

Rusk Asks Passage Of Foreign Aid Bill

WASHINGTON (AP)—Secretary of State Dean Rusk called on Congress today to pass President Kennedy's foreign aid bill in the name of the security of the free world today and the shape of the world of tomorrow.

Opening testimony before the Senate Foreign Relations Committee in behalf of Kennedy's \$4.9 billion foreign aid program, Rusk declared:

"The task of transforming the social and economic structures of less-developed countries around the world will involve their energies for years to come.

"Our own effort, relatively modest though it be, will require persistence and an assurance of continuing interest.

"The stakes are the security of the free world today and the shape of the world of tomorrow."

Despite Rusk's plea, Congress appears likely to whack a sizable sum off the presidential foreign aid request this year as it has in the past. Initial hearings on the aid program for the fiscal year starting July 1 had been held previously in the House.

The secretary of state disclosed a second major U.S. aim in extending military assistance abroad. The primary goal in the past has been to boost the defenses of U.S. friends against external and internal Red attack.

In extending \$1.5 billion in arms aid the coming year, Rusk said, the government is emphasizing

civic works that foreign armies can perform in backward areas in addition to their defense efforts.

"Wherever possible," he said, "forces receiving military assistance are encouraged to participate in developing public works programs such as road-building, sanitation and communications."

Rusk also laid heavy emphasis on Kennedy's request for \$600 million for Alliance for Progress aid to Latin America in the coming year as part of a \$3 billion long-term aid authorization extending through 1966.

School Board Waits Cost Information

Discussion of a possible second high school building in the Roseburg School District was a major topic at Wednesday's special meeting of the School Board, but members indicated they needed more information on expansion at the present site before considering a new school.

They indicated they were not fully prepared to consider new property acquisition until they were given a better picture of costs and other factors involved in expanding the present site.

Earlier this year the board appointed architect John Briscoe to present proposals on renovating and expanding the site and his report is still awaited.

One suggestion discussed was the possibility of utilizing the present high school football field for new building construction and preparing a new athletic stadium at some other location.

The board also discussed at length the various factors involved in the matter of having one high school or two high schools within the district. For instance, building a second high school would require duplicating shop, laboratory and other equipment.

Also involved is the athletics situation. Creating two smaller high schools could result in weaker Roseburg competitive representation in high school sports, it was pointed out.

Man Pleads Guilty To Driving Charge

George William Wittick pleaded guilty to a reckless driving charge in the Circuit Court of Don H. Sanders Wednesday. He was fined \$250 and sentenced to five days in jail, the jail sentence to be suspended on payment of the fine.

Wittick originally had been convicted in Reedsport Justice Court of drunken driving on Feb. 2. He was arrested Oct. 18 by state police on Highway 101 near Reedsport. He had appealed the conviction. He was permitted to plead to the lesser charge, and the drunken driving charge was dismissed. The remainder of his \$500 bail was refunded.

Norman Thomas Chappel, Canyonville, has appealed a drunken driving conviction from the South Douglas Justice Court of Nina Pielzold at Canyonville to Circuit Court. He was arrested Feb. 19 and found guilty on trial March 7 and fine of \$250 and 30 days were imposed. Oral notice of appeal was made at the time of sentencing.

Jay Alford, 69, Myrtle Creek, Wednesday pleaded innocent to a charge of carrying a concealed weapon, on arraignment before District Judge Gerald R. Hayes. He was accused of carrying a revolver without a license on April 2. He was represented by Dudley C. Walton, attorney. Trial is set for April 18 at 2 p.m.

Chest X-Rays Due Soon At Sutherlin

The mobile chest X-ray unit, sponsored by the Douglas County Health and Tuberculosis Association, will be at Nordic Plywood Co. in Sutherlin Wednesday, April 10, from 2 to 7 p.m.

According to Edith Dunn, Oakland correspondent, residents of the Oakland, Sutherlin and Umpqua areas are encouraged to get a chest X-ray.

Salvation Army Horn Pilfered

Capt. Leonard Blix of the Roseburg Salvation Army Wednesday reported to Roseburg City Police the theft of an alto horn, valued at \$175 from the Salvation Army building at 507 NE Winchester St. He said the musical instrument had been missing since March 28, but that he had thought a member of the SA band had taken it home to practice. A further check revealed no band member had it.

Oakland Man Faces Charge Of Larceny

William C. Remoir, 41, of Rt. 1, Box 54, Oakland, went on trial at 10 a.m. today on a charge of larceny of sheep. The charge was brought in a Grand Jury indictment of Feb. 9, accusing him of stealing sheep, the property of James G. Edin, on July 28, 1961.

