

Nasser, New Rebel Leader Appeal For Bloodless Solution In Syria

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP)—President Gamal Abdel Nasser of the United Arab Republic and a new commander of the pro-U.A.R. army rebellion in northern Syria appealed today for a bloodless solution of Syria's military crisis. But the rebels declared they were strong enough to win victory.

A statement issued by Nasser's office in Cairo said the president, who lost the Syrian branch of the U.A.R. in a revolt last Sept. 28, is ready to exert every effort aimed at preserving Syria and averting bloodshed.

From the rebel-held Syrian city of Aleppo, 400 miles to the north-

east, Col. Luayy Atassi broadcast a call to the military junta running the Damascus government for a truce.

Atassi announced that he has taken command of the forces in Syria's northern region which rebelled Monday against the junta and called for reunion with the United Arab Republic.

Atassi's truce appeal was broadcast shortly after Radio Damascus transmitted a junta ultimatum to the Aleppo garrison to surrender or be considered in mutiny and punished accordingly.

Implying that the junta already had troops afield, Atassi urged it

to halt movements toward Aleppo to prevent bloodshed and preserve unity to the ranks.

The rebel radio, which described itself as the voice of the U.A.R., said the colonel had imposed a curfew on Aleppo "to pave the way for the northern command to settle the national problem quietly and wisely." To protect civilians, it said, the rebel garrison will not fire a shot "and we shall not raise our arms against our beloved army."

This followed an air raid scare. An hour before the announcement of Atassi's assumption of command, an excited voice on the rebel radio said "planes of acrobats"—meaning the air force of the high command in Damascus—were trying to bomb the Aleppo transmitter, 40 miles south of that city. The speaker appealed to the U.A.R. to send planes and paratroops to help the rebels.

Circuit Court Trial Continues For Smith

The trial of Michael Arnold Smith, 19, of Rt. 4, Box 1010, Roseburg, was continuing in the Circuit Court of Don H. Sanders today.

Smith is accused of contributing to the delinquency of a minor, as the driver of a car which transported three other males and a 16-year-old girl out on a country road, where the girl was sexually attacked.

Dist. Atty. Avery Thompson, in his opening remarks, stated that no attempt would be made to implicate Smith with the attack, but that it would be up to the jury to determine whether Smith contributed to the girl's delinquency by his acts.

The three other men each have pleaded guilty to contributing. One has been sentenced, and the others are awaiting pre-sentence investigation. The three face further charges of conspiracy to commit rape.

The jury was selected at 11:23 Monday. Opening statements were given by Thompson, and Defense Attorney William Jones, with testimony being taken in the afternoon and today.

Centaur Rocket Test Set Friday

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP)—After months of frustrating delays, the initial test flight of the high-energy Centaur space rocket is set for Friday.

The National Aeronautics and Space Administration announced the two-stage rocket will be launched on an intended ballistic trajectory lasting 15 minutes. The vehicle should reach an altitude of 300 miles before plunging back into the Atlantic Ocean, 1,175 miles from the starting point. No payload will be carried.

The test will provide the first flight data on how powerful liquid hydrogen will behave in space. This supercold fuel, which must be kept at a temperature of 423 degrees below zero, provides 40 percent better performance than chemical fuels employed in present U.S. rocket engines.

Two liquid hydrogen engines with total thrust of 30,000 pounds drive the second stage of the 107-foot Centaur. The first stage is a modified Atlas missile with 367,000 pounds of thrust. This combination is capable of placing 8,500-pound satellites into earth orbit, landing 2,300 pounds on the moon, or hurling 1,300 pounds to Mars or Venus.

These weights are considerably greater than the capability of this nation's biggest present space booster, the Atlas-Agena B. Centaur is expected to fill a gap between Agena B and the more powerful Saturn class of boosters being developed.

Problems encountered in developing liquid hydrogen as a propellant delayed the launching nearly a year. NASA feels the troubles have been licked, but officials do not expect a perfect flight on the first try.

Ignition of the second stage is not a primary objective. Officials are more interested in how liquid hydrogen operates in the weightless environment of space.

A television camera, designed to snap a picture every two seconds, has been mounted on the forward bulkhead of the hydrogen tank to observe what happens to the hydrogen—whether it curls up in a ball, sticks to the side of the tank or becomes a gas. More than 500 channels of information will be radiated during flight.

The findings will set the pattern for future Centaur research flights, at least seven of which are planned before useful payloads are carried. Liquid hydrogen also will be used on upper stages of Saturn and later Nova space rockets.

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"Elizabeth and Eddie Fisher announce that they have mutually agreed to part," the announcement said. "Divorce proceedings will be instituted soon."

The announcement brought crashing down a mountain of suspense built up in recent weeks by Miss Taylor's interest in her "Cleopatra" costar Richard Burton, and Fisher's desperation in denying that a break was imminent.

Now there remain other suspenseful questions: will Burton, 36, become the 30-year-old actress' fifth husband? What of his wife, Sybil, and their two children, now sitting in seclusion in London?

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Blast Property Damage Claims Totals Cut By Special Master

Property damage claims from Roseburg's Aug. 7, 1959 blast were cut back \$641,000 from an original \$6,723,770 by Special Master David Sandberg who reviewed the more than 3,000 claims.

Payments would be on a basis of about 12 1/2 per cent for uninsured claims put at \$920,071; 10 per cent for subrogated insurer claims at \$5,105,820, with alternative allowance at \$5,149,835; 100 per cent for United States of America claim of \$49,372, and 25 per cent for Oregon National Guard claim of \$17,500.
