Court Overrules Kauffman Plea

WIESBADEN, Germany (AP)—The presiding judge at the espionage trial of U.S. Air Force Capt. Joseph P. Kauffman today overruled a defense motion to quash evidence obtained in a search of the defendant's California home.

Defense counsel George Latimer maintained that special Air Force investigators had illegally searched Kauffman's home at Atwater, Calif., several times. Latimer accused the special agents of burglary. He termed the secret searches a violation of his client's constitutional rights.

After the two days of legal wrangling, the judge, Col. James S. Cheney, announced: "The motion is overruled."

Then the case was adjourned until Monday. A native of Rutland, Vt., Kauffman is being tried on charges of turning over military secrets to the Communists. Latimer told an out-of-court hearing before the judge announced his ruling: "every government official who took part in this burglary ought to hang his head."

Latimer, a former member of the U.S. Military Court of Appeals, told the judge, Col. James S. Cheney, "I've been in a lot of cases but this (burglary) is the most atrocious violation of a constitutional right I've ever seen."

Latimer moved to bar as evidence a notebook belonging to Kauffman confiscated by investigators at his apartment. Latimer based his burglary charges on testimony given by special agents Friday.

Col. Raymond White, a special agent, admitted entering Kauffman's home four times without a search warrant. White has testified that other agents were with him then.

Paul Reed, special investigator of the U.S. Air Force headquarters in Europe at Wiesbaden, insisted in court Friday that an affidavit for a search warrant, obtained later, was not issued on the basis of White's secret searches and evidence found then.

The recommendation is reported to have been made by Gen. Maxwell D. Taylor, Kennedy's adviser on security affairs, following a recent tour that included Paris and other capitals of nations in the North Atlantic Treaty Organization.

Canadian Charges Treaty Is 'Sellout'

OTTAWA (AP)—Technical evidence aimed at backing his charge that the Columbia River Treaty is a sellout to the United States was made public Friday by Gen. A. G. L. McNaughton.

The development plan chosen for the 60-year treaty signed in January, 1961, would cost \$264, 200,000 more in Canadian-U.S. construction and provide Canadian power at costs of two to nearly four times greater per unit than in the United States, said the retiring Canadian chairman of the International Joint Commission.

McNaughton's 800-word statement repeated the line of testimony he gave in 1959 and 1960 to the External Affairs Committee.

It was the first major word from the general since his assertion last week that he had dissociated himself from the treaty at the start of the high-level negotiations early in 1960.

The treaty calls for Canada to build three storage dams in British Columbia. Their cost would be \$334 million, with the United States returning half the extra power generated from the controlling action on the Columbia's seasonal fluctuations.

April 30 Last Date For Wool Payments

The last day for filing applications for payments of the 1961 wool marketing year is April 30, according to Curtis Barker, chairman of the Douglas County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee.

Such payments cover shorn wool and unshorn lambs marketed not later than March 31, 1962. Later marketings will be eligible for payments for the 1962 marketing year.

Payments on wool and lambs are not made automatically, Barker said. Growers must file applications which are supported with all the necessary sales records in order to receive payments under the program.

Sales records will be the basis for calculating the national average price for wool during the entire marketing year. When the average is determined, the payment rates for shorn wool and unshorn lambs sold during the period will be announced and will be made to growers during the coming year.

Applications for the program should be filed in the ASCS county office in the Courthouse.
