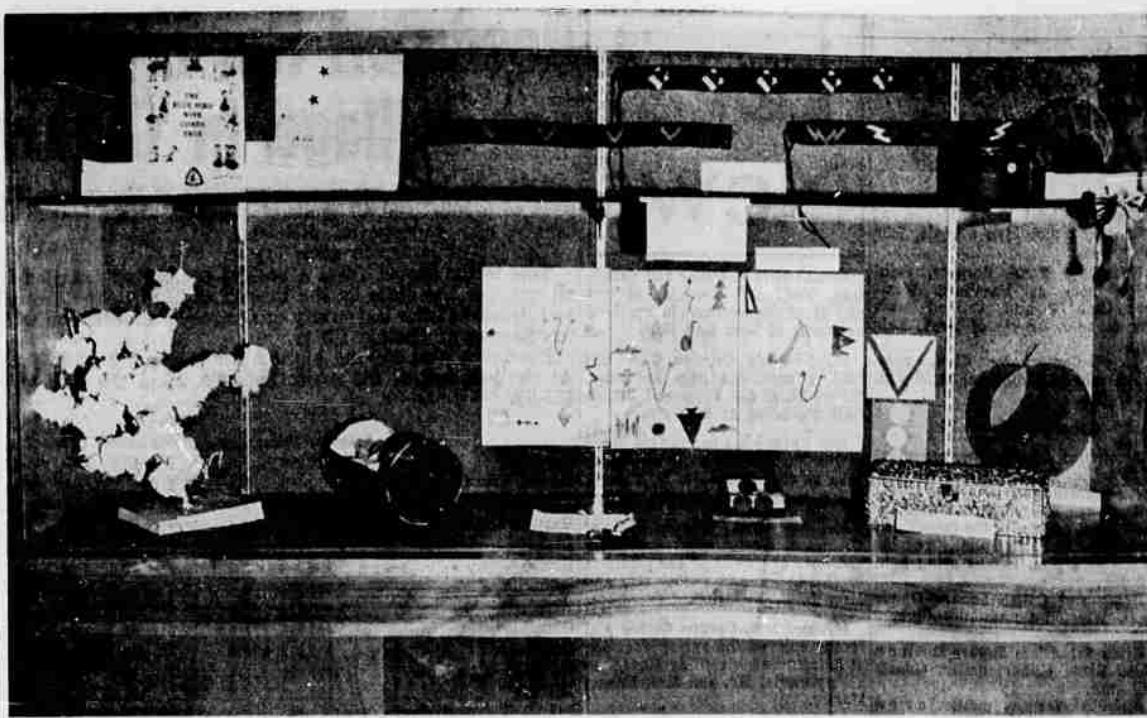
