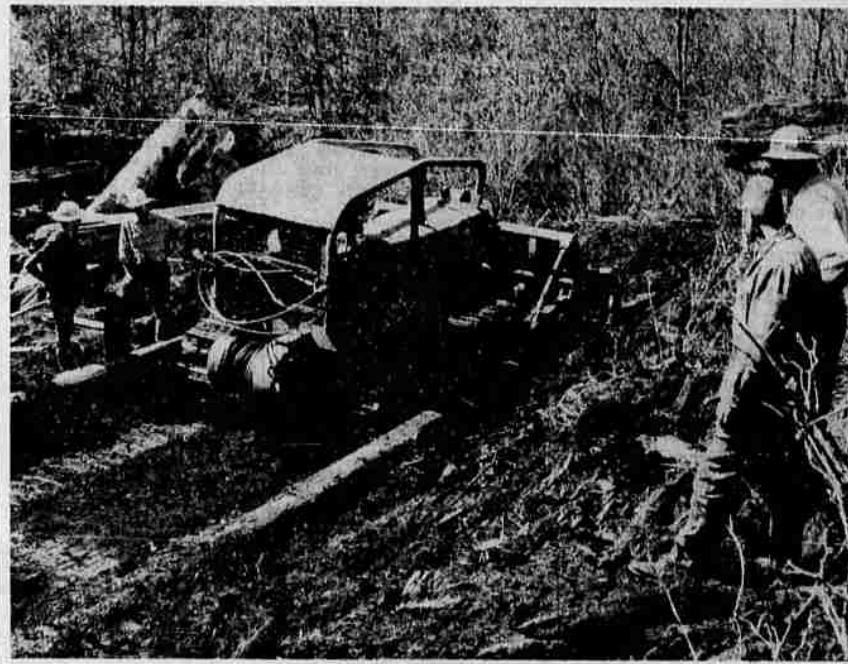

Double winners for the victorious Rogue River team were Barry Frantz and Don Gates. Frantz won the javelin throw and the 220-yard dash, while Gates took the 440 and 880-yard runs.

The next meet for the Trojans will be Saturday when they host a five-way match at 12:30 p.m. Competing against the Trojans Saturday will be the Oakland Oaks, the Riddle Irish, the Glendale Pirates and the Glide Wildcats.

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Stream-Clearing Project Designed To Help Spawns

Job Directed By The State

A stream clearance and spawning area restoration project believed of far-reaching significance got under way in the Umpqua and Smith River watersheds of western Douglas County this week.

Spearheaded and directed by the Oregon Game Commission, the program is jointly supported by affected landowners. The Bureau of Land Management, Coos Bay District, and the International Paper Co. are co-sponsors of the western Douglas County projects, which began with the breaking up of huge log jams and drifts in Vincent Creek tributary of Smith River.

Also to be cleared in the program are Big Creek, Mose Town Creek, and Smith River, along with Lutsinger, Weatherly and Elk Creeks, tributaries to the lower Umpqua.

Mitchell Brothers, operated by Jim Mitchell, Elkton, is the contractor employed by the Game Commission. Tractors and loaders are at work, breaking up the log jams of decades, and freeing the water of the stream from obstructions which have thwarted salmon runs from reaching natural spawning areas.

Soil erosion prevention, water resource management and improved timber resource management are among the other benefits seen in the program.

A similar project of the Game Commission, BLM and private timber industry has recently been completed in the Coos County area of the Coquille River, where the river and tributaries were cleared of a long-standing accumulation of logs and debris.