Deputy Dist. Atty. Verden Hockett is prosecuting the case, and Edward Murphy is the attorney appointed by the court for Remoir. The case is being tried in the court of Circuit Judge Charles S. Woodrich.

Judge Woodrich has issued an order dismissing a charge of larceny of more than \$75, valued against Andrew LaMar Padgett, 35, Roseburg, on motion of Dist. Atty. Avery Thompson.

The grounds are that Padgett was tried and the jury could not make a determination as to whether he was guilty or not. He has already served 105 days in the Douglas County jail, pending trial. The order states also that further investigation reveals the property to be of less value than \$75, and it was considered in the best interest of justice that the case be dismissed.

Padgett, along with Jerry Wilkins, 32, Roseburg, was charged with larceny of carpenter tools from the pickup truck of Charles Skates last Dec. 21, a charge to which Wilkins has already pleaded guilty (petty larceny) and is awaiting presentence investigation prior to imposition of sentence.

An indictment charging assault with a dangerous weapon against Peter Oluf Peterson, Westlake, has been dismissed by order of the judge on grounds that 60 days time elapsed from the time he was held to answer in Reedsport Justice Court and the time the Grand Jury indictment was brought. Dismissal was on motion of the defense attorney.

Reorganization Committee Talks Curricula For Enlarged District

A steering committee studying reorganization of the Myrtle Creek, Riddle, Canyonville and Days Creek school districts Wednesday night explored possible curricula for an enlarged district and inquired about cost of such.

Meeting in the Canyonville High School, the committee of two board members from each school board and the four district superintendents examined the curricular report prepared by the Douglas County School office.

W. M. Campbell and William P. Linn of the county office were on hand to act as consultants.

The steering committee, headed by Dr. John Aaronson, requested the county office to prepare such a report. Linn, aided by the district superintendents and half the committee, gathered the material for the report.

After reading of the plans and alternatives and the advantages and disadvantages to the reorganization, the committee during the session requested the county office to determine costs of the various plans. These will be presented at a later date.

In making the curricula report, the county office noted in its recommendation:

"The board members and administrators in the four districts are in a position to give real educational leadership to consolidation which would increase the educational opportunities in the future for the youngsters of the area."

It suggests that a senior high school for grades 10-11-12 be located at the Tri-City School site.

Also, that in the future, when feasible, one or two regular junior high schools should be organized. If two junior high schools are constructed, it was noted, one should be located in the Myrtle Creek area and the other in the Riddle-Canyonville section.

"It appears that financing and planning for the senior high school will present enough problems for immediate consideration," the report continued.

By utilizing the Tri-City School, which now has 400 students, and expanding the school to take care of the estimated 650 high school students, the enlarged district could forestall expansion of other facilities in the district. The report notes that several districts now are facing the need for enlarged seventh and eighth grade facilities. Space made available by moving the high school students to Tri-City could be used for the junior high expansion.

Mother Sets Blaze, Kills 2 Daughters

FORT WAYNE, Ind. (AP)—A mother was arrested today for starting a fire that took the lives of her two girls.

Asked why she did it, firemen said the mother, Mary Ruby, 38, muttered, "The house was dirty."

Mrs. Ruby, who was hospitalized with shock, was ordered held under bond on a preliminary charge of arson.

Her daughters, Catherine, 8, and Patricia, 4, died in the fire that nearly destroyed the family's small frame house here.

Police said Mrs. Ruby admitted starting the fire in a utility room. Firemen said when they arrived she was ripping off her clothes and throwing them on the flames.

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TV Viewers Get Warning On Flights

CHICAGO (AP)—Television audiences must be prepared to witness death in space flight efforts, the administrator of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration warns.

The administrator, James E. Webb, speaking Wednesday at the 40th annual convention of the National Association of Broadcasters, said men died while exploring the earth's unknown regions, and it is foolish to ignore this possibility in the far more hazardous regions of space.

"If we are to ride into space with our astronauts via television, we cannot avoid being there if tragedy strikes," he said. "Perhaps as a nation we can learn that some of the most valuable lessons of space flight come from failures."

The NASA chief noted that by far the largest daytime audience in television's history watched Col. John H. Glenn Jr.'s space flight on Feb. 20, and he praised broadcasters for their extensive coverage.

At one time or another during Glenn's three-orbit trip the flight's progress was followed on television in nearly 44 million homes, Webb said.

"Not since the flight of Charles A. Lindbergh (in 1927) in the Spirit of St. Louis has such a feeling of participation been generated around the globe."

Mrs. Gaillot Quotes Scripture To Support Segregation Stand

NEW ORLEANS, La. (AP)—A Bible-quoting New Orleans Roman Catholic segregationist says she will accept excommunication unless priests show her error in scripture passages which she contends call for racial segregation.

