

Anglers Receive Good News; Road To Lemolo Will Be Open Saturday

Good news anglers — the road from the North Umpqua highway to Lemolo Lake will be open for the start of the 1962 trout season Saturday, reports Mrs. Arthur Selby, Glendale correspondent.

This will be the first opening day for several years that fishermen will have been able to drive to the lake. The road is expected

to be somewhat soft and narrow in places because of snow. Those traveling it are advised to use extreme care, according to Richard Platt, acting Toketee District Ranger.

Platt added that boats can be launched at the Lemolo Dam; however, parking spaces will be at a

premium. The north side of the lake is fairly free of snow. All facilities on the south shore are closed by from two to four feet of snow. The lake level is about 20 feet below normal in order to catch the spring run-off for the generation of electrical power.

Toketee Lake campground will be open to the public, though not

completed. A few tables will be available to early arrivals. The work on the campground is scheduled to be completed next fall.

Lemolo is currently snowed in, but is expected to be open by late May reports Platt. This is the first major campground at Lemolo.

Saturday will mark the opening of the trout season at Lemolo Lake, Toketee Lake and the smaller Toketee Power and Light Co. impoundments. If the present

weather conditions hold through the weekend, the fishing should be excellent. A record number of anglers are expected to try their luck.

Fishermen are reminded by Platt that mountain weather can be full of surprises. He advises all motorists to carry chains in case of a spring storm.

Oregon's Ducks To Face USC In Top College Meet Saturday

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene—Oregon's high-flying Webfoots and Southern California's mighty Trojans collide in a dual track and field meet Saturday at the Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum that brings together the best collegiate teams in the nation.

USC, defending NCAA champion, has not been defeated in 104 meets, while Oregon, runnerup for the NCAA crown in 1961, has lost only two meets, both to the Trojans, in the past ten years.

Classy Performers
Coach Bill Bowerman's Ducks will be counting on such classy

performers as sprint star Harry Jerome, NCAA high hurdle champion Jerry Tarr, two-time NCAA mile king Dwyer Bureson, broad jumper Jerry Close, middle distance stars Sig Ohlmann and Archie San Romani, and Jerry Stubbelfield and Dave Steen in the discus in their bid to upset the Trojans.

The meet figures to be so tight that a superb performance by any Webfoot or an above average effort by a Duck could well decide the issue. Typical of the importance of every event is the situation in the sprints.

Clutch efforts by Jerome, who has bests of 9.3 in the 100 and 21.0 in the 220, and senior Jim Puckett, a fierce competitor, could put the Ducks over the top in their quest for victory.

Regaining Form
Puckett is rapidly regaining the form he flashed as a sophomore and last week proved his readiness for the USC meet with a fine afternoon against Stanford. Puckett grabbed second place finishes behind Jerome in both sprints, speeding to a 9.7 clocking in the century, and ran a gutsy anchor leg on the winning mile relay team.

USC will match Jerome and Puckett with Bruce Munn (9.5 and 20.8) and Dick Cortese (9.6 and 21.5) to provide a pair of exciting and crucial dashes.
