

Husband Of Expelled Segregationist Asks Archbishop For Same Treatment

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — The husband of a segregationist excommunicated by the Roman Catholic Church asked today for the same censure.

The request to Archbishop Joseph Francis Rummel from Bernard Joseph Gaillot came 14 hours after his dark-haired wife failed in a dramatic plea for grace from the 85-year-old prelate.

"If she is truly excommunicated from the Catholic Church," Gaillot wrote to the archbishop in a letter he disclosed shortly after midnight, "then I too should be excommunicated. We, being two people joined together by God, have done no intentional wrong to our church."

Mrs. Gaillot, 41, mother of two children in Catholic schools, was excommunicated Monday along with two other segregationists for opposing the German-born archbishop's decision to desegregate parochial schools here this fall.

Mrs. Gaillot, who contends that God demands segregation, rushed up to the archbishop on the grounds of his residence Tuesday while he was joining a pilgrimage group in prayer.

"I beg your mercy, your excellency," she pleaded as she knelt before the archbishop. "Admit before God and yourself that you did not want to integrate."

An unidentified woman standing by the archbishop interrupted

Mrs. Gaillot, but she implored: "Don't listen to Satan, listen to God. Look at me, your excellency. I am on my knees before you. Listen to God."

As she rose from her knees, Mrs. Gaillot said, "May God have mercy on you. I'm not backing down."

The archbishop remained silent during the episode. Outside his residence and chancery, pickets paraded protesting the excommunication of the three segregationists and the school desegregation decision.

Gaillot, 44, a parts clerk for an industrial machinery manufacturer, told newsmen he mailed a letter to the archbishop shortly before announcing his text.

The archbishop's chancery had no comment on Gaillot's letter and repeatedly declined to talk about Mrs. Gaillot's appearance at the prelate's home.

An excommunicated Catholic loses his right to receive the sacraments, to be present at Mass and to act as sponsor at baptism or confirmation.

In Vatican City, a spokesman said Archbishop Rummel had—as do all bishops and archbishops of the church—full authority for his action.

St. George's Sets Holy Week Services

Three services of Holy Communion Easter morning are scheduled at St. George's Episcopal Church in Roseburg—7, 9:30 and 11.

IT PAYS TO PATRONIZE NEWS-REVIEW ADVERTISERS

Where To Put Umpqua Students Presents Many Problems

The strange situation in which Umpqua School District's board has made tuition arrangements with Sutherlin for next year and a group of patrons has called for an election on consolidation with Oakland has some interesting impacts.

First of all, the county Committee on Reorganization is caught in the squeeze of having to decide whether or not an election for consolidation of Umpqua and Oakland should be held.

Rebuke Idea Favored

Some members feel it would be a rebuke by the committee to the Umpqua board if it did allow such an election, since the board has already arranged a tuition contract with Sutherlin.

Still others feel the petition is a legal step which should be approved to let the people speak. One committee member said this week, however, that Umpqua voters had already, in the last three years, turned down an Oakland-Umpqua consolidation as well as an Oakland-Umpqua-Sutherlin consolidation.

Secondly, of course, Umpqua itself is affected because it is going two directions at once. The board was unhappy with an increase in tuition called for by the Oakland board to continue education of

some 25 Umpqua tuition students. It turned to Sutherlin, which agreed to take up to 40 junior high and high school students for \$23,000 yearly. An Umpqua board member at a meeting this week said he thought the Umpqua district would save as much as \$48,000 in a five-year period on tuition to Sutherlin, which is equivalent to an Umpqua budget for a year.

No Shift Wanted

The petitioners, however, pointed out that they didn't want to shift children now attending school in Oakland. "We want to see what the majority thinks," said one woman supporting the petitioners.

For both Sutherlin and Oakland,

the impending budget elections cause the problems. Their budgets may be approved before a consolidation vote can be held. The votes on both budgets are scheduled May 7. An Oakland-Umpqua consolidation election cannot be held before that time. This means both Sutherlin and Oakland budget boards will probably budget with the higher enrollments in mind. In this way, they can cut back budgets at hearings, but cannot add more to the budgets. In both cases, it is a complication.

Three-Way Liked

The reorganization committee is strongly in favor of a three-way consolidation, but another complication creeps in because only two of the district boards have come out in favor of the idea—and they, of course, are Umpqua and Sutherlin. The Oakland board didn't show a solid front against the three-way consolidation, so the reorganization committee decided to take a chance that the Oakland board might come around to the three-way plan. It is willing to offer more "facts and figures" for comparison between present operating costs and consolidated operating costs.

The reorganization committee's hope is that the Oakland board will accept further study and, perhaps, decide to try to sell its voters on the plan. This would, at least, relieve the pressure on a particularly sticky school situation.

A special meeting will be held by the Umpqua Council Camp Fire Board at 7:30 p.m. Thursday at the Riverside School cafeteria in connection with the regular monthly board session.

All committee chairmen and committee members are urged to be present to hear changes due in the Camp Fire program as a result of several years' study by the national staff, results of which were released at the recent regional Camp Fire meeting held in Spokane.

According to Mrs. James Conn, regional representative and also a member of the national council, revisions in the program will go into effect in September and it is necessary that all committee members be acquainted with the changes.
