Bud Olsen Leads Canyonville In 5-Way Track Meet Win

Bud Olsen was instrumental in places as he led the host Tigers to a victory in Thursday's five-way track meet.

The final count found the Tigers with 78½ points, compared to 49½ for the Canyonville Bible Academy Pilots. Oakland's Oakers finished third with 33 points, Days Creek's Wolves fourth with 22 points and Riddle's Irish fifth with 20 points. Days Creek's 22 points were won by four boys.

Olsen was the standout of the meet as he took top honors in the high and low hurdles and the pole vault. Olsen also competed for the Canyonville 880 relay team that won a first. Others on the relay quartet were Brent Parsley, Howard Thompson and Fred Grunst.

Grunst accounted for the Tigers' other first place with a javelin toss of 142-4.

Oakland had a pair of double winners in the form of Jim Archer and Bill Fredricks. Archer won the extended 240 and the 440-yard dashes, while Fredricks took the discus, throw and the high jump. Fredricks cleared the bar at 5-10 to win the high jump.

Saturday teams from Seaside, Medford, Tigard, Grants Pass, Springfield, Corvallis, Portland, Florence, Lebanon, Coquille, Silverton, Klamath Falls, Gresham and Vernonia will join with the

teams already present to compete in the five-man squad competition. Saturday the first round will be rolled at noon, followed by sessions at 4, 6:30 and 9 p.m.

The keygers will compete in doubles and singles action Sunday with the opening action starting at 9 a.m. Other rounds Sunday will start at noon, 3, 6 and 9 p.m.

Leaders in the team competition include Club 21 of Portland with a 2,981 total in Class A, Gunson Appliance of Junction City with a 2,882 score in Class B, Mayfair House Restaurant of Portland in Class C with 2,717 pins and Cardinal Tire of Roseburg with a 2,601 tally in Class D.

In the singles action Nigel Shock-

Player Takes Masters Lead

AUGUSTA, Ga. (AP) — Maybe the Masters is the magic medicine that can cure Gary Player of a couple-decade of homesickness.

The little South African got off to a tremendous start Thursday in defense of his crown. Returning to the putting style that brought him victory over this taxing, 6,900-yard Augusta National Course last year, he shot a brilliant 5-under-par 67 and grabbed a two-stroke lead.

Despite his status as defending champion, Player was almost overlooked in pre-tournament talk when the favorites were mentioned. After all, his putting had been awfully sour — and no Masters winner thus far has been able to repeat the next year.

In second place behind Player after a rain-plagued first round was brawny Julius Boros of Mid Pines, N.C., the 1952 U.S. Open champion. He had a 69.

Palmer Trails

Arnold Palmer, the Pennsylvania most feared man in golf today,

matched Player's 33 on the back nine and closed with a 70, good for a four-way tie for third spot. Player and Palmer both birdied the 18th, to the delight of a tremendous gallery.

Deadlocked with Palmer at 70 were Mike Souchak of Crossinger, N. Y., another 33 shooter on the back nine; and two Florida dark horses, Dave Ragan of Sun City and Gardner Dickinson of Tequesta.

Gene Littler of Rancho Bernaldo, Calif., the current U.S. Open king, headed a quintet of 71 shooters. The others were Don January

land, Ore., and George Bayer of Miami.

Sam Snead of White Sulphur Springs, W.Va., still a gallery favorite although no longer a major threat, was among 10 players who matched par with 72s.

Ben Hogan of Fort Worth, still the master from tee to green, had more of the putter trouble that has dogged him in recent years and wound up with 78. He three-putted four greens.

Jack Nicklaus, playing in the Masters for the first time as a pro, was seven strokes off the pace with a 38-36-74.

"I've never been a good putter — never in my whole career," Ben said today in assessing the demise of his once all-conquering golf game. "People have said I was a good putter because I won tournaments, but I've always been just average on the greens — sometimes worse."

Sutherlin Nine Wins After Explosive 4th

Exploding for six runs in the bottom of the fourth inning, the host Sutherlin Bulldogs recorded a 7-3 diamond victory over the Yoncalla Eagles in non-league action Thursday.

The victory over the undermanned Yoncalla team revenge an earlier setback suffered by the Bulldogs at Yoncalla.

Yoncalla broke the ice Thursday with a single run in the top of the fourth, only to see the Bulldogs bounce right back with six big ones. Both teams picked up single tallies in the fifth, and the Eagles closed out the scoring with a lone run in the seventh.

Franchise Pitcher

Dennis Dage, freshman chucker for the Bulldogs, was credited

with the victory. Dage came on in the fourth inning, and worked until the sixth frame.

The Eagles opened the scoring when Denny Boan singled in the fourth inning and was doubled home by Mike Latham. Richard Wales belted a long home run over the road in left field for the run in the fifth. A double by Roger Carney and a Sutherlin miscue accounted for Yoncalla's final tally.

Doug Philo opened Sutherlin's fourth frame with a single and Gary Green worked his way for a base on balls. Mike Ouellette sacrificed the runners down, and Don Smith drove them across with a sizzling double. Smith's RBIs put the Bulldogs on top, 3-1.

John Waller kept the rally alive as he reached base on an unsuccessful fielder's choice, then Leroy Perkins was intentionally passed to load the bases. Dan Williams' grounder was mishandled and one run raced home. Two more Yoncalla errors allowed the Bulldogs to clear the bases.

Final Run

Doubles by Billy King and Lynn Arrant gave Sutherlin its final run in the last of the fifth.

Williams was the game's leading sticker as he collected a double and a single in three times at bat. Of Sutherlin's eight hits, four were doubles, while the Eagles had a home run and two doubles out of their five base blows.

The Bulldogs will play their first Umpqua Valley League encounters Saturday at Myrtle Creek against the Vikings, while Yoncalla's next outing is a Bico-B League counter attack at Camas Valley April 2.

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Lowly Putt Makes Hogan Shiver, Pale

AUGUSTA, Ga. (AP)—It is one of the incredible ironies of sports that Ben Hogan, who overcame adversity, staggering odds and a near fatal automobile crash to attain the pinnacle of golf, should pale at the sight of a 5-foot putt.
