Sunrise Easter Service Set By Drain Churches

Medical Self-Help Civil Defense Training Courses Set In County

The training of instructors to teach a medical self-help Civil Defense training course has been launched by Dr. John Donnelly, county health officer.

Donnelly announced the course, put together in kit form by the Civil Defense agency, is designed in the case of nuclear war when medical facilities for most people may not be available. Many types of medical problems, might then erupt, he said.

Training Needed

In order to meet such a situation adequately, somebody from practically every family must have training, he said.

The kit issued to Donnelly through his connection with the county Civil Defense program, contains enough material to instruct 100 persons. The first class, of 12 persons, is being given to members of the county health and welfare departments and Civil Air Patrol.

The members of the first classes in the course are expected to act as instructors for subsequent classes. The course is designed to be taught by non-medical personnel. Donnelly said it is planned to have a physician in attendance when the classes are given.

The main distinction between the course and the standard Red Cross first aid course, he said, is that first aid is merely a stop-gap procedure until medical help is available.

Course Is Extension

The new course explains what to do when medical help is not ex-

pected in the foreseeable future. Components of the course include: First aid, fallout and radiation procedures, adequate shelter, how to prepare for sanitation problems which might arise in a confined situation, and child birth procedure.

Donnelly said he was not sure when the next course would be scheduled. However, persons interested in entering the course may contact the Health Office to sign up.

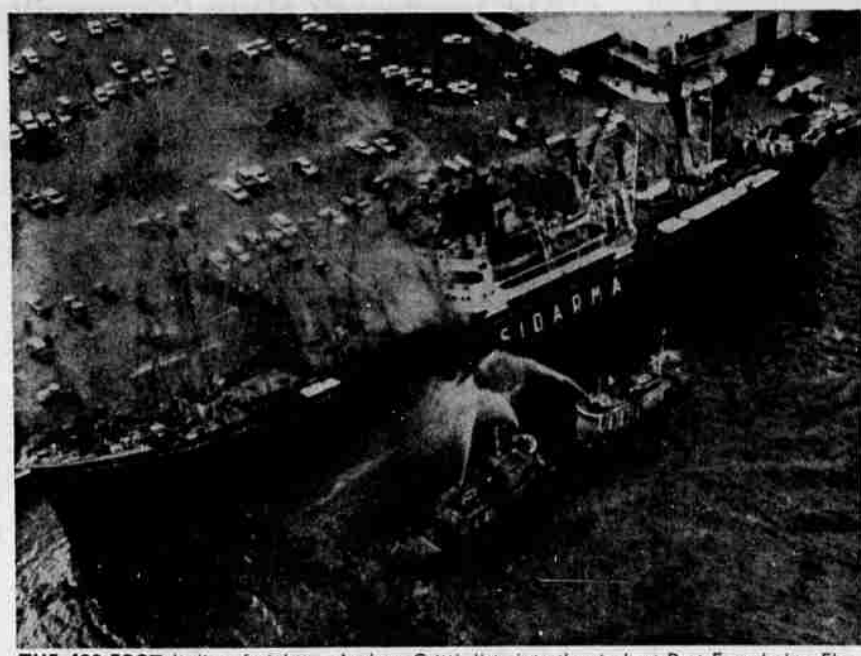
Winston Parents Hear Panel At PTA Meeting

Prospective Fair Visitors Should Make Transportation Plans Early

There are many routes leading to the Seattle World's Fair—Century 21—and Douglas County happens to be astride one of the main routes.

During the run of the fair it probably will become a weekly comment around the county as to when such-and-such went to the fair.

Much to the delight of motel and auto service people in the county, a great many fair visitors will go by auto.

Even Cycles Due

Then of course, there are the intrepid souls who will attempt unusual modes of travel such as bicycle, motorscooter or motorcycle (though that's not unusual).

During the fair's span, April 21-Oct. 21, it shouldn't be too surprising to hear of someone riding horseback to the fair (bareback no less). Then again, we'll probably hear of some athletic soul, who with knapsack on back, has hiked a thousand miles just to camp at the gates of the fair.

Fortunately, in Roseburg, there are less arduous modes of transportation to take one safely to the fair and back.

People without cars may be whisked to Seattle, be settled in a motel or hotel and get tickets to the fair and all attractions through West Coast Airlines. Or, those wishing to see a little more scenery, might choose the bus. Both Greyhound and Continental Trailways are running tours to the fair.

Greyhound, like WCA, is offering a complete package trip.

Reservations Needed

However, all transportation companies urge those planning to use their facilities to make reservations now.

