

First Family Dines Mid Persian Riches

WASHINGTON (AP)—President and Mrs. Kennedy dined on a six course dinner — from caviar to spinach — amid the riches of Persia at a state dinner given by the Shah and empress of Iran.

Through the windows they could see a flood-lit Persian garden with the rain splattering in the fountain.

The dinner Thursday night was held in the new Iranian chancery — a bit of Persia smack beside the Georgian architecture of the neighboring embassy.

It has a tiled facade and gilded bronze grillwork. And inside the Kennedys walked across rich Persian rugs and saw an exhibit of art from the provinces of Iran.

The dinner, served at a U-shaped table, began with fresh caviar from Iran and vodka with thin slices of dark bread. There was consommé, pheasant, Persian rice, spinach soufflé, duchess pota-

toes, tiny new carrots and wine. The President and the Shah toasted each other. Later they talked over coffee while the empress, Mrs. Kennedy and other women chatted together.

Among the 60 guests were Vice President and Mrs. Lyndon B. Johnson and Secretary of State and Mrs. Dean Rusk.

Eugene Residents' Clothes For Korea Still In California

EUGENE (AP) — Eugene residents collected seven tons of clothing last summer to help clothe Korean orphans during the bitter winter.

But the clothing is in a Naval warehouse in San Diego, Calif., a Naval officer in San Diego confirmed Thursday.

Cmdr. W. N. Durlay, naval officer in charge of Project Handclasp, told the Eugene Register-Guard by phone that the clothing arrived in San Diego too late last October to be transferred to a ship bound for Korea.

"We haven't had a ship available since then," Durlay said. He said military cargo is given priority on Naval ships and Project Handclasp items get any leftover space. The next likely opportunity to ship the clothing will be in June, he said.

The Eugene Junior Chamber of Commerce conducted the clothing drive last summer. Much of the clothing was cleaned free of charge by Eugene dry-cleaning firms.

It included clothing for orphanages for the Harry Holt orphanage at Seoul and for orphanages in Eugene's sister city of Chinju.

Durlay said the Navy used to send such items, to Japan, for further shipment to Korea.

"But they've got a backlog of 1,000 tons in Japanese warehouses," Durlay said. "We've been told not to send anything more to Korea via Japan until the backlog is cleaned out."