Mrs. B. J. Gaillot, leader of the militantly segregationist Save Our Nation, Inc., group, may get her requested interview today with Archbishop Joseph Francis Rummel. She said the archbishop threatened her with excommunication.

Controversy continues over the archbishop's decision to desegregate all Catholic schools in the New Orleans archdiocese and the more recent decision by a federal judge calling for a complete end of segregation in the first six grades of the city's public schools.

Mrs. Gaillot, 41, mother of three children, said that unless the Bible is brought into her discussion with Archbishop Rummel, "then I will have to bow down gracefully and accept excommunication rather than desert my belief in God."

"My statements about segregation and my defense has always been the Bible," Mrs. Gaillot told a newsman Wednesday.

Here are some of the Biblical quotes which Mrs. Gaillot contends support her stand for racial segregation:

Genesis 27:33 — "And Isaac called Jacob, and blessed him,

and charged him and said unto him, thou shalt not take a wife of the daughters of Canaan."

Numbers 36:9-10 — "And that the tribes be not mingled one with another but remain so as they were separated by the Lord."

Ecclesiasticus 33:11-12 — "With much knowledge the Lord hath divided them and diversified their ways. Some of them hath He blessed and exalted; and some of them hath He sanctified and set near Himself; and some of them He cursed and brought low and turned them from their station."

Ecclesiasticus 13:19-20 — "Every beast loveth its like; so also every man that is nearest to himself. All flesh shall consort with the like to himself, and every man shall associate himself to his like."

Pilot Found Safe

SEATTLE (AP) — A Montana pilot reported overdue on a flight from Seattle to Portland turned up safe Thursday after spending the night in a cleared space about 50 miles from his take-off point.

The Federal Aviation Agency said John Truzzolino of Butte, who left Boeing Field here at 4:30 p.m. Wednesday to fly to Portland, apparently ran into thick weather in the vicinity of Fort Lewis, found a cleared space and landed.

Jury Favors Defendants In Claim For Damages

A verdict for the defendants was returned by a trial jury in Circuit Court Wednesday, in the case of A. H. Berry vs. Sutherlin Truck Service, Inc., E. S. Funderburk and Douglas Construction Co.

Berry, an equipment salesman, suffered injuries to his hand on the property of the Sutherlin Truck Co. May 29, 1961, while checking some steam-operated machinery.

He asked \$7,500 general and \$135 special damages, charging the defendants with negligence. The trial opened at 10 a.m. and the case went to the jury at 11:43 a.m. It returned its verdict at 2:45 that afternoon, denying the claim for damages.

The Roseburg Area Chamber of Commerce has expressed appreciation to students of Roseburg Senior High School for their work "on various projects to beautify our city."

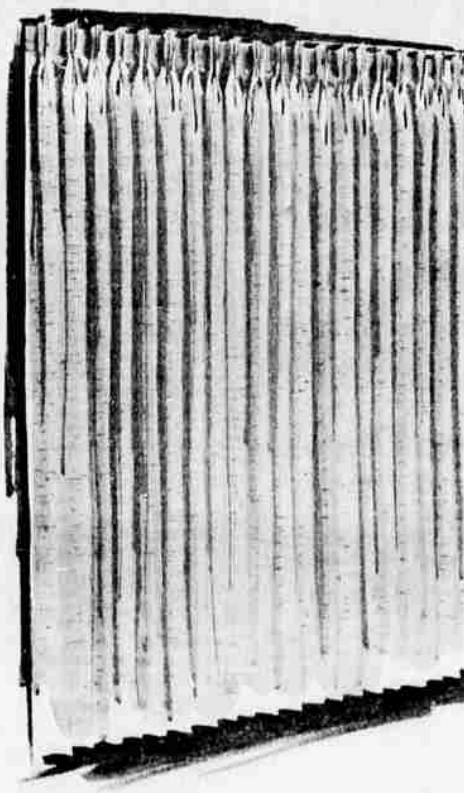
High school students spent last weekend on several major "face-lifting" projects for the community.

Thomas Garrison, president, in letters addressed to the leaders of the several classes, says "We hereby offer our admiration and gratitude for a job extraordinarily well done."

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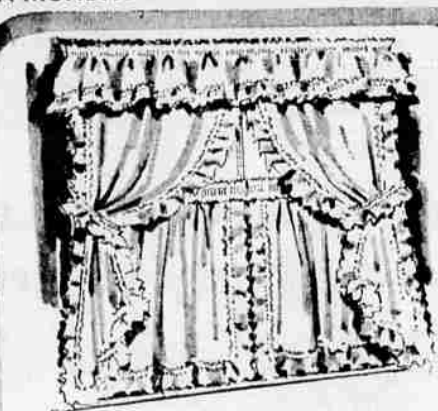
