U. S. Census Report Shows Status Of County Housing

Luther H. Hodges, U.S. Secretary of Commerce, today announced that Douglas County in the 1960 Census of Housing had 22,238 housing units.

Hodges notes that of this figure, 15,124 were in sound condition with plumbing throughout. Of the available units, 19,975 were occupied—13,724 by owners and 6,251 by renters.

In the owner-occupied places, \$9,000 was the median value while \$89 was the median gross rent of the rented units.

An interesting sidelight to Hodges' report noted that of all the occupied units in Douglas County, only 10 had no flush toilet. A total 20,098 had a bathtub or shower.

Officials Attend Training School

County Commissioner Ray Doerner, chairman of the Douglas County Board of Equalization, with Leeland Svarverud, county assessor, and G. D. Myllybeck, county clerk, are attending an in-service training school in Salem today.

The all-day session, sponsored by the Oregon State Tax Commission, is in preparation for the convening of the county board.

Doerner with the other two board members, Harold Woolley and Carl Hill, will convene the board May 14.

Myllybeck, as county clerk, serves as secretary of the board.

The secretary said that 2,003 of the units had basements, and 1,030 of the total were trailer homes.

During the year according to the census, 1,406 households had air-conditioning but 16,535 had television, 18,814 had radio and 14,371 had telephone.

At the time of the census, 16,892 households had washing machines and 8,310 households had clothes dryers.

Home freezers were also counted in the census, with 8,683 households having one or more of these items.

Showing that the county was well-motorized in 1960, the census revealed that 11,621 households had one automobile while 5,893 had two automobiles. A group of 899 homes had three or more automobiles registered for the household. Total number of households with one or more cars was 17,413.

Big Army Ship Can Do Pushups

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. (AP)—The biggest ship in the U.S. Army can do pushups.

An experimental landing craft, the 338-foot long vessel is getting an overhaul at a Jacksonville shipyard. It is named the Lt. Col. John U. D. Page.

The push up part of the ship's design is a special plunger under the bow. This hydraulically operated device permits the ship to push itself off a beach if it goes aground during a landing operation.
