

Downes, Pender Championship Bout Saturday

BOSTON (AP) — Saturday night's middleweight bout between champion Terry Downes of England and former champ Paul Pender of Brookline is the first title fight since Benny (Kid) Paret was beaten to death in the ring against Emile Griffith.

How will this affect the referee in the fight here?

Two members of the Massachusetts Boxing Commission say it will remind them that competent refereeing is a must in any fight — title or otherwise — but it will not make them tend to over-protectiveness.

"Stopping the fight too early, because of a cut that the ring physician does not deem too serious, would be an injustice to the fighters," said Tommy Rawson, a commissioner, a former boxer and referee.

"The Paret fight will serve only to keep them doubly careful to make sure the fight is handled correctly. It won't have any effect, I'm sure, on stopping the fight prematurely."

"It will be a ticklish situation," said Commissioner Eddie Urbee, also a former boxer and referee. "We certainly don't want the bout stopped too hastily, and likewise we don't want it stopped too late. We are going to be careful."

Jones Offers Pre-Tourney Comments As Masters Fan

AUGUSTA, Ga. (AP) — It's tough to battle a course than to battle a man in golf, says Bob Jones.

"I used to lose 10 to 15 pounds every time I played in an open championship," the Grand Slam king from Atlanta recalled today. "I could compete in the match-play amateur tournaments and never lose an ounce."

"In match play golf, where it's man against man, there are plenty of opportunities to relax and blow off steam. In the stroke-play opens, where it's man against the course, one loose shot can cost you the title."

"I guess I worried off the pounds when I played in the opens."

Jones, who swept to 13 British and U.S. national championships before his retirement at the age of 28, said the pressure built up tremendously in 1930 when he scored the game's unparalleled Grand Slam—winning the U.S. Open and Amateur and the British Open and Amateur in 12 months.

"It was the waiting and not the tournament themselves which got me," Jones added. "This was the

most exasperating feature of it. You see, I had to wait from July to September between the British and the U.S. Amateur."

Jones, just turned 60, is on hand for another Masters.

Crippled by a spinal ailment and partially paralyzed, Jones can no longer swing a club. He watches the game's new breed pass by from a wheelchair on the porch of his white cottage, alongside the 10th fairway at Augusta National. Occasionally, he wanders out on the course in an electric cart.

Indians 5-A-1 Diamond Opener Spotlited

Highlighting this weekend's full slate of spring sporting activities on tap for the Roseburg Indians will be the baseball team's Midwestern League opener against the South Eugene Axemen.

The Indians will go into Friday's District 5-A-1 opener with three games under their belts. In the practice outings coach Bill Harper's crew has fought its way to a so-so 1-2 record. The Tribe started off with a victory over Grants Pass, then ended on the short end of a doubleheader at Medford.

Game time at the South Eugene field is set for 3:30 p.m. KQEN will carry the play-by-play action of the game for fans unable to make the trip.

Dick Williams, curve ball artist, boasts Roseburg's lone win, and is the leading pitcher with a 1-0 record. Figured to be the mainstay of the Indian pitching staff is

veteran fireballer Tom Hobbs who was treated roughly at Medford. Other mound aces include Jerry Boucock, Jim Wasson and Jon Burnham.

Behind the plate the Indians have Jim Beamer, sophomore returnee. Around the infield the probable starting lineup will find Dave Sevall at first, Lance Casebeer at second, Marv French at short-stop and either Marshall Cast or Boucock at third. French is competing for his fourth straight season for the Tribe.

In the outfield will be either Hobbs or Wasson in left, Bob Manning in center and Mike Leep in right.

Defending Champs
The Axemen of South Eugene are the defending state A-1 champs as they edged Roseburg in the race for the District 5-A-1 title last year, then went on to win the state crown. Top returnees for the Axemen are a pair of pitchers in the form of lefty Don McNeal and right-hander Jerry Gjesvold. Other

veterans include Duane Brown, Ross Carter, Wayne Smith, Jim Lockard and Jim Jordan. Coaching the Axemen for his first season is Bob Kane.

While the Tribe's baseball team will be opening in District 5-A-1 play, the tennis squad will be out to grab victories number six and seven. Friday the Indians will be at Junction City to meet the Tigers in a 2:30 p.m. match, then will return home to host the North Bend Bulldogs Saturday morning at 10.

Tennis Team Ready
The defending state champion Indians have been triumphant in their first five outings, including a 5-0 win over Junction City. Leading the way with undefeated records for the Tribe netters will be Don Lowe and Doug Green. Lowe and Green are both undefeated in

doubles and singles competition this year. Mike Harmon, Don Harris and Mike Harris have each suffered one singles setback.

Coach Al Hoffman is hoping to give some of his top players some rest this weekend as neither Junction City or North Bend is reported to be too strong. Hoffman wants all his players ready for the following weekend when the Indians meet Springfield, Grants Pass and the OSU Rooks in Friday and Saturday matches, then return to the courts Monday against Eureka, Calif.

CORVALLIS (AP) — Oregon State routed the University of Portland, 13-1, Wednesday for its fifth baseball victory in as many games.

The long contest was halted by rain after eight innings during which three Portland pitchers gave up 14 walks and 11 hits. Oregon State reserves played the first six innings, and Steve Clarke, a sophomore from Springfield, scattered five hits in pitching seven.

Portland's run was unearned. Rick Summey, a sophomore from Lebanon, led the hitters with a double and two singles in four times at bat.

Willamette will be at Oregon State today.

Top stars for the Indians include Mike Crutcher in the mile, Jon Counts in the shot put, Doug Lyda in the discus, Barry Grant in the 440, Bill Brothers in the 100 and 220, Spike Moore in the High jump and Bill Kirkpatrick in the sprints and the broad jump.

The Roseburg Golf team is set for its second outing Friday when Coach Curt Jarvis takes his stars to Medford for a match with the Black Tornado. The action on the Medford greens is set for 1:30 p.m.