Motorists from the area, when they arrive near Seattle will find that a holdover from the Brussels (Belgium), World Fair will seek out and place weary travelers in comfortable lodging.

The system is called Expo-Lodging and is the fair's official housing service.

Upon nearing Seattle, travelers will see signs indicating where Expo-Lodging centers are located. Calls from these centers to the central headquarters on the fair-

grounds will locate housing—even trailer spaces or camping spaces—for the travelers.

The thing sounds so intriguing, one wonders what type of accommodations they can find for the athletic person hiking the 1,000 miles to the fair.

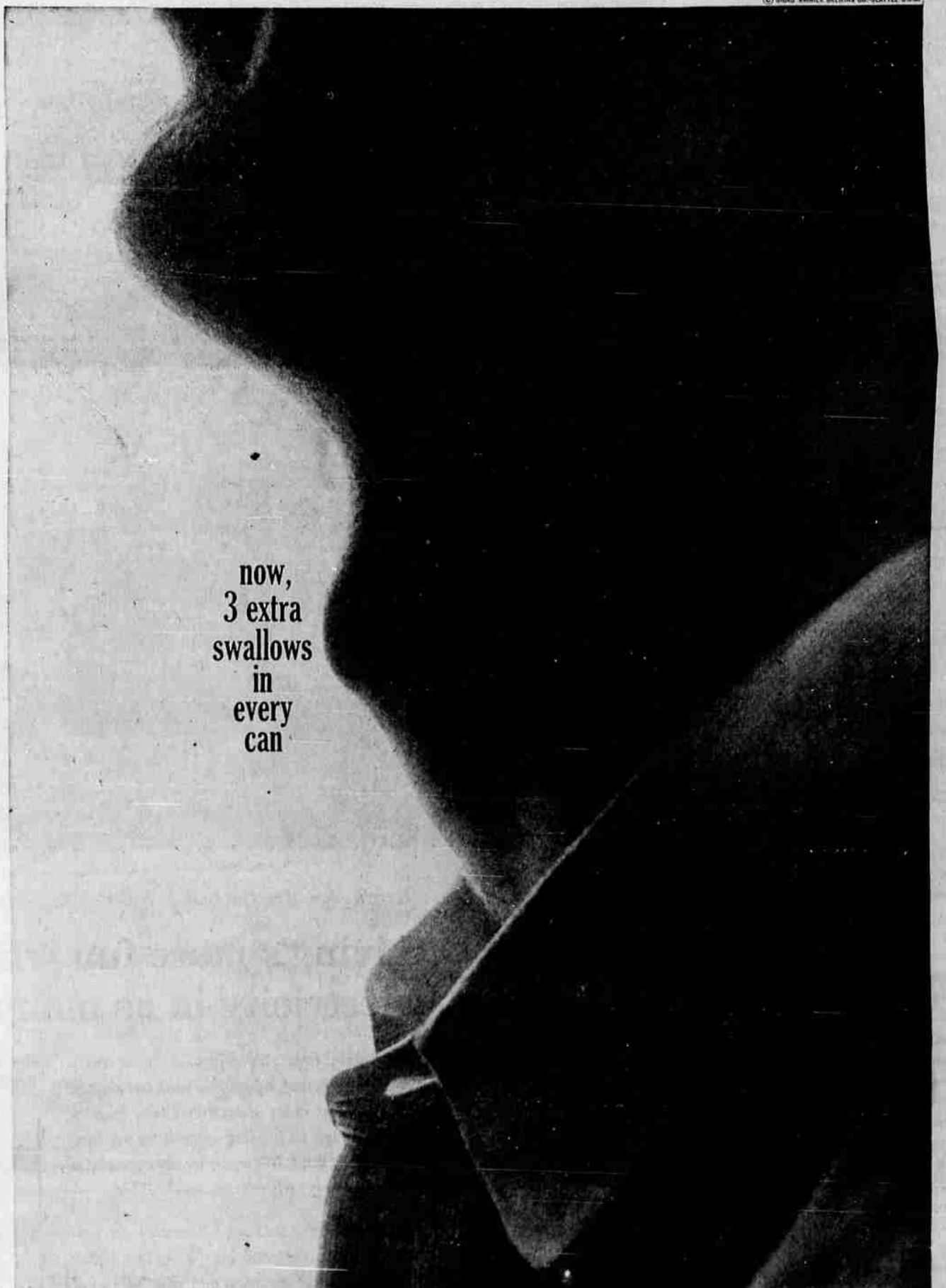
