

Former Aide To Walker Placed On Suspension

WASHINGTON (AP)—The daughters of the American Revolution asked a congressional investigation today of the Army's suspension of Maj. Archibald E. Roberts, said Sen. Strom Thurmond, D-S.C., said he favored leaving the investigation to the Army at this time.

Thurmond, who has been battling for months against what he called Pentagon muzzling of military officers, said he thought an Army investigation was appropriate if Roberts had in fact ques-

who quoted from established records in an attempt to warn the society of the dangers of Communist penetration into this country." Roberts, 46, is a former aide to ex-Maj. Gen. Edwin A. Walker who was relieved of his command in Germany last year on a finding that he had made derogatory public statements about prominent Americans.

Titov, Glenn Meet Set For April 30

WASHINGTON (AP)—Soviet cosmonaut Gherman Titov and American astronaut John H. Glenn Jr. will have a chance to compare notes on outer space at a scientific meeting here April 30. The Washington Post reported today that Maj. Titov had asked for a visa to visit the United States April 30-May 7 and that State Department officials said the request would be granted.

Glenn is scheduled to deliver a paper on his triple earth orbit of last Feb. 20 at the first day of the third International Council of Scientific Unions. It is believed Titov will present a paper the same day, presumably dealing with his 17-orbit flight of last Aug. 6.

Russia's first cosmonaut, Yuri Gagarin, orbited the earth once on April 12, 1961.

It is believed Titov will be a member of the Russian delegation to the 10-day symposium, first to be held by the organization in the United States. The Russians are expected to send at least 10 men. Glenn, a Marine lieutenant colonel, is a member of the American delegation.

Georgy P. Arkadev was named U.N. undersecretary for political and Security Council affairs in 1960, seven years after the Korean armistice, and was replaced by another Russian last month.

Driving Sans License Nets Jail Term, Fine

Two Roseburg men were arraigned in Douglas County District Court Thursday on charges of driving on suspended operator's licenses.

One of the men pleaded guilty to the charge, the other innocent. Henry Saul Pawnell, 21, of 828 SE Parrott St., was sentenced to two days in the county jail and fined \$125 and costs after pleading guilty to a Roseburg state police complaint issued April 16.

Clarence E. Lemon, 21, of 731 NE Garden Valley Blvd., pleaded innocent on arraignment before Judge Gerald R. Hayes and trial was set April 25 at 2 p.m. Lemon is charged in a complaint issued April 14 by Roseburg City Police. Lemon was released from custody on his own recognizance.

Walter Anderson, 38, of Grants Pass, was lodged in the Douglas County jail Thursday to begin serving 30 days in lieu of a \$150 fine ordered by the Canyonville Municipal Court in connection with a driving while intoxicated complaint.

Welfare Commissioners Nix Expansion Of ADC

PORTLAND (AP)—The Oregon State Public Welfare Commission met Thursday with a group of county welfare commissioners to discuss proposed changes in national and state welfare legislation.

Some 35 county commissioners attended the meeting, the second in a series to determine the opinion of county commissions.

Those in attendance voted 33-2 against continuing the current program of extending Aid to Dependent Children (ADC) to families where the father is unemployed.

The U.S. Congress approved this extension for one year and is currently considering expanding it to another five years. Before that, families could not get ADC unless the father was incapacitated, dead, or had deserted the family.

Although the county commissioners took only that one vote, they expressed strong opinions in favor of.

—Returning control of welfare problems to local levels.

—Providing incentive programs to employ persons on welfare.

—A provision that would deny aid under the ADC program to anyone who refused to accept retraining.

Easter Egg Hunt Slated Saturday

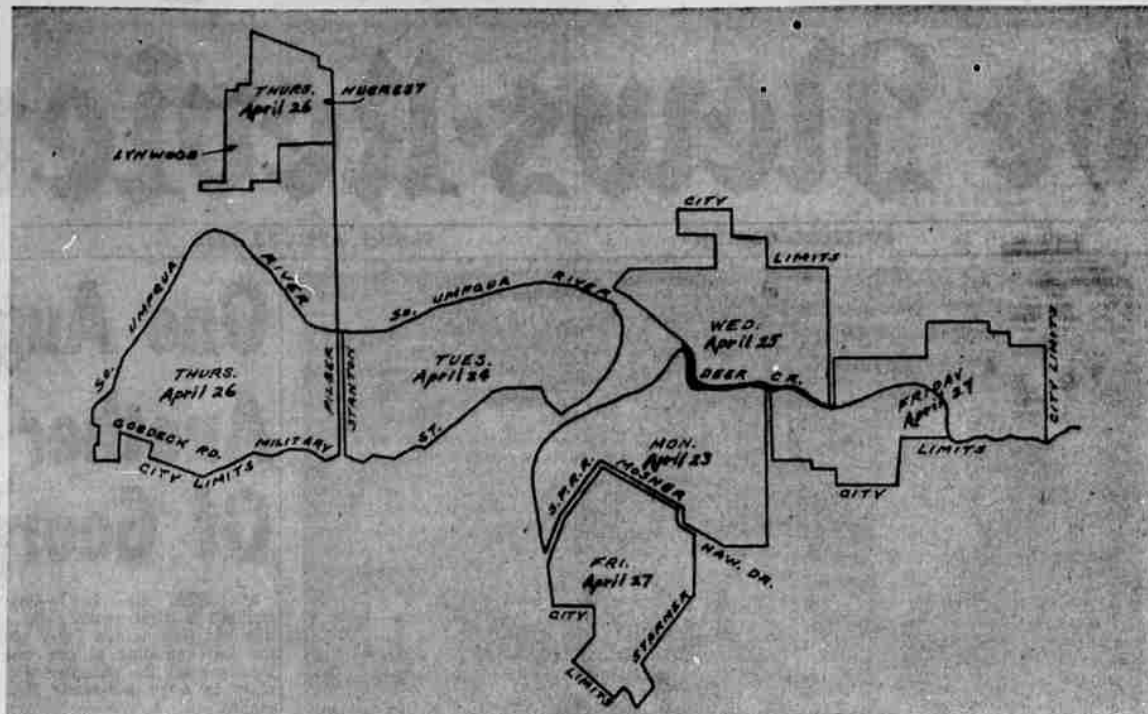
A Saturday Easter egg hunt in Roseburg may draw as many as 1,000 youngsters, judging from its popularity last year.

