

Western Electric Acknowledges Profit On Factory Space Rental

WASHINGTON (AP)—Western Electric Co. officials have acknowledged they paid the government \$3 million to rent factory space, teen got the money back with a \$200,000 profit through the firm's Nike missile contract.

This testimony came out Tuesday at a Senate investigation hearing that sometimes cracked with sharp words.

The company said its profits on the Nike system were about \$169 million, equalling 13 per cent of invested capital and were reasonable.

"If that is reasonable, I'm mistaken. It seems pretty high to me," commented subcommittee chairman John L. McClellan, D-Ark.

The subcommittee is investigating what McClellan calls pyramiding of profits by Nike missile contractors.

Witnesses have testified that Western and its chief subcontractor, Douglas Aircraft Co., added profits or fees for themselves onto profits paid other firms hired by Douglas to do much of the actual work. Company representatives have contended they were entitled to do this and did work to earn the money.

"We earned these profits ourselves," G. Raymond Smith, a Western Electric vice president, said Tuesday. "Not one penny of them is a profit taken for the work of others."

Smith and Thomas Spicer, Western's controller, acknowledged their firm had paid the government \$3 million in 1951-52 as rent for the use of two federally owned plants in North Carolina, then billed the Army for the whole \$3 million plus a \$200,000 profit on it.

As they and McClellan reconstructed it, the contract with the Army allows Western to recover all of its costs on any Nike contract plus a profit, so the rent

was added to the bill and a profit paid on it.

"Wouldn't it have been cheaper for the government to furnish it (the two buildings) than to rent it to you and pay you a profit on it?" McClellan asked.

"Yes, sir, it would," Spicer replied. He explained that it is difficult for the Army to allow any company free use of a plant lest competing firms complain. The subcommittee staff said the plants are located in Burlington and Winston-Salem, N.C.

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Cleanup Week In Roseburg April 23-27

The week of April 23 through 27 has been set aside as Roseburg's annual cleanup week, announced Roseburg Fire Chief LeRoy Siebold.

Mayor Peter B. Serafin has issued a proclamation designating the week and setting forth the purpose. The object, he said, is to rid the city, its dwellings and business houses of any trash or junk which is a potential fire hazard or tends to clutter the city.

Residents are encouraged to gather up all unneeded material from houses, basements, attics and yards and set this material in disposable containers on the curb or near the shoulder of the road during this week. All unwanted material will be picked up by city trucks on the following schedule:

Downtown section and Templin bar areas, Monday, April 23; west of the Douglas County Savings Bank, Tuesday, April 24; northeast section north of Deer Creek, Wednesday; far west Roseburg west of Stanton St. and Hucreset area, Thursday; south of Moshier Ave. and east of railroad tracks, Friday.

Property owners are requested to set out any and all material (except garbage) as near the curb or street as possible the night before the day their area is to be picked up.

Any property owner or occupant missed on the day his area is to be picked up can have the pick-up made by calling the public works department, OR 2-1697.

3 Years Meted In Forgery Case

Robert Richard Parker, 29, of Los Angeles and formerly of Canyonville, was sentenced Tuesday to three years in the Oregon State Penitentiary on a charge of forgery.

Parker waived Grand Jury action went before Circuit Judge Charles S. Woodrich to plead guilty to the charge. He was accused by the district attorney's information of passing a \$20 check payable to George E. Burns and signed Kenneth Brown at the South Umpqua State Bank last Oct. 10.

He was arrested by state police at Canyonville over the weekend. A Kitsap County, Wash., warrant and federal fugitive warrant also are outstanding against Parker.

The charge to which he pleaded guilty was on a complaint filed in Roseburg District Court.

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U. S. Savings Bond Director Gives Oregon Drive Goals

George Minnaugh, state director of the U. S. savings bonds division of the U. S. Treasury Department, met with the Douglas County savings bond committee Tuesday to plan for the forthcoming drive in May and June.

Louis J. Fullerton is Douglas County chairman of the drive.

Members of the press and representatives of banks and other interested groups heard Minnaugh discuss the state expectations for the drive.

Goal \$2½ Million

Minnaugh said the state as a whole has a goal of \$2½ million to raise above the normal sales, Douglas County will be asked to raise \$110,000 worth of bonds during those two months plus a proportionate amount of the state goal. The \$110,000 figure was the amount sold last year during this period.

Sales are down this year, he said. From January to March in 1961, the county sold \$315,284 worth of bonds, and for this same period this year, only \$197,353.

Although definite plans on the county level have not been formulated, there will be at least one feature attraction during the drive. A space capsule identical to the one in which Col. John H. Glenn

Jr. traveled around the world three times will be on display. It will stop in Roseburg June 2 on a whirlwind tour around the county.

Reason Cited

Minnaugh said the idea behind the capsule display is to show the public how some of their savings bond dollars are used.

Minnaugh was also scheduled to appear before the Roseburg Kiwanis Club in the afternoon at its regular noon luncheon.

Fullerton stated at the kickoff meeting for the drive that progress was being made in appointing committeemen around the county. Thus far appointed are Bill Markham of Riddle, Paul Seaton of the Sutherlin-Oakland area and Vic Rice of Myrtle Creek.

Individual Incomes Set Record During March

WASHINGTON (AP) — Individual incomes set a record in March, largely because of improved employment in the automobile and clothing industries.

The Commerce Department said today that personal income in March was running at an annual rate of \$435.3 billion, after making allowances for normal seasonal fluctuations. This was \$2 billion higher than February and \$8 billion above March 1961.

The largest payroll advance was in manufacturing, reflecting increased production of autos and wearing apparel. Most of the improvement mirrored rising employment, plus some increase in the average work week.

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Restistance Of Settlers Casts Shadow Over Future Of Algeria

TUNIS (AP) — One month has elapsed since the signing of the Algerian cease-fire, but the grim, bloody resistance of the European settlers in Algeria's major cities casts a long shadow over the country's future.

At their Tunis headquarters, the Moslem nationalist rebels are becoming increasingly impatient with the raging terrorism of the European right-wing Secret Army Organization. Tuesday 49 persons — 43 of them Moslems — were killed and 21 injured.

The Secret Army Organization is known as the OAS.

Except for an occasional isolated retaliatory attack, the rebel guerrillas and terrorists have observed the cease-fire in obedience

to orders from their government-in-exile in Tunis. The rebel command agreed to cooperate with France in setting up provisional institutions and in preparing the country for a self-determination referendum.

But European terrorists have been killing Moslems in Algeria's big cities in a desperate effort to provoke mass Moslem reaction and thus compromise the peace agreement.

In the face of daily bloodshed and France's inability to stop it, the rebels have been growing biter and angrier.

"This situation has lasted too long," warned the rebel government in a statement on Sunday. "The sincerity of the French authorities to put into life the Evian agreements will be put to the test."

The nationalists point out that terrorism and economic chaos are limited mainly to Algeria's three major cities—Algiers, Oran and Bone, all with sizeable European populations.

France has succeeded in forming and installing a provisional executive, with preparing Algeria for self-determination. Yet the executive is
