



FISHER HAS BREAKDOWN — The New York Daily News said Wednesday in a copyright story that singer Eddie Fisher has entered a psychiatric hospital for treatment of a nervous breakdown. Eddie Fisher Suffers Breakdown After Hours Of Marriage Collapse

NEW YORK (AP)—Eddie Fisher is in a hospital here. The New York Daily News says the singer, "crushed by the apparent collapse of his marriage with Liz Taylor has suffered a nervous breakdown and is a patient behind locked doors in a private hospital."

Fisher's personal manager, Milton Blackstone, says, "There's nothing mentally wrong with him."

Blackstone said Fisher entered a hospital for rest and relaxation and is scheduled to leave Friday. "He has a lot of work to do and some recordings to make," Blackstone added.

Blackstone said later that Louis Nizer, counsel for Fisher and Elizabeth Taylor, had issued this statement:

"Mr. Fisher is simply resting for a few days at a general hospital at the suggestion of his physician, Dr. Max Jacobson. All rumors of a more serious illness are unfounded."

"I have advised Miss Taylor in Rome of Eddie going to a hospital for a brief rest and she is comforted by the fact that the published statements of his condition are untrue."

The copyright story in the Daily News said, "The prospect of divorce proved too much for the young singer."

The Daily News said Fisher is in Gracie Square Hospital.

The hospital, which has a general division and a psychiatric division, said it has no patient registered as Eddie Fisher.

Fisher, 33, who arrived in New York from Rome on March 21, seemed normal last Sunday night when he appeared on television here (CBS-TV "What's My Line?").

Miss Taylor, 30, recently was linked romantically with Richard Burton, her male lead in "Cleopatra." The Fishers and Burton, who is married, have denied the reports.

The Daily News story, by Robert McCarthy and Sidney Kline, said Fisher was attended Wednesday by two psychiatrists and two nurses and described him as "pale, his eyes glazed, his bushy hair rumpled, in need of a shave. He did not respond to questioning by a News reporter."

Forest Sales Up For Fiscal 1962

More National Forest timber was sold and harvested during the first half of fiscal year 1962 than in the corresponding period a year ago, reports J. Herbert Stone, Regional Forester, U. S. Forest Service.

Harvest volume increased 230 million board feet, and the volume sold was 164 million board feet greater, Stone said. Total harvest the first half of the fiscal year was approximately 2 and one third billion board feet. Volume sold during the period totaled a little over 2 billion board feet.

The average appraised price of stumpage sold in the last six months of 1961 was \$13.23. The average price bid was \$17.52 per thousand board feet, or an average of 32 per cent above the appraised price.

Stone said that most contracts entered into during the last half of 1961 in western Oregon and Washington contained the provision for quarterly adjustment of stumpage rates. The adjustment is equal to 50 per cent of the change in the index price of lumber and plywood.

Riddle Teachers Sign Contracts

Two teachers have signed contracts to teach in the Riddle school system next year.

Mrs. Naomi Smith of Tri-City will instruct third grade and William J. LeMaster of Newport will teach upper grade physical education and other subjects.

LeMaster graduates this spring from Linfield College with a master of science degree. Riddle school officials said LeMaster will coach elementary football and assist in basketball.

Republican registration as of March 20 stands at 11,838 while the Democratic figure is 15,778, Yost reported. Total registration including all party affiliations was reported at 28,141.

"We are particularly interested in registering newcomers to the area, residents who have changed address since the last election and persons who allowed their eligibility to become invalid by failing to vote in the last election," the chairman said.

He said the registration effort indicates an apparent 200 gain for the Democratic party.
