

Rusk Said Moderately Pleased After First Of Talks On Berlin

WASHINGTON (AP)—Secretary of State Dean Rusk was reported today to be moderately satisfied after the first of his talks on Berlin with Soviet Ambassador Anatoly F. Dobrynin—a talk that was conducted in English without interpreters.

It was also understood that Rusk after a short cooling-off period—has decided to brief the Allies on his conversation with Dobrynin Monday.

Ag Department Fires Official In Estes Case

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Agriculture Department says it has fired an official because he failed to make himself available for questioning about his relationship with Billie Sol Estes, a financier under indictment in Texas on charges of fraud.

Announcement of the firing of the official, William E. Morris, was made Monday by Thomas R. Hughes, executive assistant to Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman.

Hughes said that in preliminary questioning Morris, 46, admitted accepting a new hat from the Texas financier.

Morris is the second official linked with Estes to leave the department in four days.

Emory E. Jacobs, deputy director of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, resigned Friday after testimony in a Texas court of inquiry that he was friendly with Estes.

Jacobs said on quitting that he had done no wrong and wanted to testify in Texas as a private citizen, not as a department employee.

Morris' firing was announced a short time after two Republican congressmen demanded congressional investigations.

The Republican National Committee said the swiftly developing case "may yet come to rest on the doorstep of the White House."

Rural Firemen Answer Call To U. S. Plywood

The Roseburg Rural Fire Department was dispatched at 9:16 a.m. today to U.S. Plywood, where fire got outside its dryer No. 2 and was burning in some dust around overhead beams.

The plywood crews had things under control, however, after the overhead sprinkling system was turned on. The fire department stood by to make sure everything was taken care of and electrical equipment had been properly checked out. One piece of equipment and crew responded.

The Roseburg Fire Department also sent equipment to standby in case of need.

Laswell Is Appointed To Head Citizen Group

Avery Laswell has accepted appointment as Yoncalla area chairman of the Citizens Committee for Representative Government, according to George Luoma, Douglas County chairman.

Laswell will direct efforts in the Yoncalla area in obtaining signatures for the Legislative Reapportionment Initiative Petition to place that measure on the ballot in November for the vote of the people.

This policy of consulting with the Allies on any Berlin move was almost wrecked over the weekend by the news leak from Bonn about U.S. proposals for a new round of Berlin discussions.

Officials here said the leak had jeopardized seriously the Rusk-Dobrynin talks and shaken U. S. confidence in the West Germans.

Both Rusk and Dobrynin described Monday's session as fruitful and businesslike, and officials believe the talks will be resumed shortly, probably later this month.

One purpose of the meeting is to set procedures for future talks—including where and when they will be held.

Officials said Rusk and Dobrynin had agreed tentatively to hold the fourth round of exploratory talks in Washington. Rusk is reported to feel that a fresh start with a new participant on the Soviet side and in a different locale might create a more favorable atmosphere to break the deadlock over Berlin.

The first round was between Rusk and Andrei A. Gromyko, the Soviet foreign minister, in New York last fall. It was followed by conferences in Moscow between Gromyko and U. S. Ambassador

Judging Big Job For Glide Fair

The Glide School Science Fair held last Saturday not only attracted the largest number of visitors, but had far more exhibits than in any previous year, according to Mrs. Arthur Selby, correspondent.

The 171 projects from grades two to eight were judged Friday night by County Health officer Dr. John Donnelly, Robert Carey of the Glide Ranger Station and Ronald Jones, Glide High science instructor.

The judges started their difficult task at 5:30 p.m. and finished at 12:30 a.m.

Calvin Christensen, junior high principal and Jerry Lemert, junior high science instructor, followed and tabulated the awards of the judges (first, second and third place) and wrote out award certificates for the winners. They completed their job at 4 a.m.

The 171 projects involved the work of 250 students. There were 39 gold awards on 29 projects as a few of these exhibits were built by two students.

One of the unusual exhibits depicted the story of drilling for petroleum underground and was made by Steve McCord, a fourth-grade student.

Another gold award was given for the exhibit showing how to dye wood by capillary attraction to seventh-graders Janet Price and Linda Jamison. Fourteen various colored woods were displayed in plastic containers.

