New Putter Spelling Victory For Pro Golf's George Knudson

HOUSTON, Tex. (AP) — "I was putting like gangbusters, wasn't I?" grinned young George Knudson after he took the early lead in the \$50,000 Houston Classic golf tournament.

Knudson, of Toronto, shot a four-

under par 66 on the rugged Memorial Park Municipal Course for his 18-hole lead Thursday. Jacky Cupit of Longview, Tex., and Jay Hebert of Lafayette, La., were right behind him at 67.

Hebert, who plays golf out of Miami, Fla., is the defending champion.

"I bought a new putter in Mobile in November, and I've been going good ever since," Knudson said. "I've won three times since then and finished second once."

Grouped at 68 were Lionel Hebert — Jay's brother and a pro from Kern City, Calif., Bobby Nichols of Midland, Tex., and Jack Nicklaus of Tucson, Ariz.

Arnold Palmer and Gary Player, the two big names in golf, did not enter the Classic this year.

Other golfers to break par were Bruce Crampton, Sydney, Australia, Billy Maxwell, Las Vegas, Fred Hawkins, El Paso, Tex., Don January of Dallas, Bo Winger, Odessa, Paul Harney, Worcester, Mass., and Dave Marr, Sun City, Ariz. — all at 69.

Knudson, No. 39 in the list of PGA money winners this year, bought his new putter and then won in Coral Gables, San Juan and Maracaibo. He finished second in San Francisco's Lucky International open.

Former Seattle Traffic Judge Begins New Career With A TKO

PORTLAND (AP) — William Simmons, a former Seattle traffic judge who was removed from his post, opened a new career in Portland Thursday night — boxing.

The former judge, who has been training for about a year, got a TKO over Bobby Sanders of Phoenix, Ariz., in 2:05 minutes of the first round, in a preliminary bout at the Portland Armory.

Simmons' appearance on the card took the 600 fans by surprise. His fistful debut had not been announced in advance.

Sanders gave the ex-judge little opposition. Simmons knocked the Arizona down three times. When Sanders went to the canvas for the third time, referee George Robinson stepped in to stop the one-sided bout.

Both fighters weighed in at 137 pounds. George Chemeris, Simmons' manager, appeared encouraged by the outcome and said Simmons plans more fights.

Simmons was removed from the bench after he had been accused of criminal assault on a woman who had come to see him about a traffic ticket.

He was convicted of the assault charge by a superior court jury

in Seattle. He appealed to the Washington State Supreme Court which ruled a new trial for the deposed jurist.

But the woman in the case would not testify at a second trial, and the charges against Simmons were dropped.

Sam Snead Tries To Aid Putting

NEW YORK (AP) — Sam Snead celebrates his 50th birthday next month—May 27—and guess what he may get himself for a birthday present? A pair of spectacles.

"Fred Corcoran says my putting troubles may be due to failing eyesight," the slapping man from White Sulphur Springs, W. Va., said today. "I don't think so. But I'm willing to take some tests to find out."

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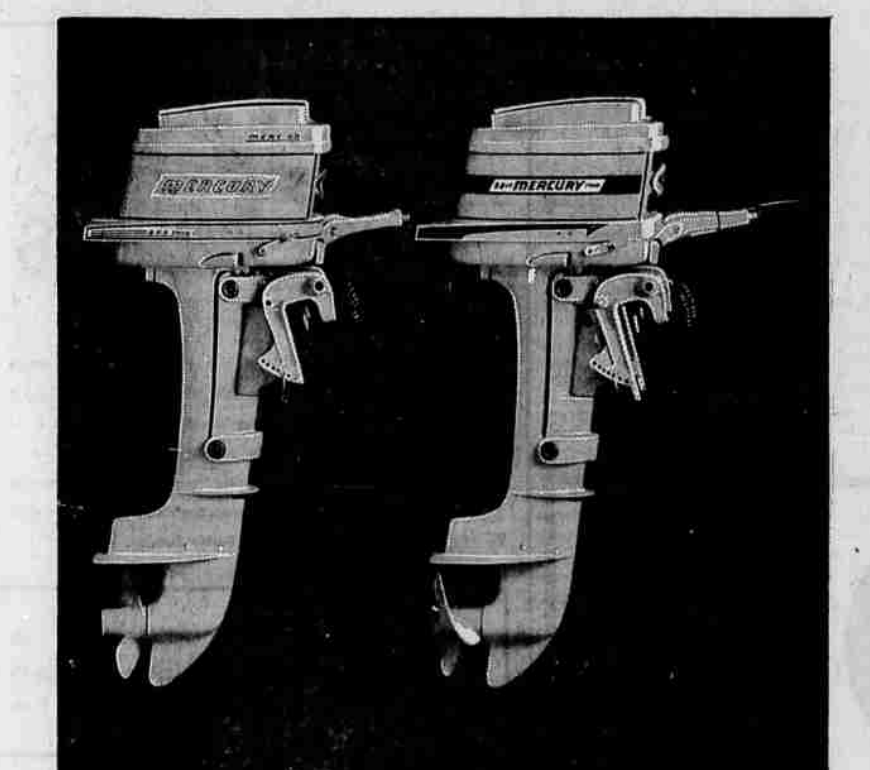
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
