League Of Women Voters Publish Pamphlet On 'Politics Of Trade'

With interest so high in world trade, the Roseburg League of Women Voters is now stressing a study of it and doing its best to bring county citizens into the study.

Representatives of the league have been making presentations to county leaders of a booklet called "Politics of Trade." It was just published by the League of Women Voters of the United States.

Booklets have been presented to State Sen. Al Flegel, state Reps. W. O. Kelsay and Sidney Loken, News-Review Editor Charles Loken, candidates for nomination in the party primaries and to the high school, junior highs and county library. The pamphlet has also

gone on sale.

The pamphlet explores the evolution of our trade policy up to the present and discusses political pressures on which decisions are made and factors for making evaluations.

In making the presentations, President Mrs. James Lombard said: "Although the 'Politics of Trade' by no means offers the reader all the answers to perennial questions, it does bring the reader up to date on trade. In 1962, when the Trade Agreement Act comes before Congress for debate, it is important for the citizen to know the global arena."

The league is planning a public meeting in April at which an expert from the University of Oregon on the subject of trade will be the speaker.

Timber Operators Form Local Group

A Douglas Timber Operators organization has been established in the county designed to discuss common problems and create a better understanding between industry and government agencies selling timber.

The next meeting of the group is scheduled April 18 at 6:30 p.m. in the Bamboo House on NE Diamond Lake Blvd. The topic for discussion at this meeting will be road maintenance. Bud Lowell of Drain will be moderator.

At the organizational meeting, 29 men, representing 17 lumber and construction companies attended. A steering committee was appointed to select topics and obtain speakers for future meetings.

With Dick Grant of Oakland as chairman, members of the committee are: Bud Lowell, Tom Clark, Tom Lindblom, Bob Lock- linder and Burt Holt, all of Roseburg; Don Brown of Glider; Bud Johnson of Riddle; and Chuck Lewis of Dillard.

Featured speaker at the organizational meeting at the Bamboo House was Howard Emrich of the U.S. Forest Service. He reported on standardization of road staking and flagging. He said the Forest Service is now using a standard method of staking and color coding for the entire Umpqua forest to eliminate confusion to the industry when it is appraising timber sales in several different districts.

After a discussion from the floor on the matter, the group generally agreed the standardization procedure would help.

Days Creek Board Rehires Personnel

Paid Travel To Resume For Military Families

WASHINGTON (AP) — Government-paid travel of military families to Europe will resume by early May, key Pentagon officials predicted today.

Such travel by wives and children of Army, Navy, Air Force and Marine officers and men was suspended nearly six months ago at a time when the Berlin crisis military buildup was in full swing.

The Defense Department said then that the requirements for moving 40,000 regular Army reinforcements to Europe made necessary the suspension of dependent travel.

This troop movement is long past, but the Kennedy adminis-

tration has kept the dependent travel suspension in force as one way of cutting down the still bothersome drain of gold and dollars.

All the services have urged that the restriction be lifted, arguing that it is creating a morale problem and inhibiting re-enlistments.

No decision has been announced but there are strong hints one is imminent.

Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara hinted as much in a letter to Sen. A. Willis Robertson, D-Va., in which the Pentagon chief said the suspension policy "now is generating very serious personnel problems for the armed forces."

At the same time, McNamara indicated other steps may be taken to control the size of the military dependent population overseas.

Meanwhile, Secretary of the Army Elvis J. Stahr Jr. said in a speech prepared for a Bethany College convocation in West Virginia that "one of our great needs at the present time is the early resumption of dependent travel to overseas areas so that our soldiers can benefit" from the influence of family life.

Before the cutoff, an average of 9,147 military dependents went to Europe each month at government expense.

Since the suspension became effective last Oct. 9, a total of 19,400 military dependents have paid their own way to Europe to be with their menfolk. They have not been permitted to live in government supplied quarters, but have had to make their own arrangements.

Because of this self-financed travel, the dependent population in Europe is virtually the same as it was just before the suspension went into force. It now totals 318,908—only 764 fewer than last Oct. 1.

Sutherland Slates Safety Effort

Sutherland will soon be the scene of a "Be Prepared for Accidents" campaign.

The house-to-house project will begin Monday and will be conducted by Boy Scout Troop 31. Members of the troop will visit every home in the community.

The homeowner will be given a first-aid chart showing approved procedures for dealing with various types of accidents. Scouts will offer assistance in checking first-aid supplies to see if they are adequate for accident emergencies.

Where inadequacies are revealed, members of the troop will show a variety of first-aid kits which may be bought from a local drug store. Profits from sale of the kits will be used for Scout activities.

George Warren, scoutmaster, said, "We hope our campaign will alert our entire community to the importance of being prepared to give accident injuries prompt first aid."

Warren announced that the Court of Honor for the Sutherland troop. It will begin with the Sutherland troop at 6:30 at the Christian Church social room. Straub Favors Neuberger Bill

Candidates for U. S. representative in the 4th Congressional District continued to line up on the Sand Dunes National Seashore question this week.

Robert W. Straub said in a report today he favors the Neuberger bill with a compromise in regard to acquisition of private property in the park area.

This bill would establish a park under the direction of the National Park Service, Sunday, one of his opponents, Charles Porter, also of Eugene, said he would be willing to accept establishment of a park set up by either the National Park Service or U. S. Forest Service.

He, too, indicated the Sen. Wayne Morse compromise against condemnation of private property.

Straub says he supports the position taken by Morse that the right of eminent domain is too severe a recourse for the acquisition of private property in this case. He said he would support the Neuberger bill if the right of condemnation is left out.

"The status and national attention which comes with a national park will provide far-reaching economic benefits to the economy of the coast region which would not be realized as fully if the development were done under any other federal agency."

Mrs. Maurine Neuberger, who is sponsoring the bill which calls for National Park Service administration, has not yet indicated her feeling on the Morse compromise.

Poison Oak Relatives Produce Tasty Foods

CORVALLIS (AP) — Almost everyone shuns poison oak, but plants related to it are responsible for such tasty food items as cashew nuts, pistachio ice cream and others.

Oregon State University scientists say poison oak is from the anacardiaceae or cashew family and really not connected with the oak family.

Most of the poison oak's relatives grow in warmer climates. Pistachia vera, a small tree native to the Mediterranean and the Orient, is responsible for pistachio ice cream. Another relative of poison oak produce mango fruit in India and Burma.