Just 10 to 15 per cent of local science fair winners are chosen to enter the Regional Science Fair at Roseburg, and 10-15 per cent of regional fair winners are eligible to go to the state Science fair at Salem, Mrs. Selby said.

Washington Gets Proposal On Astoria Span

OLYMPIA (AP)—A plan to make the \$22.19 million Astoria, Megler Columbia River toll bridge a federal aid project in order to obtain federal funds was presented to the Washington Highway Commission Monday by Oregon highway officials.

Under the plan each state would be obligated to set aside a portion of its federal aid highway funds, R. L. Porter, assistant Oregon highway engineer said. Oregon's share would be \$155,000, Washington's \$68,000.

Porter said that if in the future it were decided federal funds should be used to pay off the general obligation bonds floated by Oregon for the bridge, the two states would negotiate to determine how much federal money each would contribute.

As long as the agreement was in force, Porter said, the two states would agree to take tolls off the span after 30 years.

Under the present arrangement tolls can remain on the bridge until both states have been repaid any subsidies required. Washington is obligated to pay as much as \$200,000 annually toward any possible subsidy required to pay off the Oregon bond issue.

Should the states so desire the bridge could be declassified as a federal aid highway project, Porter explained.

The plan, which Porter said has been approved by Rex Whitton, Bureau of Public Roads administrator, must be okayed by the highway commission of both states.

Knee Is Fractured In Auto Accident

Requests Improve Chances For Olalla Creek Project

Additional utilization requests have improved the prospect for a proposed dam project on Olalla Creek in Douglas County.

Lee McAllister, Salem, area engineer for the U.S. Bureau of Reclamation, told the Douglas County Water Resources Committee Monday night the Olalla plan "still looks good."

He said potential irrigation coverage has now increased to 18,000 acres "which should help the project."

The meeting was held in the Douglas County Courthouse. The speaker said three more municipalities are interested in utilizing the reservoir, but noted that increased municipal and industrial utilization will require a higher dam.

Report Due
McAllister said some work remains, but the bureau still expects to complete its field report on the project early in the new fiscal year starting July 1.

He advised users affected by the plan to start making plans for forming a district. Reviewing the various types of districts available to users, McAllister said the "quickest method" is the irrigation district which can be organized under state irrigation laws.

The official said most of the design work has been completed, lands have been classified and easements and pumping plants located and planned. He said field personnel are still reading wells in the locality to determine drainage factors.

Henry Stewart, Portland, of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, gave a progress report on a comprehensive water resources development survey which is under way for the Umpqua Basin.

Others Attend
Attending the meeting with Stewart were Col. S. K. Elsminger, Portland, district engineer; Harold A. Kibby and Reinhard Jaren, all with the Corps of Engineers at Portland.

Elsminger planned to accompany local water officials on an inspection of the Tiller slide today.

Operators See No Single Cure For Lumber Ills

WASHINGTON (AP)—There is no single cure for the economic ills of the lumber industry because so many factors cause them, domestic operators testified Monday.

But in detailing a series of troubles they proposed many solutions in a day-long hearing before the Senate Commerce Committee.

As expected, Canadian competition was cited as a major problem, but industry spokesmen emphasized they are not asking an unfair advantage over imports.

Russell G. Fryburn of the Western Lumber Marketing Association put it like this:

"We do not offer any cure-all for lumber's ills, but neither do we look across our national border as a scapegoat. Our industry's problems are complex and interwoven with the United States' foreign and trade policies and with the destiny and attitudes of our national transportation systems."

Robert F. Dwyer of the Lumbermen's Economic Survival Committee said Canadians can undersell U.S. producers for several reasons.

He said Canadian production costs are lower, they ship in foreign vessels, money rates of exchange favor Canada, and they have a 15-day freehold in railroad shipment which in effect allows them to warehouse lumber free for a half-month, plus a sales advantage to the customer.

Mortimer B. Doyle of the National Lumber Manufacturers Association suggested calling a conference of U.S. and Canadian Lumber industry representatives to consider "the serious problems created by excessive forest products imports."

Sen. Wayne Morse, D-Ore., expressed fear that "we are almost reaching the point where the number of proposed solutions exceeds the number of problems."

