

Five Men Face Death For 'Planned' Murder

PHOENIX, Ariz. (AP) — Five young men face possible death sentences in a clumsy slaying for which they claim they were hired and coached by the victim himself.

Four of the five, all Phoenix Negroes, admitted taking a retired Albany, N.Y., jeweler, Samuel L. Resnick, into the Arizona desert and tugging on opposite ends of an 18-foot rope to strangle him. The fifth told of setting it up because Resnick said he had an unbearably painful, incurable cancer and wanted his wife Lillian to collect \$50,000 life insurance.

Story Disputed

The cancer story is disputed by medical evidence; the insurance angle by Resnick's family. But the state says it doesn't matter. Pre-meditated killing still is murder, punishable by death in the gas chamber.

Held on first-degree murder charges are Clemmie Jackson, 19; his brother, R. E., 21; Ernest Spurlock, 29; John Henry Lewis Jones, 21, and Jesse Tillis, 19.

A preliminary hearing in the case has been continued to Wednesday following two days of testimony.

Sheriff's Capt. Ralph Edmundson said all five of the defendants, questioned separately, gave this version of the crime down to virtually the last gruesome detail.

Resnick, 61, contacted Clemmie Jackson Feb. 25 by answering a job-wanted advertisement in a Phoenix newspaper. He told the youth what he wanted and offered him jewelry valued at more than \$5,000 if the killing could be made to look like a robbery-murder.

Jackson Backs Out

Clemmie Jackson enlisted the four others but backed out before they met for their rendezvous with Resnick.

According to plan, Resnick went for a stroll after dinner March 1. A short distance from his moderately priced home in northwest Phoenix, he climbed into a car with R. E. Jackson, Tillis, Jones and Spurlock.

They drove about 10 miles to a remote spot in the desert and got out of the car.

"Do a good job," the four quoted Resnick as telling them.

"I don't want to suffer."

The long rope, half an inch in diameter, was looped around Resnick's neck. Standing two on each side of the short, balding victim, the four men pulled on the rope. It broke.

Victim Demonstrates

The four said Resnick then told them, "Here, let me show you how," doubled the rope for them and added: "I'll get on my knees this time."

Arranged to create the appearance of robbery, the slain Resnick's pockets were turned inside out.

"We got the jewels," R. E. Jackson told officers, "but found only 25 cents."

Resnick's body was found three days later by a man riding through the desert on a horse.

Quinn Requests Kennedy's Aid In Ship Strike

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Hawaii Gov. William F. Quinn, personally finding both sides in the West Coast shipping strike "hopelessly deadlocked," has turned again to President Kennedy for help.

Quinn flew here Thursday from his strike-blocked state, could make no dent in the two-week shutdown and then found that even nonstrike ship lines could not promise delivery of food and essential supplies before May. He returned to Hawaii Friday.

"I am convinced that only your action can bring them together," he wired the President from San Francisco after the fruitless trip.

He said the strike against the Pacific Maritime Association was threatening the islands with unemployment and business shutdowns that could "increase in geometric progression to disastrous proportions as time goes on."

Quinn had sent two previous wires to Kennedy asking intervention.

Hawaii Sen. Hiram L. Fong in Washington wired Kennedy that "a prolonged strike would be calamitous for Hawaii," and urged him to appoint a commission to study the strike and report in three days.

In Honolulu, however, a federal judge ruled that 370 tons of perishable flour and baking products should be unloaded from eight freighters idled in the harbor.

Other businessmen quickly followed the lead of bakery interests and prepared requests for orders to remove other goods.

Military cargo is already being moved, thanks to an earlier agreement in federal court between the warring factions.

Quinn, when he learned that East Coast and Gulf Coast ships could not guarantee any deliveries for a month, told a news conference emergency air flights and release of military supplies in the islands were under consideration.

