

Defense Of Western Europe Still Policy Of U. S., Says Kennedy

WASHINGTON (AP) — The White House said today that it has been, and still is, U.S. policy to use "all available means" to prevent the over-running of the West through a massive conventional attack on Europe by the Soviet Union.

This word came in reaction to an article in the Saturday Evening Post by Stewart Alsop quoting President Kennedy as saying that, "In some circumstances we might have to take the initiative" in a nuclear war with Russia.

White House press secretary Pierre Salinger did not verify this or other remarks attributed to Kennedy. But he was ready for a question about the article and read this brief statement to newsmen:

"The quotation given in the Alsop article must be read in total context. The President's statement represents no change in American policy.

"It has always been clear that in such a context as a massive conventional attack on Europe by the Soviet Union, which would put Europe in danger of being overrun, the West would have to prevent such an event by all available means. This has been United States policy since the late 1940's, and it represents no change.

"The real change, as Mr. Alsop points out elsewhere in the article, is in the strengthening of our defensive alternatives to nuclear warfare."

Salinger told a questioner that he had not checked to see whether Alsop quoted the Chief Executive correctly. He said Alsop interviewed Kennedy five or six weeks ago.

Alsop cited a "clear attack on Western Europe" as an example of a situation in which he said Kennedy feels this country must be prepared to use nuclear weapons regardless of the consequences.

He said also, "The President's clear determination to risk nuclear war rather than tamely surrender Berlin has saved Berlin so far."

Florida Trial Set For Pavlick

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) — Richard P. Pavlick, 74, will be taken back to Florida for trial on a charge of threatening to kill President Kennedy Dec. 11, 1960.

Pavlick, retired postal worker from Belmont, N.H., was judged insane after his arrest in Palm Beach, Fla., Dec. 15, 1960. He has been under treatment at the U.S. prison system's Medical Center in Springfield, Mo.

U.S. District Court Judge William H. Becker Monday granted Pavlick's request that he be returned to Florida for trial.

The Medical Center staff said Pavlick's mental condition has improved.

Federal officers have said Pavlick planned to turn himself into a human bomb to kill Kennedy while the then president-elect was vacationing in Florida.

U.S. Baughman, former chief of the Secret Service, wrote in his memoirs that Pavlick intended to crash his car into the Kennedy car and detonate several sticks of dynamite. The man changed his mind when Mrs. Kennedy and their children appeared with Kennedy, Baughman wrote.

Pavlick told newsmen after his arrest that he intended to take Kennedy's life because of the "unbearable way he was treated."

"Kennedy simply bought it," Pavlick said. "I was a poor man and he was rich."

Pavlick said he was determined to kill Kennedy.

Hit-Run Accident Reported To Police

Report of a hit-and-run accident was made to Roseburg City Police by a witness before the owner of the damaged car knew about it.

The accident occurred about 5:10 p.m. on SE Main St., about one-half block south of SE Lane Ave. on the west side of the street. A 1959 model car, registered to A. and Velma D. Metzger, was parked at the curb. When a 1953 model, four-door, light gray Pontiac parked behind it started to leave the curb, it struck the left rear light and bumper, scratching the bumper and denting the ring around the tail light.

The suspect was observed to get out, look at the damage, return to his car and drive off in a hurry. The witness waited for the owner, but when no one showed up, he reported the incident to the police.

The name of the suspect was obtained by police.

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Bend Police Back To Seeking Clues

BEND (AP)—Police were back today to the point of looking for new clues in the Feb. 2 killing of Judi Reeder, 17.

They still had Donald Ben Doran, 34, in jail but the case against him was raising almost as great a puzzle as the killing itself.

"We're reasonably sure he was in Watertown, S.D., the afternoon of Feb. 2," Police Chief Emil Moen said today. "And if he was there on the 3d, he certainly wasn't here the night of the 2nd."

But Doran's presence in Watertown the day after the pretty high school girl was slain and her body left under a footbridge in Drake Park, had not been positively established. Only probably.

"We still have checking to do," the chief said, adding, "We have witnesses who identified him here, too."

