Glenz Buys Hart's Interest In New Service Laundry

Sale by Jack A. Hart of his half interest in the New Service Laundry & Dry Cleaners to Donald R. Glenz, announced earlier this week, marks his retirement after almost 50 years association with the laundry business.

Glenz becomes a full partner with Joe Boatwright, in the transaction, effective May 1. Glenz, owner of the City Cleaners, announces he will continue to operate that business.

Hart, who lives with his wife at 1138 SE Stephens St., started in the laundry business in 1913 in Eugene. He came to Roseburg on St. Patrick's Day (March 17) in 1932, as part owner and manager of what later became New Service Laundry.

Boatwright, coming here from Portland in 1955, bought a half interest in the business from the New Service Laundries, Inc., Hart who experienced ill health, began a gradual withdrawal from active operation of the laundry. He plans retirement now.

Joint Management

Boatwright will concentrate on the laundry end of the business and Glenz will look after the dry-

cleaning department, although the plant will be under their joint management, they stated.

The New Service Laundry today is one of the most modern and up-to-date of its size on the Pacific Coast. After it was largely destroyed by fire on May 26 of last year,

Evans Products Now Handling Brookings Cut

Evans Products Co., which recently announced plans for expansion of the Roseburg area plant located at Winchester, has entered into a contract with Brookings Plywood Corp. at Brookings for exclusive marketing arrangement of the latter's product.

The Brookings plant produces 90 million square feet annually, 80 per cent sanded fir plywood and 20 per cent sheathing. President Orville Davis reports last year's sales were in the vicinity of 7 1/2 million.

Evans recently established a building materials division in Portland. Its amalgamation with other producing plywood companies in the Northwest has resulted in formation of the third largest manufacturer - distributor of plywood in the United States, distributing in excess of 850 million square feet of plywood annually.

Evans, at the time of closing its Coos Bay operations, announced plans for expansion which will about double the size of the Winchester plant and add upwards of 100 new employees.

Start on construction on the expanded facilities is anticipated within the next few weeks, according to tentative plans of the company.

Pacific Power & Light Pays Out Dividends

The Pacific Power & Light Co. board of directors, has declared quarterly dividends at the regular rates on company preferred stock issues and a dividend of 24 cents per share on the common stock, payable April 10 to stockholders of record at the close of business on March 28.

The 2-for-1 split of the common stock became effective Feb. 23. Certificates for the additional shares of common stock resulted from the split mailed on March 15 to common stockholders of record on the effective date, the announcement from Paul B. McKee, chairman of the board says.

Purpose Told For Site Choice Of Paper Mill

The purpose of locating International Paper Co.'s paper and paperboard mill near Gardiner in Douglas County is to supply the company's converting plants in the western states, the company reports.

At present, the supply comes from the company's Southern Kraft Division mills.

The company reports the new mill will operate largely on chips produced from slabs and other wood residues from the Long Bell Division's lumber mills and plywood plants as well as salvage and trimmings from the Long-Bell logging and forest management operations.

The plant, under present plans, will be located adjacent to Long-Bell's plywood plant and sawmill on the Umpqua River at Gardiner. Meanwhile, engineering work is also going on for construction of a more efficient sawmill to replace the present mill at Gardiner. It will be located north of the main entrance to the present facility.

Petherick, Karcher Plan Reedsport Trailer Park

C. A. Petherick of Sutherlin and a Reedsport man, W. A. Karcher, are now building a new trailer park on a six acre tract of land southwest of Reedsport on Highway 101.

It will contain areas for overnight parking and permanent facilities for 25 trailers. Mr. and Mrs. Petherick will be managers of the park.

Petherick has sold his insurance business in Sutherlin.

almost all new equipment was installed to replace damaged equipment.

Boatwright and Hart, at that time, decided on a drastic overhaul and came up with a modern laundry. Their fire loss had been around \$100,000, with about 80 per cent insurance coverage. However, the rebuilt laundry is a far more efficient operation. Most of the loss was in the laundry portion. The dry cleaning section, closed off, was little harmed. A complete new sprinkling system in event of future fires was installed.

Mezzanine Added

In the rebuilt laundry is a mezzanine, placed over the offices and west end of the laundry. It includes private offices and a lunch room for the 29 employees.

The fire was the second disaster experienced by the laundry in two years. The other was the blast of Aug. 7, 1959. Then the loss was much less, an estimated \$18,000, but it was put back in service four hours after the usual opening time, and kept going during reconstruction. The laundry services approximately 6,000 square miles, or a radius of about 50 miles, an area about the size of New Jersey.

Glenz has been associated in the dry cleaning business most of his life, 18 on his own operating the City Cleaners but 22 years in all in Roseburg. His father before him was in the business.

Boatwright has been in laundry association for 14 years, working in Portland with the Northwest Industries Laundry before coming to Roseburg in 1955.

Glenz commented that while he has been in the dry cleaning business, this is his first venture with a laundry. He said he was interested in learning more about this end and was happy to be associated with so modern a plant as that of New Service Laundry.

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U. S. National's Deposits, Loans, Resources Increase

Deposits, loans and total resources of U.S. National Bank of Portland all registered substantial gains over the past 12 months, according to figures released as of March 31.

Deposits were up more than \$78 million and now total \$376,066,966 compared with \$797,381,185 recorded on March 31, 1961. Loans increased in excess of \$7 million and now stand at \$418,473,898.

The Roseburg branch of U. S. National recorded total deposits of \$18,907,063.41, according to H. E. Schmeer, manager. Loans and discounts for the local branch totaled \$5,742,071.80.

Total resources for the U. S. National system, with its 82 banking offices throughout the state, were \$870,976,458 compared with \$901,091,523 on March 31, 1961.

During the last 12 months, U.S. National has opened three new branches - one in Portland at 67th and Glisan, and others in North Medford and Gladstone. New buildings for already established branches were completed during the same period in Cottage Grove, Eugene and Corvallis.

Completion of U.S. National's new branch now under construction in Seaside is scheduled for July. A new building for the North Medford branch is also due for completion this summer.

Plans have been announced for the construction of new buildings for branches in Bend and The Dalles.

Contract Set For Letting For New Bowling Allies

Contract is expected to be let sometime next week for construction of the new Indian Lanes Bowling Alley, which D & D Bowl, Inc., will erect on the west side of NE Stephens St. near the north Roseburg city limits.

Donnelly said this space will be used for parking but also will provide for future expansion of the building at some future date.