Hastings Is New Lions President

Lloyd Hastings was elected president of the Roseburg Lions Club Thursday night. He will take office July 1, succeeding Frank von Borstel.

Guest speaker was Roseburg's new city manager, Craig McKicken. City Councilman Jack Davis was also present.

Both discussed Roseburg's proposed city budget on which a vote will be held May 1 from 2 to 8 p.m. on a special levy of \$288,621 outside the 6 per cent limitation. Davis explained principal changes in the budget and new items and services it will provide.

McKicken's brief talk was more of a get-acquainted nature. He said he had very little to do with framing of this budget, but thought it very realistic. He described it as not an ambitious budget, but more one of maintaining the present level. He hopes to see capital improvements for the city placed in next year's budget if at all possible.

He stressed the importance of having an attractive city, as, he said, visitors judge a city by what they see. He had praise for projects civic and service organizations had undertaken toward city improvement. He said in some cities with which he is familiar, the attitude is to "let City Hall do everything, then sit back and complain about taxes."

X15 Canopy Sticks In Successful Flight

EDWARDS AIR FORCE BASE, Calif. (AP)—Test pilot Joe Walker took the X15 on what was described as a warmup flight to 150,000 feet and 3,920 miles an hour and returned safely—to find himself strapped.

After the black rocket ship skidded to a landing on a dry lake bed here Thursday, Walker radioed: "I can't get the lid open!"

His cockpit canopy was stuck. Technicians pried it open with a tool precluding the space age—a screwdriver.

The flight was a preliminary to planned X15 trips to nearly 50 miles in space. It was made to test a new emergency control system scientists think may be needed at extreme altitudes.

Walker termed the test 100 per cent successful.

Officials said the flight means the X15 will be able to try for a new altitude record, 250,000 feet, within the next two weeks. The craft's present top altitude is 217,000 feet. The X15's present speed record is 4,093 m.p.h.

Brilliant Young Violinist To Appear In Concert Here

David Abel, brilliant young American violinist, will play here Monday at 8:15 p.m. in the Joseph Lane Junior High auditorium. This will be the last of the current winter series of Roseburg Community Concert Association presentations.

Abel made his professional debut in the city he now calls home—San Francisco—at the age of 17. In August 1953 he appeared as soloist in the Wieniawski Concerto under Arthur Fiedler with the San Francisco Symphony. His success on that occasion immediately led to a demand for his services as an orchestral soloist and ultimately to his successful New York recital debut in Town Hall a little more than a year later.

Impressed, Fiedler invited the then teen-aged soloist to cross the continent for repeat performance with the Boston Pops Orchestra. This led to an engagement with the Boston Symphony orchestra under the baton of the great Pierre Monteux. One of his three guest appearances was broadcast nationwide over NBC. He has been heard also over Los Angeles and San Francisco stations and the Canadian broadcasting network.

He appeared again this season as soloist with the San Francisco Symphony and has filled engagements with many other leading orchestras throughout the country. The Baltimore Evening Sun hailed him as "one of our best violinists among the younger generation."

Highlighting his 1960-61 coast-to-coast sold-out season, the handsome young artist was featured soloist 23 times on the national tour of the Minneapolis Symphony under Stanislaw Skrowaczewski. He appeared also with the Honolulu Symphony.

He is rapidly becoming a favorite on the recital stages. The Los Angeles Herald and Express declared "he has that inner genius denied some of the more famous names."

Abel showed his musical inclination at the age of 2. He began violin study at the age of 5½. He has been a student of Naoum Blinder, concert master of the San Francisco Symphony and a noted teacher. He has also studied with other leading teachers.

His instrument is a magnificent Guarnerius violin, made by Joseph Guarnerius in 1734 and conservatively valued at \$25,000. He also owns a rare 1753 Guadagnini valued at \$10,000.

