An armed forces panel is scheduled to be held in eight high schools of Douglas County April 24-25-26, according to Chief Delmar Hockersmith, Navy recruiter.

Miss Flegenheimer Give U.S., Spanish School Comparison

Emmy Flegenheimer, Spanish student attending Roseburg High School, states "our teachers and parents are more strict with us, but in other ways, we are the same."

"We dance the same dances, wear the same clothes, and do the same things," she explained.

Miss Flegenheimer, 18, is in the United States under the sponsorship of the American Field Service. She arrived in Roseburg in March from Eugene where she had been attending North Eugene High. She arrived in the United States in August of last year.

She will remain in Roseburg attending senior classes at the high school until June, when she will leave on a three-week tour of the country. Highlight of the tour will be a meeting with President John F. Kennedy.

Although a native of Barcelona, Spain, she is of German ancestry — her grandfather was Swiss-German — which accounts for the name of Flegenheimer.

Fluent in Spanish, English and French languages, she hopes to become an interpreter. She plans to study interpreting at a college in Geneva, Switzerland in the future.

Miss Flegenheimer states that in Spain the young people are more formal and have less freedom. In her former school, she had 11 subjects, all of which were academic courses such as physics, chemistry, math, history and geography.

On the sometimes controversial subject of athletics in schools, she believes they are not overemphasized in American schools but the intellectual subjects are not emphasized enough.

Before coming to the United States, she says she had a few false impressions of the country. She believed that, "in America, everybody was rich." Also, that in school the students didn't study. She has since found students here do study, but not as much as they do in Spain.

"In this country it is rather easy for one to go to college if the student has the money. You can work on weekends and during the summer to earn money. In Spain, if we want a job, we must work all year round," Miss Flegenheimer said.

Since her arrival in Roseburg, she has spoken to several groups. Recently she spoke to Glide High School students, about her country.

Miss Flegenheimer said the people of Spain admire the American Government and think it is very vast.

Speaking at Glide on the subject of Spanish schools, she said school starts at 9 a.m. and continues to 6:30 p.m. When the teacher enters the room, all students rise until the teacher tells them they may be seated, she said.

During her stay in Roseburg she is residing at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Clifford Bryden at 1038 SE Kane St.