Morse said suggestions should be submitted to the President and that he be asked to designate someone in the executive branch "to be the central and coordinating point for action affecting lumber."

Three Excommunicated Segregationists Vow Continued Race Separation Fight

NEW ORLEANS (AP)—Three Roman Catholics, excommunicated for opposing their archbishop's order to desegregate parochial schools, vowed today to continue their battle for separation of the races.

Archbishop Joseph Francis Rummel invoked the severe spiritual penalty Monday.

The directive from the 83-year-old prelate, who eight years ago called segregation "morally wrong," expelled Leander H. Perez Sr., longtime political czar of two small parishes adjoining New Orleans; Jackson G. Ricau, an executive of pro-segregation Citizens Council; and Mrs. B. J. Gaillet Jr., Bible-quoting segregationist who once picketed the archbishop's residence.

The excommunication cuts off the three segregationists from the sacraments of the church. They may attend Mass and confess, but cannot receive Communion.

Perez, a fiery 71-year-old attorney and Louisiana's leading spokesman on segregation, blasted the action as "simply a move to frighten or terrorize the parents of parochial school children" and said it would not work.

Ricau, a longtime real estate dealer who now is executive secretary of the South Louisiana Citizens Council, said he considered it "an incredible injustice."

"I intend to continue the fight for racial segregation as I have done in the past, serving God and begging his help and protection," Mrs. Gaillet, 41, mother of two children in Catholic schools, commented. "It is in the writings of the church and in the Bible we must obey God rather than man. The church has definitely made a serious mistake in excommunicating me because of accusations which are false."

The excommunication order said the three had disregarded the archbishop's earlier warning against any action which would "provoke our devoted people to disobedience or rebellion against the church."

Appeal Reserved
The German-born archbishop, ordinary of New Orleans for more than 25 years, reserved to himself any appeal. Magr. Egidio Vagnozzi, apostolic delegate to the United States, earlier had indicated he would not pass such appeals on to the Vatican or the Pope.

Nevertheless, Mrs. Gaillet, who heads the small segregationist Save Our Nation, Inc., said she intended to communicate with Pope John XXIII by either letter or telegram.

Perez, long at odds with the archbishop on the segregation question, said he had an "unswerving responsibility to protect our children against the immoral curse of forced racial integration."

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Murder Suspect Gives Self Up

BEND, Ore. (AP)—A man wanted for questioning in two mystery deaths in Cleveland, Ohio, surrendered in Bend Monday.

He had been free on bond on a burglary charge at Bend, was supposed to show up Monday for a court appearance, and he did it, to the astonishment of officials.

He is Jerry Gallier, 24, Tacoma, Wash.

Gallier, Theron Wells, 24, and Raphael A. Fernandez, 34, all of Tacoma, were arrested in Eugene several weeks ago on a burglary charge and were freed on bail. They faced similar charges elsewhere in the Northwest.

Then on April 8 at Parma Heights, Ohio, a Cleveland suburb, Wells and Richard Conley, 37, Hayward, Calif., were found dead in a motel room. Fernandez was with them. Gallier, who had checked into the motel with the others, was gone.

Cause of the men's death was a mystery until today when Cuyahoga County Coroner Samuel R. Gerber said a synthetic drug was responsible.

Gerber said the drug that killed the men was made in Germany and is known as methadone-hydrochloride. It is a prescription drug that can be taken orally or by injection, he said.

At the time Gallier was first arrested in Bend in connection with the burglary charge, police said he had water-soluble morphine with him.

Gerber continued the inquest in Cleveland today and Fernandez was returned to jail. The coroner accused him of being uncooperative and told him, "You will remain in jail until I am informed that you are ready to tell me more."

Cause of the two deaths was determined by laboratory tests after results of autopsies on the bodies proved inconclusive.

The coroner said he had determined the cause of death, but "we haven't established the manner of death." Fernandez denied a knowledge of the drugs and said as far as he knew the two men had no narcotics with them and had taken none during a two-week trip from the West Coast.

He told the coroner he and the other three men had plenty of money but did not give any indication where the money came from. Asked what his business was he said he was in the tire business.

Gallier was being questioned by the FBI at Bend today.

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