Fair Weather Seen For Trout Opening

The trout season will open in Oregon Saturday. The outlook is for fair weather but cool weather east of the Cascades, showers elsewhere.

Anglers in Eastern Oregon can expect morning temperatures as low as 28 degrees. The mercury is expected to climb later to 60 to 65 degrees.

Temperatures will be warmer in Western Oregon, but clouds will prevail with showers expected.

Angling is expected to be good in north and central coast lakes and in Southern Oregon reservoirs. Best trout prospects in the mid-Willamette Valley area should be such streams as Mary's River, Luckiamute, Rickreall Creek and the North and South Yamhill River.

The East Fork of the Hood River and upper Sandy tributaries also should provide good fishing.

In Central Oregon the Deschutes River at Maupin is slightly off color, but anglers are expected to have good success.

In the northeast area, most of the streams in Morrow, Gilliam and Wheeler counties are clearing and should be in fair shape.

Southeast Oregon streams will be only fair.

Flamboyant Mexican Backs Many Causes

LOS ANGELES (AP)—An energetic, flamboyant Mexican with a penchant for causes is in the news this week—because of the bits and pieces which fit together to form this picture:

A man claiming to head the Committee for Liberation and Justice in Mexico threatens to picket a Beverly Hills motel—and ends up facing an 11-year-old grand theft charge.

A man claiming to be an exile band's "provisional president of Mexico" appears before the United Nations, threatening an armed uprising in Mexico—and is identified by police as an ex-convict from Los Angeles.

Police say they are the same man: Marco Ignacio M. Infante, 41, an ex-convict facing the grand theft charge, and smooth-talking Dr. Marcantonio Diaz-Infante, petitioner to the United Nations.

Descriptions Vary
From various parts of the country come further descriptions—To Dr. John Rademaker, Willamette University sociology professor, of Salem, Ore., he was a dedicated social worker, laboring in behalf of migrant workers in the fields of Eastern Oregon when Infante was a field representative of the Oregon Department of Labor.

To Dr. Hector Garcia, of Corpus Christi, Tex., one of the founders of the American GI Forum, an organization of American veterans of Mexican origin, he was a poseur with fake credentials and a bogus name. Said Garcia, when he learned of the UN appearance: "Personally, I do not believe any such movement against Lopez-Mateos exists."

In Mexico City, Humberto Romero, private secretary to Mexican President Adolfo Lopez-Mateos, termed the Diaz-Infante complaint to the United Nations "so grotesque and absurd that it does not deserve comment."

Heads Zapata
The man styling himself Diaz-Infante appeared at the United Nations in New York Tuesday, calling himself head of a six-man delegation of the "Zapata Movement."

The "movement" threatened an uprising against Lopez-Mateos within 10 days unless their complaints against him were heard.

When news of the UN appearance reached here, Beverly Hills and Los Angeles police identified Diaz-Infante as the Infante with a California arrest record dating back to 1944.

Records indicate that he was arrested in San Francisco in July, 1944, on suspicion of assault. He was convicted in Los Angeles in November, 1947, of forgery and grand theft. In 1949 he was arrested for probation violation and in July, 1950, he was arrested for drunkenness.

In December of 1950 he was accused of accepting \$1,005 from

Mrs. Ysidra Chavez to handle an immigration matter as an attorney, without ever performing the services.

Charge Still Pending
This charge was still pending against him when, last November, the champion of causes, Diaz-Infante, threatened to picket the posh Beverly Hilton Hotel because a group planned a ceremony there in honor of former Mexican President Miguel Aleman.

He dropped the picketing plan, but was arrested on the old charge by Beverly Hills police. He is to face trial next Wednesday on the charges, and remains free, meanwhile, on \$3,000 bond.

Authorities here are assuming he will appear as scheduled. And the complex Diaz-Infante—or just Infante, as his police record reads—still has admirers.

Rademaker of Salem is one of those who admires the Diaz-Infante side of his personality. Said Rademaker to a newsmen Thursday:

"I observed him and worked with him a full week during the summer of 1957 and 1958. I found him to be one of the most hard-working, competent, efficient men I have ever worked with. My impression of his moral integrity, character and honesty is excellent."

"He was flamboyant in manner but extremely efficient in getting results. His energy seemed boundless. He worked day and night."

Children of the nursery, kindergarten, primary and junior departments of the church school will present their annual Easter program.

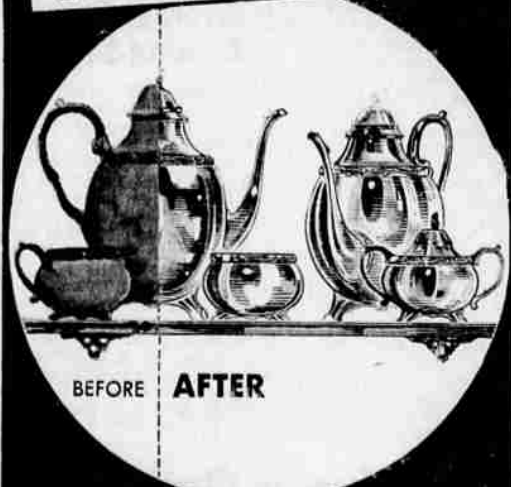
