Oregon Young People Are Presuming Dr. Livingston Will Win Nomination

If Dr. Harold M. Livingston of Corvallis, Republican candidate for U.S. senator, wins in the primaries, it will be through the efforts of the young people in the state. Such is the belief of his followers, all of them volunteer workers. Some of these made their ideas known at a coffee given Saturday at the Umpqua Hotel. The informal meeting was designed to give Roseburg people a chance to meet Dr. Livingston and hear his views.

Dr. Livingston was accompanied here by Mrs. Eugene Springer, Wayne Giesy, Col. Norman Barnes, Alice Thomas and Bob Gault, all of Corvallis.

Two of these, Bob Gault and Alice Thomas, have given up their col-

lege studies to campaign for Dr. Livingston.

Conservatism Stressed

Livingston, who likes to think of himself as a potential statesman rather than a politician, describes himself as a "dynamic conservative." Enlarging on this phrase, he said that a true conservative is actually forward-looking, open to new ideas and programs, but ones built on a solid foundation.

It is the opinion of his followers that he is the only Republican candidate who could beat Wayne Morse, Giesy, until recently chairman of the Benton County Republican Central Committee, said that Dr. Livingston is an exceptional public speaker and could meet Morse on his own terms in a public debate. The Republican candidate has said that if he wins the Primary, he will challenge the Democratic nominee to joint appearances throughout Oregon to face the voters in honest discussion of both state and national problems. Dr. Livingston said "Talking for action" is necessary.

Independents Eyed

The Republican nominee's supporters said they are trying for the Independent vote, believing that it is too late to change the minds of confirmed Democrats. Here is where the youth of the state will have their say, they contend.

Col. Barnes said the main difficulty of the committee backing Dr. Livingston is the complete lack of funds necessary to finance radio and television speeches that could reach the major part of the voting public.

When asked what his stand on the Dunes Seashore Park question was, Dr. Livingston stated he is for state development rather than federal. Two of his reasons were that he thought the state could do a better job in developing the park and that he opposed the taking of

New Restaurant Slated At GV Shopping Center

Todd Building Co. of Roseburg has been awarded contract for construction of Tom Tom Restaurant in the Garden Valley Shopping Center on Garden Valley Rd.

An early construction start is planned for the structure being built for A. H. Absher of Albany, originator of the Tom Tom Restaurant group. It is expected he will sublease operation of the facility on a franchise basis.

Todd Firm Low
Bid results were announced by Herb Totman, president of Garden Valley Shopping Center, Inc., and manager of Drive-N-Save Market. Totman said of three bids received, the Todd firm was low with a bid of \$44,690. Paving work has been assigned to Roseburg Paving Co.

The restaurant will go up on a site east of the shopping center entrance from Garden Valley Rd. This will be the third business to join the shopping center group. Drive-N-Save Market was the first unit to develop, followed by Al's Shell Service.

Contract calls for completion in 90 days.

Roseburg's newest eating place will offer a drive-in feature unique in the Roseburg area. An outside phone ordering service. Customers will be able to "phone in" food orders without leaving their cars.

Canopy Included
A canopy for vehicles is included in plans.

Booth and counter arrangements inside the 50 by 60-foot restaurant will provide seating for 96 customers. The building's exterior will feature wood paneling and a native stone. While the interior will be finished in wood veneer paneling, Totman reported.

Laminated beams and a built-up roof are other structural features. All kitchen equipment will be of stainless steel. Fast preparation of food will be made possible through utilization of electronic ovens.

Interment will follow in Burk Cemetery, Roseburg.

The election will be May 7 and newly-elected board members will be sworn in June 13.

Old Grads Watch With Mixed Emotions As Old Sutherlin Junior High Burns

While old grads and townspeople watched with mixed emotions, the old Sutherlin Junior High School Sunday was destroyed in a fire school demonstration, leaving only the chimney standing as a reminder of days gone by.

Planned since the vacation of the school early this year, the fire school was put on by the Oregon Firemen's Instructors Association under the sponsorship of the state Board of Vocational Education and drew instructors from all parts of the state. Fire crews from Yoncalia, Oakland, Sutherlin, Myrtle Creek, Winston-Dillard, Tri-City, Canyonville and both Roseburg City and Rural departments took part in the demonstration.

Classes Held
Preliminary classes were held Saturday, crews were organized and plans and fire problems were worked out, according to Roseburg

Fire Chief Cliff Thrasher, who was in charge of the demonstration.

The actual burning, in a controlled series of some 17 separate fires, began about 9 a.m. Sunday, with the final "let 'er go" climax at 3 p.m.

All types of equipment were put into use during the demonstration, including the Roseburg department's new "smoke" which was the object of much interest from the watching crowd.

According to Mrs. Jerry DeMuth, News-Review Sutherlin correspondent and wife of the Sutherlin fire chief, there was much nostalgic comment heard during the course of the day, including some from her husband who was one of the school's first students, in 1912.

Built in 1911, the school originally housed all 12 grades until it was converted to a junior high in 1949.

Unplanned Fire Starts
Robert Mobley, state fire training coordinator and Cecil Dill instructor from the state office in Salem were in charge of arrangements.

Some of the visiting firemen who left with their equipment after the 3 p.m. windup, were spared the red faces of the few remaining on the scene at 3:45 p.m. as if in protest to the demise of the school, burning leaves from one of the

many old stored textbooks landed on the roof of the East Elementary School out of sight on the Willamette Ave. side and started a roof fire.

The young son of Chub Moore of Sutherlin reported the roof blaze to Cliff Thrasher who in turn radioed for the return of the Sutherlin equipment. The 10-inch blaze was quickly extinguished.

Thrasher said the next fire school in the county will be May 8, and will be a local school only with a six-room house as the instruction center. According to Thrasher, films taken at yesterday's fire will be used in future classes.