Doran was arrested last week when his replies in the course of a routine automobile check aroused suspicion. Soon he told of killing the girl when she threatened to call police as he approached her in the park.

And then, almost casually, he remarked that he had been in Watertown, S.D., a few days after the killing. Police checked this out and found a man answering Doran's description had worked at a bakery there for several days, starting the afternoon of Feb. 3, in the jail a few days later.

But he was not fingerprinted; the only identification was by description and by photograph.

Doran, a transient, has little schooling and seems confused about dates, the police chief said. But he told details of the killing that police thought only they knew. "Everything added up," said Moen. "If he wasn't here, it's uncanny."

"We are still investigating."

Sutherlin Man Draws Jail For Vagrancy, Auto Counts

Gilbert Semor Cobb, 64, of Sutherlin, will serve concurrent jail terms in the Douglas County jail in connection with charges of vagrancy and reckless driving.

Cobb, who pleaded guilty to both counts on arraignment before District Judge Gerald R. Hayes last Friday, appeared for sentencing Monday afternoon.

The defendant was sentenced to 60 days in jail and fined \$75 on the vagrancy charge and was ordered to serve 30 days and fined \$125 on the reckless driving complaint.

Hayes stipulated the jail sentence should run concurrently. The vagrancy charge stemmed from a disturbance Thursday night at the Tee Pee Tavern north of Roseburg. A deputy of the Douglas County Sheriff's Department arrested Cobb, who had left the tavern prior to the deputy's arrival. Both complaints were issued the same evening.

Also in District Court Monday, Henry Charles Slayton, 62, Sutherlin, was sentenced to 60 days in jail and fined \$150 and costs for conviction on a charge of driving a vehicle while under the influence of intoxicants.

Indian Treaties Frustrate Men Who Enforce Oregon Game Laws

SALEM (AP) — The men who enforce Oregon's fish and game laws are frustrated in their attempts to make Indians obey these laws. They wish Congress would help out.

Capt. Irving A. Larson, who heads the force of 89 state police officers in the Fish and Game Division, says he almost never wins a case against an Indian.

"The Indian treaties," he said, "were written 100 or more years ago. They don't take modern conditions into consideration.

"We can't enforce conservation measures when the Indians can use their treaties to break our laws."

Some Yakima Indians are fishing at the mouth of a stream that is the connection between a federal hatchery and the Columbia River. They threaten to destroy the hatchery by taking the fish on their way to spawn, Capt. Larson says.

Capt. Larson's men have been trying to prosecute these Indians, although the hatchery is on the

Washington side of the river. Officers from Washington and Oregon have jurisdiction over the entire river.

He said the Yakima Tribal Council has a policy of obeying the Oregon laws on the Columbia. Apparently, those violating the laws are doing it in violation of the council's rules.

But Capt. Larson points out that the attorney for the Tribal Council is defending the fishermen.

The officers are having difficulty on a closed portion of Catherine Creek in Union County. The Indians, of the Umatilla tribe, fish there because they say the closure is not a conservation measure because part of the stream is still open.

The state police have been trying to stop Nez Perce Indians from Idaho from hunting deer out of season on federal lands in Walla Walla County.

The state officers enforce the laws on federal lands, too.

Capt. Larson can cite many other Indian problems.

He hopes Congress might clarify the issue so that his officers and the Indians would know just where they stand.

Stop To Pick Up Boy Results In Collision

When Albert Lawrence Paulson, Idleyld Route, drew his car to a stop on the North Umpqua Highway to give a boy walking along the side of the road a ride, a rear-end collision resulted.

The accident occurred one-half mile past the Buckhorn Rd. scales. State police report that a second car, driven by Reeva Matilda Malone, Winston, was following the Paulson vehicle east when the latter car suddenly stopped to pick up the boy at the edge of the road.

The Malone vehicle, however, was not able to stop in time and slammed into the rear of the Paulson car, police said. Reeva Paulson was taken to Douglas Community Hospital by Billy Mohr ambulance and treated for minor injuries. A passenger in the Malone vehicle, Diana Grace Malone, and Paulson escaped injury. The Malone car was towed to Roseburg by Mohr's towing car.