Reston Man Faces Contribution Count

Michael Arnold Smith, 19, of Reston, is scheduled to go on trial Monday on a charge of contributing to the delinquency of a minor in the court of Circuit Judge Charles S. Woodruff.

One secret indictment was returned.

An order to dismiss a charge of assault with a dangerous weapon against Roy King, 51, of Coos Bay, was dismissed on motion of the district attorney, on grounds that there was no evidence other than presumption that the gun in the defendant's possession was loaded, whereby it may have been a dangerous weapon. Further King has pleaded to another offense involving the same transaction. He is now serving time for vagrancy.

Whiskers Bend Impoundment Gets Fish Check

The Oregon Game Commission was prepared today for either good or bad news.

The Whiskers Bend impoundment is being emptied, the remaining fish counted and released. Following today's operation the commission will know whether the impoundment during its first season of operation has been successful.

The game commission last year completed an artificial lake adjoining the county park at Whiskers Bend. Seventy-thousand steelhead trout in the "swimmer-up" stage (fish which had just shed the egg sac) were released into the pond. They have since existed on natural food, getting no supplementary feeding.

Temperatures Rise

The water reached high temperature during the summer. The regional office of the Game Commission reported that the warm water may have caused some loss. On the other hand, it was impossible, it was stated, to determine the extent of the loss, and it may be that survival has been satisfactory.

The first year's experience, according to James Vaughn, Roseburg regional director, has furnished data expected to result in improved yields in future years.

The water is being drained from the impoundment today. As the water level drops, fish are released through an outlet pipe into a concrete tank. From this tank they are dipped into a tub containing a liquid anesthetic. The fish are instantly stunned, in which state they are counted, weighed and marked, through fin clipping, to permit future studies on the proportion of return.

Released into fresh water, they revive quickly and proceed into the main river to start their migration to the ocean.

Timing of the release is determined by a change in the fish's coloration, it is stated.

When the fish are ready to start they lose their gill spots, take on a darker hue and become slimmer in body configuration. They are reported to be about 6 inches in length.

ROME (AP)—Elizabeth Taylor and Richard Burton went night-clubbing in Rome early today.

Earlier, Eddie Fisher, in New York, denied that his marriage with the film star was on the rocks. Miss Taylor thus far has declined to make any statement backing up Fisher's denial.

Instead, smiling happily, she and the 36-year-old Welsh-born Burton, who plays "Anthony" in "Cleopatra" went on a round of the nightspots into the dawn hours.

A photographer caught them at 3:30 a.m. at the exit of "Brick Top's," a popular Rome nightclub where they had spent two hours.

Actually, Miss Taylor and Burton—both smiling broadly—appeared almost willing to pose. Liz, dressed in a leopard-skin coat and hat, held Burton by the arm.

Then they dashed for his big American automobile and roared away, losing pursuing photographers on the road to Ostia Antica.

Miss Taylor and Burton have been reported being together frequently off the set, but this was one of the few times that they appeared publicly.

The Italian news weekly "Gente" of Milan published a telescopic shot of the 30-year-old actress and Burton kissing while not on the Cleopatra set at Rome's Cinecitta. Both wore three-quarter length bathrobes over their costumes.

In New York Friday, Fisher admitted that his wife refused to issue a statement denying reports of their estrangement.

During a news conference at the Hotel Pierre, he said that rumors of a breakup with Miss Taylor were "preposterous, ridiculous and absolutely false."

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International Team Schedules Inspection Test

WASHINGTON (AP) — International inspectors will arrive soon at four U.S. atomic plants for what a U.S. spokesman calls a dry run to prove international inspection will work.

The four peaceful-use reactors opened to the international sleuths for the first time are the graphite research and medical research reactors at the Brookhaven National Laboratory, N. Y.; the experimental boiling water reactor at Argonne National Laboratory, Ill.; and the organic cooled and moderated power reactor at Piqua, Ohio.

The inspectors for the International Atomic Energy Agency will come to this country under an agreement signed Friday by the United States and the agency.

