

## Canadian Lumber Imports Cut Northwest Employment By 3,500 Says Gov. Rosellini

OLYMPIA (AP)—Gov. Rosellini testified before a congressional committee here Friday that the inroads being made by the Canadian lumber industry in Atlantic Coast markets has eliminated the jobs of 3,500 persons in the Pacific Northwest.

"If the national average of one manufacturing job sustaining two and one-half additional jobs in supporting lines is correct, approximately 12,000 workers are represented in this loss of Atlantic Coast lumber markets by Pacific Northwest producers," Rosellini said.

The governor was one of several witnesses who appeared at the U.S. Commerce Committee hearing into the economic impact of Canadian imports on the Pacific Northwest lumber industry.

**Magnuson Heads Committee**

Sen. Warren G. Magnuson is committee chairman. The hearing, a continuation of a hearing which opened in Washington, D.C. Monday, was the first ever held by a U.S. Senate committee in the Washington State House of Representatives.

## Army Orders Fast Reserve Integration

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Pentagon has directed that all-Negro and all-white Reserve units be integrated as rapidly as consistent with military effectiveness. The move was aimed at tightening compliance with a 14-year-old order.

The directive, it disclosed today, does not apply to the National Guard which the Defense Department said is an organization of volunteers under the command of the respective governors.

While sidestepping a possible clash with Southern governors and Southern congressmen, the Defense Department indicated it hoped to make progress in guard integration through consultation and persuasion.

**Ten States Segregate**  
Officials said 10 states still maintain segregated National Guard units. The list was not available immediately.

The Reserve integration action was ordered by Roswell L. Gilpatric, deputy secretary of defense, in an April 3 memorandum to the Army, Navy and Air Force. Gilpatric said it is aimed at assuring compliance with a 1948 executive order by then President Truman banning racial segregation in the armed forces.

A high official said the regular Army, Navy, Air Force and Marine Corps have been integrated but that there is some question whether it has been done fully and effectively in the Reserve elements of these services.

Another official indicated there has been token integration in some Reserve units—that is, one or two Negroes filtered in with an otherwise all-white outfit. Unlike the National Guard, the Reserves are totally under federal control.

The hearing was moved to the House chambers after scores of persons asked time to testify, including representatives of the lumber industry, unions, civic leaders, shipping firms, port authorities, loggers, millhands and woods bosses.

Domestic lumber producers contend that they can not compete with their northern neighbors because of U.S. Laws regulating water and rail shippers which increase their costs.

Rosellini said that where once nearly a billion board feet of Pacific Northwest lumber was sold, now less than 600 million board feet is sold.

## Handicaps Must Be Lifted

"The handicaps imposed on this industry must be lifted in order to avoid a general weakening of the industry and a serious loss to the economy of the country," the governor said in a prepared statement.

In other prepared statements: Ben H. Gardner Jr., president of Nettleton Lumber Co., Seattle, reported it has lost 90 per cent of its Atlantic Coast cargo market to British Columbia shippers in the past four years.

He said Nettleton will ship only 1.5 million board feet to the East Coast this year compared with 15 million in 1958.

He said the inroads of the Canadians have cut employment at his mill down from 212 men to a present crew of 120. He said this meant a \$500,000 annual payroll loss to Seattle.

Tony Zuvich, McCleary gypsy logger, declared his business, employing five men, has been wiped out in the past year by successive closure of sawmills at Oakville, Elma, Satsop and Aberdeen. Zuvich said he sold logs to these mills until they lost their markets.

## Union Loses Members

Charles R. Savage, former U.S. representative from Shelton and now union representative for Local 38 of International Woodworkers of America, said his local lost 30 per cent of its regular membership in the last two years because of depressed conditions in the lumber market.

Gene Sibold, manager of the Port of Olympia, said the capital city port is 99 per cent dependent upon the cargo lumber industry. He said Olympia led all Puget Sound ports in lumber shipments since 1957, but was now in a state of decline. Sibold said Olympia shipments in 1961 were 34 per cent below 1960 and 47 per cent below 1957, the port's best year.

Chapin Collins, Montesano publisher and member of the commission for the Port of Grays Harbor also is suffering a drop in lumber tonnage because of competition from Canadian mills.

## U. Of O. Professor Gets Big NSF Grant

EUGENE (AP)—A five-year study of native communities in the Pacific will be conducted by Homer G. Barnett, professor of anthropology at the University of Oregon.

He will do the work under a \$224,000 grant from the National Science Foundation, the largest ever granted a University of Oregon faculty member for research.

Native communities on the Solomon, Fiji, Marshall, Phoenix, Tonga, New Hebrides and New Guinea islands will be studied. All of these communities were forced to move from their traditional homelands for various reasons.

Four anthropologists from other universities and 10 graduate students will aid Barnett in study of changes in the social, economic and religious customs of the people.

May 15 is the starting date. Two community studies are to be conducted simultaneously during each year of the project, under present plans.

## League Of Women Voters Hear Talk On Trade Expansion Plan

The impact upon Oregon of a trade expansion program which President Kennedy sent to Congress in January was subject of a talk in Roseburg Thursday by James W. Tattersall, professor of economics at the University of Oregon.

Tattersall was speaker at a Roseburg League of Women Voters luncheon held in the Brother League members and civic leaders attended.

Kennedy's liberalized trade program, labeled the Trade Expansion Act of 1962, sets up powerful tariff-reducing authority for the President. Its purpose is to help the United States meet the challenge posed by growth of the European Common Market.

Commenting on the plan's impact upon Oregon, Tattersall said he believes the state's flibbert and cherry industries would be most vulnerable. He noted that the program provides "adjustment assistance" to industries which suffer economic setback resulting from tariff reductions.

The speaker pointed out Oregon has a "very large stake" in the matter of foreign trade since the state exports approximately twice what it imports.

Tattersall's remarks were mostly favorable for the plan. He said the act is "not a panacea for the nation's economic problems" and will not in itself insure a "high level of employment without inflation."

But he said he believes the program offers vital political and economic advantages to the U.S. through development of a strong

trade market among free world nations.

Labor and management must share some responsibility in the venture by demonstrating restraint in wage demands and pricing, he said.

The economist suggested the lumber industry would not be severely affected by a low tariff program, but this point met resistance during the question period which followed his talk.

Tattersall said marketing inequities existing in the northwest lumber industry, in reference to

PORTLAND (AP)—The fund to buy Belle the elephant and her 225-pound male calf went over the \$1,000 mark Thursday, fund-raising officials said.

Morgan Berry, Seattle wild animal dealer who owns Belle, has offered to sell her and her calf, born last Saturday, to the Portland Zoo for \$30,000.

A "Jack Marks Elephant Fund" has been established for the purpose.

Jack Marks is the Portland Zoo director, who collapsed from nervous exhaustion when Belle's baby finally was born.

Alexander G. Brown, city attorney, gave a boost to the fund-raising efforts Thursday when he said in a legal opinion that contributions to the fund would be tax exempt, if they were made to the City of Portland or endorsed to the city treasurer.