The technical aim is to prove that the atomic facilities are not being used for military purposes, to train the inspectors and to work out any kinks in the inspection system that might be uncovered.

There is also a political goal from the U. S. point of view: to knock a hole in Soviet claims—advanced at the Geneva conference and elsewhere—that the inspections the West says are needed for arms-cut accords are unworkable and are really designed only for espionage.

Assistant Secretary of State Harlan Cleveland, in signing the agreement for the United States, called it "a dry run to find the bugs in the system, to prove that it is possible technically, politically, administratively."

Another U.S. authority added that the inspectors would be limited to the four designated facilities—among the hundreds of nuclear installations scattered through the United States—and not be allowed to "shop around" elsewhere.

Under the agreement, which runs from one to two years starting June 1, 12 inspections a year will be permitted at the Brookhaven graphite research reactor, two at the Brookhaven medical research reactor, four at the Argonne plant and two at Piqua.

The agency has yet to appoint its inspectors. Russians could be on the inspection team.

Donnelly, who patterned after Roseburg High School's nickname, has been chosen as the name. There will be 16 alleys.

Several Oregon Localities Set Daylight Time

With daylight saving time scheduled to begin in the Portland metropolitan area and its four surrounding counties in less than a month, here is the situation in other Oregon communities:

The Central Oregon Chamber of Commerce has voted to go on the fast time starting April 29. The chamber represents Jefferson, Deschutes and Crook counties. City and government office workers will not change their clocks, but go to work an hour earlier and finish earlier. All others are expected to change their clocks.

In Eastern Oregon, the Baker Chamber of Commerce and Retail Trade Commission have decided to go on the fast time from May 27 to Sept. 3.

In Northwest Oregon, several communities have decided to adopt the unofficial fast time.

The McMinnville Chamber of Commerce voted to turn the city's clocks to Daylight Saving Time April 29. Most of Yamhill County is expected to follow suit.

The Astoria Chamber of Commerce decided March 9 that city would go to the unofficial fast time April 29 through Sept. 29.

In Lincoln County, it looks as if the situation will be as confused as it was last year. The Oceanlake City Council voted for Daylight Saving Time, but the board of directors of the Newport Chamber of Commerce decided to stay on standard time.

The Eugene chamber said early in March it would take no action to change the clock this year, but the Corvallis City Council and Chamber of Commerce decided in favor of the fast time.

This represents an amalgamation of administration proposals with substitutes offered by Senate Republicans. Many believe it will get top-heavy Senate approval. The Senate is scheduled to begin debate on it Monday.

\$100 Million Asked

Kennedy originally asked for authority to purchase \$100 million in 25-year, 2 per cent interest U.N. bonds as financial assistance for U.N. operations in the Congo and the Middle East.

The Senate Foreign Relations Committee defeated 8 to 7 a substitute proposal by Sens. Bourke B. Hickenlooper, R-Iowa, and George D. Aiken, R-Vt., for a three-year loan to the United Nations at prevailing rates, about 3.5 per cent.

The committee then approved a proposal for the outright purchase of \$25 million in U.N. bonds, with the provision the United States would make additional purchases up to \$100 million by matching other nations' subscriptions.

Although the administration reportedly had rounded up a majority of Senate votes for this proposal, Kennedy was represented as feeling that U.S. support of the United Nations would be made suspect by any close vote.

In three days of dickering, administration leaders and Senate Republicans got together on the compromise proposal.

Under its terms, the President would be able to fix the interest rates at 2 per cent and extend the loans to 25 years if he chose, which is what he asked originally.

The compromise was expected to head off a proposal by Sen. Richard B. Russell, D-Ga., that the United States limit its special financial help to writing off \$38 million in debts the United Nations owes this country.

Russell also proposed that use of U.S. military equipment or personnel in U.N. operations would have to be authorized by Congress.
